SUMMARY

The Sonoran District of Douglas, located southwest of the central business district, is composed of several blocks of contiguous flush-fronted, single story, Sonoran tradition row buildings built between 1901 and 1935. Although some buildings are constructed of adobe and brick, it is the locally produced gypsum cast-stone employed in the majority of constructions and the uniformity of design that give the district its unique character. Douglas boasts the largest currently known concentration of cast-stone buildings in the state. There are twenty-one buildings in the district; seventeen are contributors, while four are noncontributors. The buildings are in fair to good condition. Some have been slightly altered with window changes, rear additions, and new stucco.

DESCRIPTION

District Characteristics


The district is composed of buildings along the west side of H Avenue from Sixth Street on the south to the alley between Eighth and Ninth Streets on the north. The curb line of H Avenue provides the eastern boundary of the district. The western edge is located toward the middle of several blocks along the western property line of contributing properties. This area contains the only remaining significant concentration of Sonoran style buildings in Douglas. The district possesses a continuity of buildings united by a similar architectural style.

To the north of the district, the area changes rapidly with modern buildings ringing the governmental and civic center of Douglas where municipal buildings are located. To the east, the character of the area outside the district shifts toward newer residential buildings that, in turn, give way to commercial structures along G Avenue, the central business thoroughfare of Douglas. South of the district, the area beyond the boundary is composed of modern residential buildings with commercial and government buildings along the international boundary with Mexico. To the west, the area outside the district boundary contains vacant land along Pan American Avenue leading to the border crossing into Agua Prieta, Mexico.

Sidewalks are not common in this district. Because building forms are set directly at the front property line, there is insufficient space for developed landscapes. However, there are street trees along Sixth Street. H Avenue has trees planted in the extended roadway, recalling the early streetscape character of traditional Sonoran Barrios. Streets in the district conform to a grid plan.

Sonoran Style Characteristics

The buildings in the Douglas Sonoran District are typical Sonoran tradition row buildings once common in the southern portion of the state and in the northern Mexican state of Sonora. The buildings do not follow a standard architectural style, but are best understood as vernacular representatives of the Sonoran building tradition once common in the area. This tradition has been the subject of scholarly study in Arizona by architect Harris Sobin and is examined at length in his book Florence Townsite, A.T. (Final Report of the Florence Townsite Historic District Study). In contrast to Florence, the uniqueness of the Douglas Sonoran District lies in its abundance of gypsum cast-stone units utilized for construction. The Sonoran rowhouse tradition is also evident in Tucson's Barrio Historico, but in that case, adobe is the primary material.

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The basic characteristics of the Sonoran row building are a flat roof, wall parapet, and no street setback. The parapet is often topped with a cap row of brick or block. These flush-fronted structures are set contiguous on the front property line. Facades are composed of alternating rhythm of windows and doors, reflecting the interior composition of small units. Wood frames, sash, and doors are common. Doors are often topped with transoms. Simplified brick detailing appears on some buildings. Concrete or cast-stone lintels and sills are common. While projecting porches were once common, especially along Sixth Street and at the corner of H Avenue and Eighth Street, only a few buildings retain these features today (732-734 H Avenue, 409-08-153; 357-359 Eighth Street, 409-08-153B; and 353-355 Eighth Street, 409-08-153A).

Locally produced gypsum cast-stone units were used in construction in the vast majority of the buildings. For contributing buildings, twelve are constructed of cast-stone, three are constructed of brick, and two are constructed of adobe. Douglas boasts the largest known concentration of cast-stone buildings in the state. Entire ranges of buildings in the Sonoran District were constructed in cast-stone. In some cases, the cast-stone served as a facing for traditional adobe construction. Also in the district are a few brick faced translations of the traditional Sonoran building. An unusual feature in this district of uniform, anonymous facades is the building at 349 Seventh Street, #409-08-135, which boasts a brick facade with a dominant Palladian motif. From all appearances, this detail was integral to the original construction. It does not appear to be a later addition.


