Firemen's Hall is located on the north side of Mill Street, just west of Second Street in Cannon Falls.		<b>Local</b> <input checked="" type="checkbox"/>
It is a small limestone building, measuring 24 by 35 feet and two stories tall. Its facade is three bays wide, with three tall, narrow, segmental-arched windows on the second floor. On the first floor, there is a segmental-arched window in the east-side bay and a wooden door with a segmental-arched transom over it in the west-side bay. Each of these segmental arches has a projecting stone hood. In the central bay of the first floor was once a large segmental-arched entry, wide enough to accommodate horse-drawn fire equipment. It has since been filled in, with two panels of glass brick framing a door surmounted by a flat transom. The roof of the Hall is nearly flat, sloping up to a short false front, with a decorative raised pediment and a recessed panel in the center.		<b>State</b> _____

Firemen's Hall is a well-preserved example of community response to one of the gravest threats facing a town, that of fire.		<b>Primary</b> <u>Public Utilities</u>
Like most of the towns in southeastern Minnesota, early Cannon Falls was periodically ravaged by fires. In 1884 and especially in 1887, the town's business district was almost completely devastated. As a result of this last disaster, the village council moved to buy more sophisticated fire fighting equipment. To house this apparatus and to provide a meeting place for the volunteer hose companies, the council, in 1888, spent \$1350 in erecting Firemen's Hall.		<b>Secondary</b> <u>Education</u>
Firemen's Hall served its original purpose until 1946, when the Fire Department moved to larger quarters. After several years use as a body shop, the hall was taken over, in 1953, by the Cannon Falls Library. It has lain vacant since 1976, when the Library also moved to larger and more modern quarters. There is now some talk in the community of converting Firemen's Hall into an historical museum.		<b>Other</b> _____
