19. History Edward Stuart's father's family came from North Carolina, mother's from VA. Shendandoah Valley. Born near Antioch Church in 1828; 1848 came to Fairview to study medicine with Dr. H. W. Darnell; completed degree 1857. Began practice in Crofton. 1877 married Jane Vaughn, daughter of Hiram Vaughn (merchants of Fairview). 2 children. Erected Jennie Stuart Hospital in memory of his wife. President Bank of Hopkinsville. (see Ch-H-20).			35. Organization KHC																											
20. Significance Fairview, once called Davisburg, grew along either side of Highway 68, which was a major Indian trail leading from the Cumberland to the Ohio River. It's form, called a Stringtown, is linear with a small commercial district located opposite the Jefferson Davis monument. Significance (cont.)

Shanklin. Bethel Baptist Church was organized in 1816, and by the 1840s there was a movement to formally establish a town, which in 1847 was surveyed. By 1900 the town reached its zenith and even had its own newspaper, the Fairview Review edited by W. B. Brewer. Today, two houses are associated with noted townsmen Ch-56, the Vaughn House, the home of leading Fairview merchants, and Ch-58, the home of Dr. Stuart, president of the Bank of Hopkinsville and benefactor of the Jennie Stuart hospital.

The Vaughn House holds an important visual location in the town. Its long facade, with unusually widely spaced bays and a three part front porch, is a visual as well as historical landmark in Fairview. The left two bays are the front of the original log house. The Dr. Edward S. Stuart House consists of a two-story, three-bay, side passage plan frame house added to an earlier story-and-a-half Gothic Revival cottage, now the ell of the main block.