The cast-stone bricks were manufactured locally by the Arizona Gypsum Plaster Co. The block units were formed with gypsum extracted from Arizona's only gypsum mine, situated north of Douglas. The softness of the gypsum block meant that the property owners customarily painted the material. Cast stone remained a popular building material until the late 1930's when the manufacturing plant closed its operations.

INTEGRITY

While the area containing Sonoran buildings in Douglas was once larger, it was not appreciably so. The Sonoran area of Douglas has suffered some from erosion of historic fabric, demolition, and infill construction. Nonetheless, the historic district closely follows and accurately conveys the historic extent of these buildings in the city. The district boundaries were carefully drawn to include only those buildings that were good examples of the Sonoran style and the area that still conveyed a sense of a discreet district. During the period from when the survey was completed and the final nomination prepared, two buildings were demolished. This necessitated a revision of the district boundary to delete these properties from the final district boundary.

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While some adjacent properties have been left out of the district because their integrity has been compromised due to loss of historic fabric, those that remain are the only intact examples of Sonoran buildings in Douglas and are representative of the few other examples remaining in the state. Contributing properties in the district were selected on the basis of the uncompromised presence of the distinct Sonoran characteristics described in the section covering architectural description. Some of the buildings have undergone minor facade renovation, including replacement windows, combinations of window and door units, and blocking in of openings. Some buildings have been stuccoed or painted. Despite these few changes, the distinctive character of the buildings and district is still very evident.





Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

The Douglas Sonoran District is eligible under National Register criterion "c" for architecture, as a district comprised of a significant concentration of traditional Sonoran style architectural forms constructed with twentieth century building materials. The period of significance dates from 1901 to 1935. This era corresponds to the period of major historic growth for the town of Douglas.

CONTEXT OF HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT

The establishment of Douglas as a commercial and transportation center is a direct consequence of the location of the Phelps-Dodge Company mines. Dr. James Douglas intended to construct a rail line to connect Phelps-Dodge mines at Bisbee in Arizona and at Nacozari in the Mexican state of Sonora. A location roughly between the two mines, along the international border on the U.S. side in the Sulphur Springs Valley, passed several selection criteria: water was sufficient, the border location facilitated receiving of ore from Mexico, and it was downgrade from both Bisbee and Nacozari which made shipping the heavy ore easier. For similar reasons, the Calumet and Arizona Mining Company, owner of the highly successful "Irish Mag" mine in Bisbee, decided to build a smelter in the same location and brought it into production ahead of the Phelps-Dodge Copper Queen smelter.

After the two smelter locations were laid out, mining officials incorporated two separate land development companies which, after some initial fighting over procedure, decided to combine forces to build the town of Douglas on a regular grid plan. In February, 1901, townsite lots began selling for between \$25 and \$250. In 1901 the railroad arrived, and the first depot was constructed at the site of the present YMCA building on Pan American Avenue. By April of 1902, the land development companies completed business totalling over \$750,000.

The greatest growth in Douglas occurred between its founding in 1901 and the end of the copper boom in 1930. During this period, an extensive downtown commercial district and residential area developed. In 1912, when the Territory of Arizona became the 48th state, Cochise County had the largest population of any county in the state and the town of Douglas was the largest city. The value of metals produced in Cochise County that year topped \$26,500,000. In 1913 the population of Douglas was listed as 13,672. Douglas was the gateway to two republics, the United States and Mexico, and served as a clearinghouse and commercial center for trade between the two nations.

The peak of population in Douglas came in 1917 when 17,875 people lived there. In 1918 the Copper Queen smelter employed 1,600 men, the Calumet and Arizona smelter employed 700, and the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad 600. The boom continued through the end of World War I, but by 1920 a recession hit the copper industry and both smelters closed for nine months in 1921. The economy did see an upturn in the latter part of the 1920's, but the crash of 1929 brought this to an end.



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Several Lebanese families arrived with the first settlers of the town. They established themselves in the area near Ninth Street and H Avenue, operating wholesale grocery, produce and feed businesses. Situated between the Mexican, Anglo, red light, and business districts, the Arabic-speaking Lebanese quickly learned both Spanish and English. Their H Avenue neighborhood area evolved into one of the few integrated neighborhoods in Douglas.

