Shelter. Wood frame set on log and rock foundation; square (14' x 14'); 1-story; wood shake siding (on 3 sides) over round log construction; wood-shaked saltbox roof with slightly extended eaves and extended ridgeline; entrance opening on southeast. Exterior features include exposed log purlins and rafters.

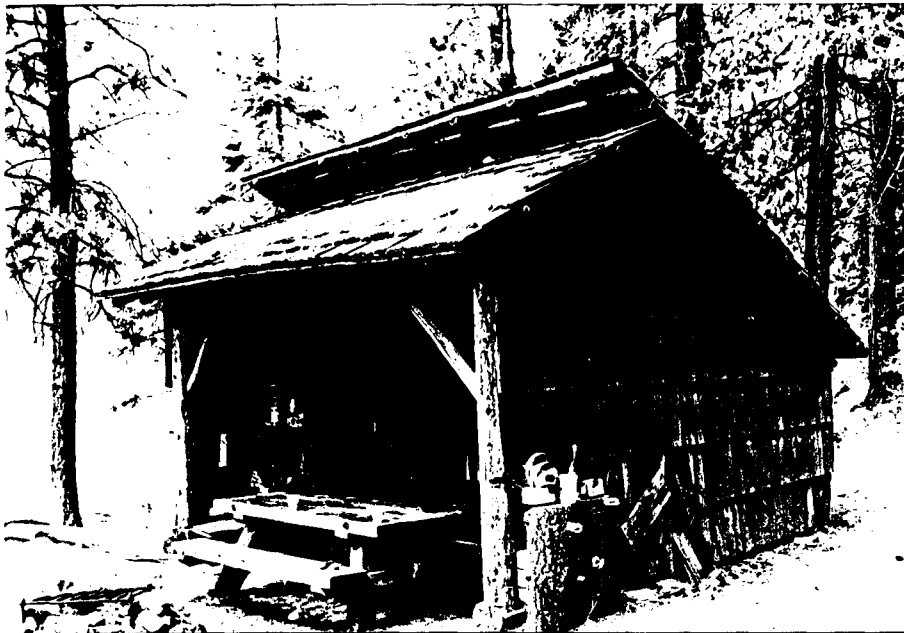
This shelter was built in the 1930s by the USFS using CCC labor. The CCCs were stationed down lake (Chelan) at 25-Mile Camp, but had a side camp (20 men) in Stehekin for many years. This shelter had new shakes installed on the roof and walls c. 1979-80.

SIGNIFICANCE *Eligible under Nat. Reg. Criterion C: significant as a distinct type of building. This is a good example of a 1930s-era USFS-designed backcountry shelter. It reflects the USFS design ethic of utilizing natural/native materials and siting structures sensitively in their environments. Only a few regulation(designed and built according to USFS standards) shelters stand today with NOCA; most were removed by the USFS and NPS because of changing needs. This shelter possesses integrity of design, location, materials, setting, workmanship, feeling, and association.*

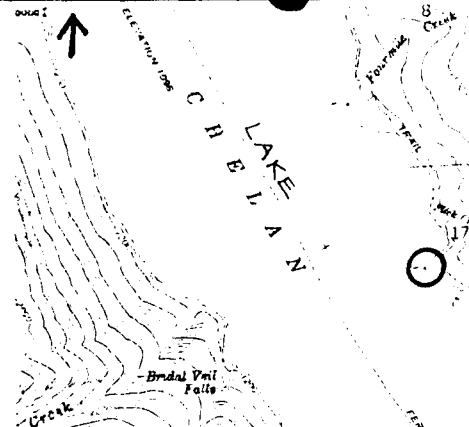
PHOTOGRAPHS AND SKETCH MAP OF LOCATION
