DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Casa Grande Stone Church stands near the northeast corner of Florence Blvd. and Park Avenue. Joined to the Sunday School building, it forms an L on the north and east sides of the lawn (90' \times 70') on the corner. The building, which has a full raised basement, is 4' from the sidewalk on the south side and 5' on the east. On the north side it is flush with the Sunday School complex.

The rectangular one-story building has walls of local fieldstone and a gabled roof of red tile. On the southwest corner of the building, there is a cement portch with stone arches and an arched doorway with double doors leading to a projecting vestibule. Stepped gables over the entry and vestibule are at right angles to the main roof. Over the vestibule is an octagonal belfry with a copper dome. The east and west sides of the building are broken by stone buttresses and three-over-one double-hung windows with flat arches. The south end of the building, facing the street, has a curved parapet and a stained glass window with a belled arch.

The church is approximately 70' x 40' with a 24' wide vestibule projecting 10' from the southwest corner. The sanctuary has a 15' ceiling and retains the original pews and black metal light fixtures. Composition paneling was added in the early 1950s. The basement was used for Sunday School classes, meetings, and social occasions. It also contained the church offices which, during the mortuary period, were converted to one-bedroom apartment. The building was refrigerated in the 1950s without altering the exterior.

The Sunday School building, or Fellowship Hall $(130' \times 40')$, forms an L with the church and was constructed of cement blocks in 1952. The entire complex is now being converted for use as a museum, as shown in the accompanying sketch. The sanctuary will be used for meetings and special programs.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Casa Grande Stone Church is one of four large cobble buildings constructed in Casa Grande. The pueblo style Casa Grande Woman's Club building across the street is on the State Register of Historic Places. The armory building, about two blocks away, is being demolished. There is also an apartment building. Architecturally, the church is probably the most distinguished. All of the buildings resulted from the need to use inexpensive local materials and from the availability of a skilled local stonemason.

The community of Casa Grande was named in 1879 and was at that time the nearest settlement to what is now Casa Grande Ruins National Monument. In 1879, the Southern Pacific Railroad was being constructed across Arizona and reached Casa Grande in late May. At that time, the town had 22 stores and saloons, reflecting the temporary boom of railroad construction.

The town economy was based on agriculture and its position as a shipping point for mines in the area. In 1882, it had a population of 180 and a handful of business establishments. Many of the residents lived in tent houses and the commercial structures were not much more substantial. However, a fire in 1893 destroyed the business section. Although this catastrophe occurred in the midst of a mining depression, the merchants gradually rebuilt and many of the older brick buildings date from this period.

By 1894, there were enough local Protestants to form a congregation and they were served for the next three years by a Presbyterian licentiate. Since the Endeavor Church, as it was called, was the first (and for many years the only) Protestant church in Casa Grande, it was ecumenical in nature. This was the eleventh Presbyterian congregation organized in Arizona Territory. The town then had a population of about 350 and it continued as a small trading center on the railroad with emphasis on mining, freighting, and irrigation agriculture.

The congregation, like the town, grew slowly and steadily. A small frame church was constructed on the corner of First Avenue and Florence Street and in 1898, a resident minister came and lived in a tent house next to the church. As attendance increased, two tent houses for the Sunday School were added.

In 1920, plans were made to build a manse and a sanctuary at a location which was then on the edge of town and the Presbyterian Home Mission Board was appealed to for financial help. By this time, there were other Protestant churches in the community and the town itself was in the midst of a brief building boom, adding several commercial structures and a high school.

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In 1925, the congregation had 82 members and pledged \$6,707 for the building fund. A loan was received from the Home Mission Board and the manse was built that year. The following year, a contract was let for the sanctuary and ground was broken on March 13th. The church was designed by Architect Robert Orr of Los Angeles and constructed by Mike Sullivan, a Catholic stonemason, who built several residences and commercial buildings in Casa Grande. In 1924, he built the cobble Casa Grande Woman's Club Building across the street, following the design of Tucson architect Henry Jaasted. First services in the new church were held on Christmas Day 1927.

The town continued to grow steadily, especially after the construction of Coolidge Dam in 1929 which irrigated 100,000 acres in the fertile Casa Grande Valley with its 275-day growing season. After World War II, Casa Grande shared in the statewide population boom and the Presbyterian congregation was forced to expand its facilities.

Between 1946 and 1956, more seating was added in the sanctuary, and more classrooms in the basement. A new manse was built and the old one was used for Sunday School and nursery purposes. A large Sunday School building was added in 1952. The sanctuary also acquired an electric organ, with chimes, and a stained glass window. Even these additions could not keep up with the growing congregation and by 1965, it was decided to move to a donated five-acre lot north of town. The expense of expansion at the old site and the lack of parking space made the new location a necessity. The stone church was abandoned in 1969 and acquired by a mortuary firm.

The central location of the stone church, its attractive and distinctive architecture, and the affection which many local people had for it caused it to be considered for a museum. In 1977, it was acquired by the Casa Grande Valley Historical Society for \$125,000 which must be paid in three years. The building is now being refurbished for use as a museum and is expected to open in February. There will be no basic alterations to the building, since it is structurally sound and its original character is regarded as one of its greatest assets.




