#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated on the corner of Washington and Second Streets and within one block of the Obion County Courthouse and City Hall, the Post Office building is an excellent interpretation of Georgian Revival with classical details.

The building is constructed of red brick with twelve over twelve double hung sash windows. Concrete has been used as an accent in window sills, keystones and the raised foundation. The flat roof is encircled with a concrete balustrade and highlighted with a white cupola surrounded by a black iron railing. In the background is a brick chimney stack.

When first built in 1913, the Post Office was rectangular and contained one story, basement and mezzanine. Due to the increasing need for additional space to accommodate expanding postal operations, a wing was added and workroom enlarged in 1965. The one-story brick wing and expansion does not match the slope of the roofline as the excess space was considered unnecessary at the time of construction. However, the addition is compatible with the original facade. It carries over the theme of double hung sash windows with keystones and concrete cornice.

Rising one and a half stories, the Central Pavillion dominates the main facade. Approached by a concrete flight of steps, six concrete columns of the Ionic order support the entablature of metophes and triglyphs. Directly above tne entablature is a modillioned cornice which encircles the portico. On either side of the entrance is an arched window with brick voussours and concrete keystones. The front entrance is accentuated with an arched transom above the door and framed with concrete voussours.

On the mezzanine level, there are two windows, both double hung sash with concrete sills, wood surrounds and concrete keystones. Three rectangular marble panels inset into the brick facade are located directly above the two arched windows and doorway. Above the modillioned cornice is a concrete balustrade punctuated with rectangular openings containing rows of spindle-shaped balusters. Each of these openings is aligned with the windows in each bay.

Approximately 7,500 square feet was added in 1965. Interior renovations include installation of modern entrance doors, and interior customer lobby doors and carpet in Postmaster's office. Except for the doors, the lobby area has more or less been virtually retained. The marble wainscotting with marble border, terrazzo floors, plaster walls and high plaster ceilings have been well preserved. Except for being battered and knocked by mail carts, the plaster walls in the workroom are in fair condition also. The old boiler room is now used for storage. The central heating and air system installed in 1965 replaced the outdated steam system. Oak wainscotting and chair rails are prevalent throughout the building. The floors have been converted to vinyl tile and bathrooms display old towel bars, marble lined walls and toilet equipment that is still intact and retains the old flavor of the early 1900's.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Completed in 1913 under the supervision of Supervising Architect, James Knox Taylor, who served from 1897 to 1912, and constructed by George W. Stiles Construction Company, the Union City, Tennessee Post Office is significant in several respects. Architecturally, the building illustrates how Mr. Taylor, who subscribed to classical styles of architecture for government buildings, incorporated the details and idealism of contemporary national trends into local prominence.

The Post Office building was designed during a period when architectural individualism was strongly emphasized. James Knox Taylor believed that, "Government buildings are essentially single propositions - that is, they are not similar; there is no similarity between them and other constructions. Each is individual in itself." This view, implying a firm resistance to the notion that designs for public buildings could be standardized set the period of Taylor's tenure apart from succeeding years. It was also the first building in Union City to contain revolving doors and terrazzo floors.

Representing an excellent impression of Georgian Revival, the well-proportioned symmetrical facade and classical details are not to be found in any secular building in Union City or Obion County, Tennessee. It is also significant to note that Mr. Taylor's buildings were generally the most important of local buildings, and taken together, were seen daily by thousands who had little opportunity to feel the influence of the great architectural works in the large cities.

The Union City Post Office building is one of 335 designed during the period of 1900-1915.
