

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SUMMARY

The Richard and Mettie Ealy House was built in 1942 on Soloman Grove Road in Twin Groves, Arkansas. The house has an open arcaded porch on the front façade which displays a Mediterranean influence on the design of the home. The arcade is a trademark of the work of Silas Owens. The home has a rectangular plan with a combination cross-gable and gable-on-hip roof plan.

This home exhibits many of the techniques Silas Owens repeatedly used. The house utilizes the three-in, three-out brick pattern around all entrances (including doors, windows, louvers, and porch entries), brick quoins at every corner, and the above mentioned arcaded porch.

ELABORATION

The Richard and Mettie Ealy House was built in 1942 when the wood frame home that the family previously occupied was destroyed by fire. Silas Owens was related to the Ealy family, and helped them with the construction of their new home. Since the time of its construction the house has changed very little. The exterior of the home is in tact with the exception of the soffit and windows. Richard Ealy Jr. had them replaced in March of 2002 due to deterioration and rot. However, the configuration of the roofline, entrances and windows, and stonework are original to the home. This building has enough integrity to justify its nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

Southeast Elevation - Front

The front of the Ealy House faces southeast toward Soloman Grove Road. The front wall is rocked from the roofline to the ground. There are two arches on the south corner that open to a covered porch. The arches are trimmed in cream brick laid in the three-in three-out pattern. Four concrete steps lead up to the poured concrete porch floor. The porch has a painted wood ceiling with a small centrally located light fixture. A single modern vinyl double-hung window is on the recessed southeast wall and covered by the porch. The window opening is trimmed in the three-in three-out brick pattern and has a concrete sill and lintel. A southwest facing door accessed from the porch is the main entrance to the house. The porch is integrated into the building so that it shares the house roofline. A small gable above easternmost arch is an architectural clue indicating is as the entrance to the home. Three windows comprise the remainder of the southeast façade. The windows are modern vinyl double-hung and set in a single opening trimmed in patterned cream brick on the sides and concrete lintel and sill on the remaining sides. Beneath the window there is access to a crawlspace. The opening is presently covered with sheet metal, but was constructed with a concrete lintel.

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Northeast Elevation - Right Side

The northeast side of the building is a single plane with five window openings along the length of the elevation. The different roof framing techniques are visible on this façade. The east end has a gable profile, while the portion extending to the north displays the side of the gable-on-hip roofline. Beneath the gable peak is a vent opening. The opening is trimmed in patterned cream brick and presently sealed with a sheet of vinyl siding. All window openings on the northeast elevation are trimmed in cream brick laid in the three-in three-out pattern with concrete sills and lintels. The first three openings, from left to right, each have two modern vinyl double-hung windows. The last two openings look onto a mud room, and there are currently no windows in the openings.

Northwest Elevation - Back

The back of the house is rocked from the roofline to the ground. The gable-on-hip roof is visible as it slopes down to the northwest and the gable peak is centered on the hip. The gable peak has wood weatherboard siding and a small rectangular wood slat vent. There are three openings along the northwest wall. From left to right, there is a door and two window openings. All are trimmed in cream brick. However, all the trim around the door and trim the left side of the middle window is strictly headers, while the remaining trim is laid in the three-in three-out pattern. The window and door on the far left share a single concrete lintel. Both windows are modern vinyl double-hung and have concrete sills.

Southwest Elevation - Left Side

The southwest side of the building is a single plane with four window openings along the length of the elevation and an arch open to the front porch at the south corner. The different roof framing techniques are visible on this façade. The southernmost end has a gable profile, while the portion extending to the west displays the side of the gable-on-hip roofline. Beneath the gable peak is a fixed four pane window, the only remaining original window on the house. All window openings on the southwest elevation are trimmed in cream brick laid in the three-in three-out pattern with concrete sills and lintels. The openings on this elevation each contain a modern vinyl double-hung window. The arch is trimmed in patterned cream brick.

INTEGRITY

The Richard and Mettie Ealy House, built in 1942, retains its integrity despite its loss of most original windows and application of vinyl to the soffits. The building remains in its original rural setting in Twin Groves and still expresses its use as a small home for a family living in a small agricultural community. Most importantly, the artistry of Silas Owen's stonework remains in excellent condition.

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SUMMARY

The Richard and Mettie Ealy House was built in 1942 in Twin Groves, Faulkner County. The house is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with **local** significance under **Criterion C** as the best example of a Silas Owens home in the Twin Groves vicinity. The Ealy house is representative of Owen's proclivity toward the Mediterranean style. The house features a large porch with a double arched entry. The Richard and Mettie Ealy House represents several Silas Owen's trademarks including the herringbone pattern, cream brick quoins at the corners, and cream brick around the windows and doors in the three-in, three-out pattern. The Richard and Mettie Ealy House is being nominated under the multiple property listing "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed-Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

HISTORY

Richard Sr. and Mettie Ealy commissioned Silas Owens to build them a new home in 1941. They previously owned a wood home on Soloman Grove Road. However, the original family home was destroyed by fire. In an effort to prevent a similar tragedy from occurring, Richard Ealy Sr. asked his first cousin, Silas Owens, to build him a new rock home in place of the burned one. Silas Owens completed the home in 1942, and the Ealy family moved in.

Richard and Mettie had a son, Richard Jr. Richard Jr. was the first mayor of the town of Twin Groves. He and several other community members were upset when they were unable to obtain county funds to fix their roads. Their solution was to join the adjacent communities of Zion Grove and Soloman Grove, which they incorporated as the town of Twin Groves in 1991. Richard Ealy Jr. was a vital part of the process and served as the first mayor of the town.

Richard Ealy Jr. lived in the Silas Owens home that his father built until 1987 when he built himself a new home across the street. Over the years he has maintained his childhood home. He replaced the windows and trim due to rot, however, the stonework remains in its original condition. Since vacating the home in 1987 he has used it as a rental property and a center for family gatherings. Richard Jr. hosts a Fourth of July party for his family at the house each year.



ABSTRACT/SUMMARY COMMENTS:

The Richard and Mettie Ealy House is locally significant as an example of the distinctive mixed-masonry craftsmanship of Silas Owens, Sr. Built in 1942, this Mediterranean-influenced house displays many features typical of Owens's work. The facades are rough-faced stone laid in a herringbone pattern, and the window and door surrounds and faux quoins are made of cream-colored brick. The house also features a large porch with a double-arched entry. Today, the house reflects the architectural history of Faulkner County and retains integrity from its period of significance.




