Describe present and historic physical appearance.

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Situated on a shaded corner lot, the Amy A. Davis House is a vernacular adaptation of the Queen Anne style of architecture. The two-and-one-half story wood frame dwelling rests on a stone foundation. It is sheathed with shake shingles and clapboard siding and is capped with a gable asphalt shingle roof. A small dormer projects from the roof line on the front facade. A tower with a conical roof rises from the northeast corner (front) of the house. Rising from near the center of the roof is a tall, thin brick chimney.

Floor divisions are marked with slight flairs supported by brackets. Fenestration is irregular and asymmetrical. On most facades, multipaned, double sash windows with plain wood surrounds are set into slightly-recessed Gothic arches. A large rectangular window with a Gothic arch transom is located in the center of the west (side) facade. Some of the windows include leaded-glass panes. Brick steps lead to the front entrance, which is recessed within a Gothic arch.

On the southeast corner (rear) is a small modern wood frame addition with a shed roof.

A modern two-car garage (non-contributing) is located to the south of the dwelling.

9. Major Bibliographical References

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Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Amy A. Davis House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a relatively unaltered example of the late Queen Anne style as was popular in Watertown, South Dakota, at the turn of the century. Built for early city resident Amy Davis, it exemplifies Queen Anne stylistic dispositions with its asymmetry of facade and roof line, its tower, irregular fenestration, and multiplicity of siding material. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the following historic context: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, D. Urban Settlement, 2. Residential living.

The Davis property was part of an unplatted piece of property in Section 30-117-52 until 1900 when Frank L. Bramble, County Auditor, filed the Auditor's Plat. According to deed records, Amy A. (Mrs. Roy A.) Davis purchased the property in 1901. The Davis family constructed the home that year. Eventually, O. M. Kirlin purchased the property. Kirlin, along with W. J. Gray, was granted an electric franchise by the City of Watertown in 1898. He later became a bookkeeper for the Hess and Rau Heating and Plumbing firm in Watertown.

The period of significance for the nominated property does not extend beyond its date of construction in 1901.
