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

The old Tacoma City Hall is a five story masonry structure with a prominent tower on the southeast corner which rises to a height of ten stories. There is a suggestion of a second tower on the northeast corner but it extends not much beyond the corner height of the main structure and has a hipped roof as does the predominant tower. Both are copper sheathed and have acquired a vedigris.

Although built with masonry bearing walls, the building has many windows. Windows are rectangular and of equal size on the second and third stories. The fifth story windows are much smaller and narrower although of the same proportions. The fourth story windows are fully arched.

The original plan called for foundations of rusticated stone but this was replaced by local Wilkeson stone, probably for reasons of economy. Wilkeson sandstone is a light warm gray stone of exceptional durability. The foundations walls are eight feet thick at the base and taper to six feet at street level. The walls themselves are of common red brick faced with yellow Roman brick. The origin of the facing brick is a matter of some conjecture. Some feel it came as ballast from China or Belgium. Others say it was imported from Italy. Although visually appearing as part of a single structure the square tower is actually a freestanding masonry mass. There is a clock on each face.

The building is a trapezoid in plan and strongly reflects the Italian Villa style. Small round windows appear below the corner line; three large round windows occur below the corner on the tower. Heavy brackets are installed above the corner and separate narrow rectangular windows on the tower body. A group of three arched windows are situated on each side near the top and a row of small round windows circles the tower between the arched windows and the eave line. Terra cotta decorations embellish the tower and areas of the entablature.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Tacoma was first and foremost a railroad town, the western terminus of the Northern Pacific Railroad. Although surrounded by forests, an unusually large number of the city's civic and economic leaders in the 1880's and 90's were educated in the east or middle west. Attracted by the potential of financial success, they came to the city with pre-established tastes in business and culture and the Old City Hall is an example of those tastes.

The building was designed by the San Francisco firm, Hatherton and McIntosh. Hatherton was the official architect for San Francisco and had designed that municipality's city hall. The old Tacoma City Hall was completed April 23, 1893 at a cost of \$257,965 and was used by the city until 1957.

The upper floors of the tower house a magnificent clock and a set of four bells. The clock is reputed to be one of the finest in the world, and the bells were cast by the McShane Bell Foundry in Baltimore, the same company which, over 100 years earlier, cast the Liberty Bell. The bells consist of 8,000 pounds of silver bell metal, a metal made expecially to resonate. Hugh Wallace of Tacoma, ambassador to France during WWl, gave the bells and chimes for the clock in memory of his daughter on Christmas Day, 1904. The pendulum of the clock, twelve feet in length, is suspended on a single wire, forty feet in length. The mechanism of the clock is run by gravity and the motors are wound electrically. In the early years of the clock's history, a man had to wind a different part of the mechanism every four hours by hand.

The structure is representative of the ebullience of spirit that characterized the city of Tacoma in the late 19th century; it "...seems to combine a romantic feeling for the spirit of fifteenth century Florence with the mercantile spirit of nineteenth century America."
