The Green is an open plot of land, approximately one hundred and sixtyseven feet by two hundred and thirty feet, near the center of St. Helena Island, located at the junction of U.S. Highway 21 and the Land's End Road, at a place commonly called the Corner.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Green is significant both historically as the long-established site of community meetings, celebrations, and other gatherings, and for its potential to yield information in historical archaeology. The Green was the site of the first Darrah Hall, an auditorium and community center built c. 1885 by Penn School. After the devastating hurricane in August 1893 many homeless refugees gathered at the Green and crowded into the building seeking shelter. They built fires inside the hall, in sandboxes, for cooking and warmth; one of these fires spread and destroyed Darrah. Since that time the Green, still owned by Penn (now the Penn Community Center), has continued to serve as a gathering-place for the people of St. Helena Island. Such activities as Emancipation Day, celebrating the adoption of the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863; the annual Farmers' Fair; and community sings were held all or in part at the Green. One of the most eagerly anticipated celebrations there in the early twentieth century was on Labor Day, signifying the end of the summer and the beginning of the school year. It was sponsored by the Young Men's Social Club and featured foods of all kinds, games, band music, and dancing.(1) The Green has great potential for recovering archaeological data from the period before 1893 as well as since that time. It is still frequently used by the islanders and retains a particular integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association.

Although no archaeological survey has been conducted at the Green, the early and extensive occupation, limited amount of landscape disturbing activities, and historically and architecturally significant activities at the Green suggest that the site has the potential to yield valuable archaeological data.