People of the H Avenue neighborhood lived in small houses and flats. The densely crowded area supported the numerous small businesses. Grocery stores proliferated. Many of the groceries operated out of the corner rooms of apartment buildings or Sonoran row houses. These flats, built since the inception of the town, provided convenient, cheap housing for Douglas laborers. Speculators built them to accommodate the thousands of single men who were attracted to Douglas by its industrial boom. Builders, assured of finding tenants, constructed numerous flats in the area between the railroad tracks, international border, and G Avenue.

Douglas developed as a boom town and had a mining camp atmosphere. Many businesses blossomed in Douglas which catered to the large numbers of single men who built the town and worked in the smelters and railroad yards. In 1905, seventy-five saloons in the central business district seemed enough and residents attempted to reduce the number of licenses issued for bars and pool halls. Opponents of the suggested restriction were so indignant that they wanted to dissolve the city's incorporation charter and reincorporate. Although after 1905, pool halls could remain open only from 6:00 a.m. to midnight, the opponents of such vices met with little success in eradicating them. Twenty-seven billiard parlors remain listed in the 1917 city directory. The same city directory lists forty-three establishments offering "furnished rooms."

A red light district developed. Old-timers estimate that as many as two hundred prostitutes may have worked on Sixth Street. Respectable residents of the town saw to it that these activities were strictly limited to a small area of town south of Sixth Street and west of H Avenue. As the area's reputation became well known, residents east of G Avenue and Sixth Street became increasingly embarrassed. By 1914, they had changed the street name from Sixth Street to Greene Street. The women lived in flats or row houses, several to an apartment, and apparently were fairly well organized under different madams and gentlemen. A 1917 city ordinance (#177) had nine sections which strictly prohibited prostitution, solicitation for prostitution, or transportation to a brothel. The ordinance enabled city police to limit the area in which prostitutes worked and to restrict methods of solicitation. Prostitutes were rounded up on a bi-monthly basis, hauled into city court, and fined. According to the Douglas Dispatch (February 9, 1936), red lights were mandatory on all houses of prostitution.

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Although the Sixth Street prostitutes included women of every racial and ethnic background, a large number of Negro women began working in the district after several units of "all colored" troops were stationed at Camp Harry J. Jones. One of these "ladies of the night" became very wealthy and was well known in Douglas for more than thirty years. "Maudie" eventually owned properties all over town. In her function as a landlady, she made frequent purchases in Douglas business establishments. Not believing in banks, she always paid cash, which she carried rolled into her stockings. When the Douglas family moved away, she purchased their Cadillac and kept it conspicuously parked in front of her hotel. Another well-known lady of the night, "Roxie," resided at 307 Sixth Street. Old-timers remember her as a tiny woman, well liked for her kindness and generosity in spite of her trade.


The boom years in Douglas have left a rich architectural and historical legacy. Few changes have impacted the integrity of the significant historic buildings in the city since the copper boom passed. As a result, many historic properties in Douglas have been listed on the National Register of Historic Places. These include: Douglas Municipal Airport (NR 12-30-75), Gadsden Hotel (NR 7-30-76), Grand Theatre (NR 7-30-76), El Paso and Southwestern Railroad YMCA (NR 3-1-84), Douglas Historic District (NR 1-31-85), Douglas Post Office and Customs House (NR 12-3-85), and the Douglas Residential Historic District (7-31-86).

The context of historical development in Douglas is discussed extensively in the documentation for these seven National Register nominations. However, none of these previous nominations concentrate on the significance of modest-income worker's housing which is characteristic of the Douglas Sonoran Historic District. Although cast-stone construction buildings are found in the Douglas Residential Historic District, there are no other examples of Sonoran tradition row houses recognized by historic designation in Douglas.

