Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

All walls, interior and exterior, are about 20" thick. The south bay was added on to the original building. Pink rock lean-to on rear north section is rubble stone, south section is cut stone.

Out building, excellent shape structurally. The first three quoins from the ground up are black rock (basalt) on each of the four corners. The next four are pink rock (tuff).

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date:

The house is significant because it is an early black rock (basalt) home that was probably owner-built and occupied. One of the design decisions made by its builder is evident on the front facade. Originally, the home was a one room cabin with two windows and a door on the front facade. While the door and windows were approximately equally spaced, there was no bilateral symmetry. The masonry of this section consists of roughly coursed rubble stone. When the builder made an addition to the south; he designed the whole to have four symmetrical windows and a central door, thus giving the house a much more formal appearance. This same designer (probably Huntington) completed the addition with cut black rock. The lintles above the windows are finished with a motif indicative of a Federalist style and end wall chimneys complete the transformation. Mrs. Roberts, who was born in the house in 1909, says the house is unchanged since before that time.
