This is a two storied house of the early California "Bungalow" style, with a cedar shingle siding and roof. There is a massive clinker brick and river-stone chimney on the west side, and at its base the large river-stones extend beyond the house into the garden. This same treatment, of oriental origin, and typical of the Greenes' work, is used in the foundation at the front of the house. The basement is exposed at the rear where the property slopes down, making a thrid floor structure at the rear. The second floor projects over the first floor on the front, with wide overhanging eaves on all sides.

There is a skylight of opaque colored "art" glass over the stairway hall. The plan of the interior is free-flowing with wide openings into the rooms. A wide nine-inch wood banding at the ceiling circles the living room. The tile fireplace with figurehead brackets of fiddlers was quite probably the work of Batchelder, whose tiles were used in many of the Greenes' houses, and who was, next to the Greenes, the most important person in arts and crafts of this period in California.

The front door and a sliding door in the hall are paneled, but quite probably had inserts of colored leaded "art" glass panes, shown in the architects' drawing of the front door, for the upper hall landing door has the leaded colored "art" glass. A door of the same design in the dining room is of clear glass.

The dining room has a high wainscote. The floors are quarter-sawed oak. There are custom made sash and doors throughout the house.

At the front, the Japanese influence shows in the foundation work, where rocks extend out into the garden, and where the front porch posts rest on selected river-stones in the Japanese manner. There is a hanging front porch lantern of Japanese design with colored "art" glass.

The sun porch at the rear has been enclosed (where it is remembered Mrs. Garfield enjoyed relaxing on a porch swing.) The architects' drawing shows another chimney, the wall of which can be seen in the basement, but it has been walled over in the interior of the first and second floors. Alterations between 1904 and 1908 were quite probably made by the Greenes. These include: addition of the East wing, the sun porch on the South, alterations to the second fireplace, and changes in the windows at the South end of the living room and the windows on the front. Also, a flat roof was built over the front entrance in place of the pitched roof on the architects' drawing.

There have been no significant alterations since 1908 except the modernization of the kitchen and addition of a bath and bookcases. The garage has been moved forward the length of the garage.