Anonymity of the architecture is characteristic of the Sonoran building tradition. There are no architects or builders of record for this area. This section of town has received very little documentation over the years. For this reason, the district does not fit stereotypical conceptions of what might be perceived as "historic" in traditional treatments. However, an understanding of the social and architectural background of the Douglas Sonoran District is essential to a complete picture of life in this important smelter town.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Douglas Sonoran Historic District is comprised of several blocks of Sonoran style row buildings. The majority of buildings are constructed of locally cast gypsum block, which is a unique combination of an earlier traditional building form with a twentieth century building material. Cast gypsum block was produced in Douglas and the city has the largest concentration of cast stone buildings in the state. This unique type of architecture is significant as a type and method of construction. The use of cast stone to build Sonoran row

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houses is not found elsewhere in the state. The architecture forms a district with a discrete identity.

The evolution of the Sonoran tradition in Douglas has its roots in the cultural history of the southwest, the local area's housing needs, and the range of materials available. The Hispanic cultural heritage of adobe construction was closely followed in the district because of its proximity to Mexico and the large ethnic population. Douglas was a company town, started from scratch to support the smelter west of town, and housing needs were immediate. The Sonoran tradition buildings lent themselves easily to quick construction. During the World War I copper boom, more row houses were built than at any other period. The availability of cheap gypsum blocks was a strong determining factor in the appearance of the district. The blocks also lent themselves to the need for quick construction in a rapidly expanding area.


In the United States the Sonoran style is exclusively an expression of the Southwest and is an extension of Spanish Colonial architecture of Mexico. The term Sonoran is employed for identification because buildings of this general form and technology are found through the communities of Sonora, the northernmost state of Mexico. This building form was quite common in southern Arizona borderlands during the Territorial Period. The Sonoran tradition has been the subject of scholarly study in Arizona by Architect Harris Sobin and is examined at length in his book Florence Townsite, A.T. (Final Report of the Florence Townsite Historic District Study). In contrast to Florence, the significance of the Douglas Sonoran District lies in its abundance of gypsum cast-stone units utilized for construction. The Sonoran rowhouse tradition is also evident in Tucson's Barrio Historico, but in that case, adobe is the primary material.

In Douglas, the Sonoran quarter yields to the discipline of the rectangular grid of the 1901 town plan. The buildings are an appropriate urban expression in their direct relationship to the street. Private and common areas were located to the rear of the property. This site utilization contrasts sharply with the traditional "suburban" development found in the rest of the community, where large set-backs are common.

The uniqueness of Douglas' Sonoran District lies in its translation of traditional Sonoran forms with early twentieth century materials. Arizona's only known gypsum mine was located just north of the city, and a plant to manufacture the units was constructed to the northwest of this particular district in 1900. Due to its availability and convenience, this material was readily utilized for local construction. During Douglas' depression years of the 1930's, the manufacturing plant ceased operations and the use of this material was discontinued.



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

Beginning at the northeast corner of tax parcel 409-07-032 at the intersection of the alley between 8th and 9th Streets with H Avenue, then following the west curbline of H Avenue 1,150 feet south to the intersection with the alley between 6th Street and 5th Street, then turning west and following the north curbline of said alley 200 feet west to the western property line of tax parcel 409-08-059, then turning north and following said west property line 225 feet north to the north curbline of Green Street (6th Street), then turning west and following the north curbline of Green Street 50 feet west to the western property line of tax parcel 409-08-125, then following said western property line 150 feet north to the south curbline of the alley between 6th and 7th Streets, then turning east and following the south curbline of said alley 200 feet east to the western property line of tax parcel 409-08-135, then turning north and following said western property line 150 feet north to the south curbline of 7th Street, then turning east and following the south curbline of 7th Street 50 feet east to the projected east property line of tax parcel 409-08-138B, then following said projected east property line 285 feet north to the north curbline of the alley between 7th and 8th Streets, then turning west and following said north alley curbline 150 feet west to the western property line of tax parcel 409-08-152, then following said western property line 150 feet north to the south curbline of 8th Street, then turning east and following the south curbline of 8th Street 150 feet east to the projected eastern property line of tax parcel 409-08-032 then following said projected western property line 225 feet north to the south curbline of the alley between 8th and 9th Streets, then turning east and following said south alley curbline 50 feet to the point of beginning.
