Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Frederick Miller House is a two-story frame double cell house with a prominent central cut stone chimney built ca. 1850. The house is the only example of this type of design in Hopkins County. The house is sited on a hill overlooking Drake's Creek to the west. No outbuildings from its period of significance remain standing.

On the main (west) facade are two entrances, both of which display original two paneled doors, one of which has been turned upside down. Windows appear to be both original and replacement six-over-six sash design with the original windows pegged while replacements are ca. 1930 standard construction. The house has a gable roof of metal standing seam, weatherboard siding and a stone and concrete block foundation. At the rear of the house is a one-story frame ell. This ell may be have originally been a detached kitchen and appear to have been connected with the house in the late 19th century. This rear ell also has a metal standing seam roof, ca. 1920 doors and a prominent exterior end stone chimney. The stonework on both chimneys are similar but the chimney on the ell has several brick courses extending the height of the chimney. Engaged porches on both facades of the ell were added ca. 1920 and have square posts.

The interior of the house retains an original mantle of simple Greek Revival influence in the south room of the main block's first floor. Adjacent to the fireplace is an original door which leads to a narrow enclosed staircase connecting the two floors. On the second story no fireplace openings are extant and appear to have been enclosed. Some remodeling has occurred to the interior including new wall paneling and ceiling tile. At the rear of the house is a one-story frame ca. 1900 gable roof shed which is non-contributing.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Frederick Miller house is a significant example of a two-story frame, double cell, residence of the mid-19th century. The house is the only located example of this form and plan in Hopkins County. It is also one of the few early 19th century frame residences to survive to the present. Except for replacement sheathing of interior walls and ceilings, the house has not been altered.

Frederick Miller purchased land along Drakes Creek in 1847 and he constructed this two-story residence with detached kitchen soon after. The Miller family constructed a grist mill about this time on neighboring Drakes Creek. The 1850 census lists Jacob Miller's occupation as a miller and in 1853, he took title of the property from Frederick Miller. It is assumed that they were either brothers or father and son but no definite relationship has been discovered. The mill was later run by Stephen Miller in the late 19th century. No remains of this mill are extant. The Miller family continued to own the house and mill until 1903. Since then the house has changed hands several times but alterations have been minimal. The house was vacated in recent decades and is presently used for storage.



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Verbal Boundary Description: The location for the Frederick Miller House is illustrated on accompanying Hopkins County tax map 125, lot 30 which is drawn at a scale of 1" = 400' and on the accompanying sketch map. The boundary is an irregular rectangle which measures approximately 400' by 375' and is bounded on the south by U.S. 62, on the west and north by a driveway and on the east by a fence line. The boundary includes a non-contributing shed at the rear of the house.

<u>Verbal Boundary Justification:</u> The boundary for the Frederick Miller House includes the house and adjacent lot which encompasses the house and immediate outbuilding. The house is the only historic property associated with the site. The boundary excludes modern farm buildings to the north and northeast.
