DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Vulcan is a cast iron statue located in a four and one-half acre park on Red Mountain in Birmingham. The 120,000 pound god of fire and forges is fifty-six feet tall and mounted on a 124 foot tower. Attired in classical dress, holds an uplifted torch in one hand while the other rests on the anvil. The iron which was used in the statue is from Birmingham mines and smelters and varies in thickness from three-fourths to two inches in thickness.

Substantial restoration and preservation were undertaken on the statue and in the park area between 1967 and 1971. Concrete reinforcing rods were extended well into the pedestal and legs and body of the statue. The body was filled to the chest with concrete for additional support. The first red sandstone base constructed in 1939 was sheathed in white marble and Vulcan was recoated with aluminum paint.

Other improvements included a museum section, an air-conditioned observation tower between Vulcan and the top of the pedestal, an elevator to the tower, a separate gift shop-concession building, formal gardens, fountains and landscaped picnic areas.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The statue of Vulcan, created in 1904 by Italian artist Guiseppi Moretti, is Birmingham's most noted landmark. At the time of its dedication in June of that year as Alabama's exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, it was the largest cast iron statue made by man, and presumably, still is.

Under the auspices of Birmingham's Commercial Club, Moretti, a New York based artist was chosen for the task in 1903. He was well known at this time for his work for the Vanderbilt family as well as his statues in Schenely Park in Philadelphia, those at Gettysburg Battlefield, and one at the Kentucky state capitol. The statue was cast from iron mined and smelted in the Birmingham area to represent the city's industry and was shipped to the World's Fair in sections over several months. Despite a glorious dedication on June 7, 1904, noting that its size surpassed that of a 1,000 year old Buddha in Japan, the huge iron man failed to retain its initial prestige and was dumped on the side of Red Mountain after the fair while citizens debated on a site for the statue. In 1906 Vulcan was reassembled in the midst of the Alabama State Fairgrounds south of Birmingham and remained there for thirty years.

Community interest and agitation began in 1935 to move Vulcan to a more impressive and dignified location such as Red Mountain. With the assistance of the Works Project Administration the statue was removed from the Fiargrounds in 1936, but was not reassembled until 1939. A park site was donated on Red Mountain by United States Steel to enhance Vulcan's location there. The entire project was completed at a cost of \$44,062, \$38,874 of which was WPA financed.

Between 1967 and 1971 the statue underwent substantial restoration and reinforcement and the park facilities were expanded through a publicly voted bond issue. These improvements have made one of Birmingham's most famous landmarks easily accessible to visitors.
