This building is presently the college President's residence. It is located on Taylor Avenue. In the past, it was used as officers' quarters particularly for the Commandants of the Fort. It is still maintained and kept in use for faculty staff. There are other such quarters along this street which are used and maintained as this building.

Photograph #1-3



This historical building is located in back of the main Administration building and to the right of it on the corner. It was built in 1867 and served as the laboratory, ward and rooms to enlisted men and NCOs. We obtained this information from the Texas Historical Marker no. 84 on the outside of the building. It is presently being remodeled inside and we don't know the plans for its future use. As mentioned in the narrative, Professor White has made a study of this site.

This building has been converted into the College Art Building. Built in 1856, it was originally the old Commissary of the Fort. After the Battle of Matamoras in 1913, it served as a guard house. A Historical Marker is located next to the door under the porch area seen here. Like the others, this building is in good condition: The wood is in good repair and freshly painted.

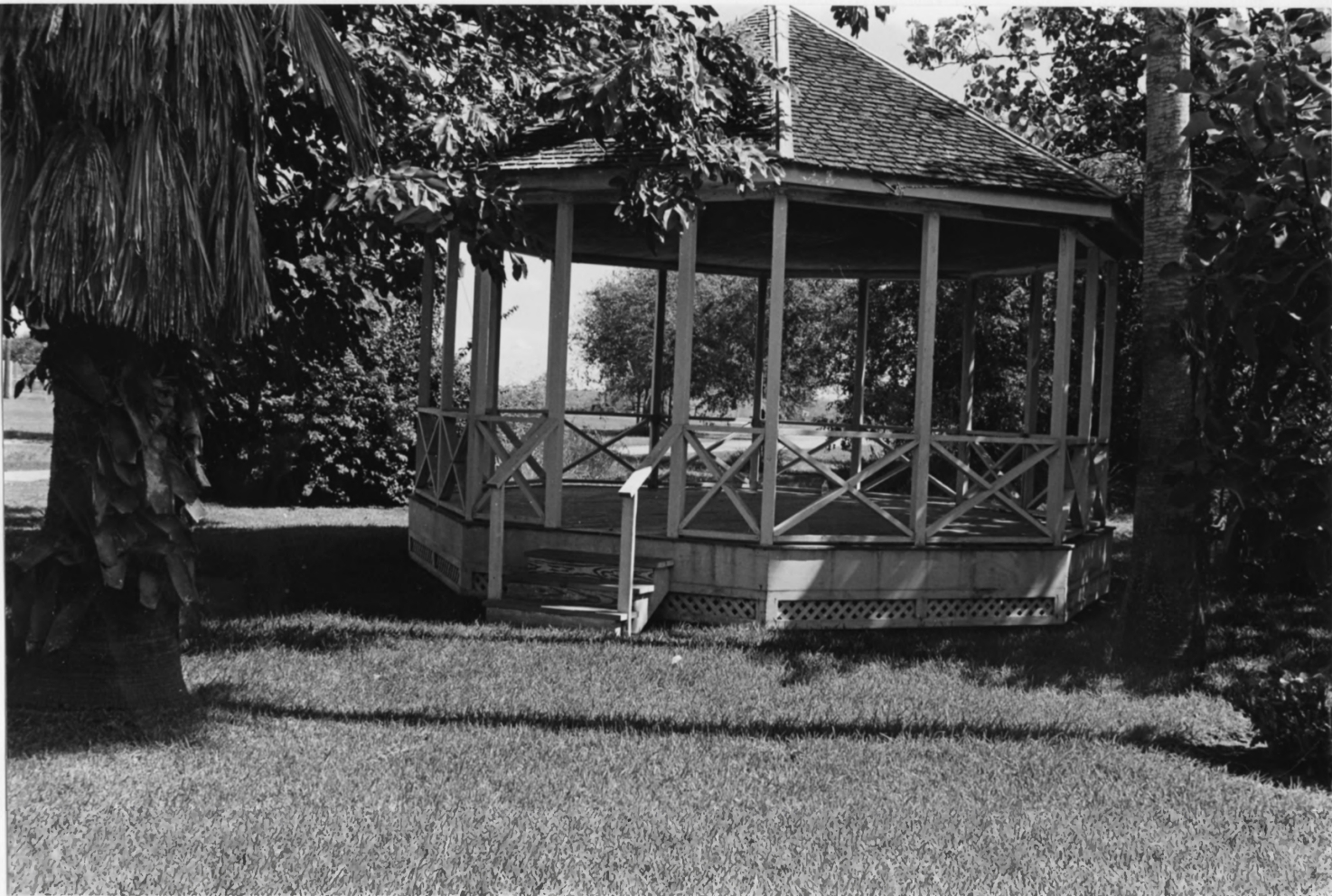

This historical building is located on the grounds of the U.S. Immigration Service adjacent to the International Bridge. It was originally the chapel of the Fort. It was apparently moved inside the fence of the grounds. This whitewashed building is presently the office of the Manager of General Services Administration.
