Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Neville High School (1931) is a three and four story brick Modernistic building located in a park-like setting in suburban Monroe. The only noteworthy alteration is a 1950's gymnasium addition.

The school has a more or less symmetrical plan with a dominant four story central pavilion, three story wings, and three story end pavilions. There is also a rear auditorium wing which is appended to the west side. Each wing has a central hallway and each pavilion has a staircase.

Although Neville is essentially a horizontal building, the following factors give it an almost strident verticality:

- (1) The exterior is articulated with massive piers which terminate above the parapet line.
- (2) The main pavilion features compound piers which step back boldly to encompass the top story.
- (3) Although the main pavilion is only one story higher than the rest of the building, it projects dramatically above the surrounding flat roofscape. This is due to the extra height given the pavilion by its upper crawl space and its crowning hip roof.
- (4) All of the windows and doors are grouped into vertical shafts by buttress-like projections of brick and by spandrel panels set between the stories.
- (5) Each of the end pavilions features a three story brick panel,

The exterior of Neville is clad with red and black brick with concrete trim cast to resemble limestone. The design makes extensive use of stylized corbelling, both atop the piers and in some of the spandrel panels. This gives the building something of a Mesopotamian look. Other spandrel panels have what appear to be stylized papyrus and lotus flowers in relief. Some panels feature ornamental brickwork—for example, groups of headers in a checkerboard pattern. Major portals of the building are set under two center Gothic arches. The entrances to the auditorium are surmounted by cast circular panels containing bas relief dramatic figures.

The interiors are more or less conventional for a period school building and for the most part are not worthy of note. The three exceptions to this are the main lobby, auditorium, and auditorium lobby. These spaces are elaborately styled with multiple corbelled arches, wide fluted panels, and pointed arches.

Assessment of Integrity:

Since construction the only noteworthy change in the building has been the addition of a gymnasium at the southeast corner. It is set to the rear and does not affect the building's massing along its principal elevation. Moreover, the high school's architecturally significant elements remain intact.

NB: The auditorium fly gallery (at the rear) is not styled and may appear to the casual observer to be a later addition. It is not. (Photos 5 and 7)

Neville High School is locally significant in the area of architecture because it is an outstanding example of Modernistic architecture within the context of northeastern Louisiana. (This region includes the parishes of Lincoln, Union, Jackson, Caldwell, Franklin, Richland, Catahoula, Concordia, Tensas, Madison, Ouachita, Morehouse, and East and West Carroll.)

The International Style made virtually no impact in northeastern Louisiana until the 1950's. Hence during the late 1920's and the 1930's, the Modernistic style, exemplified by Neville High School, represented the most advanced taste in the region. Although there is no survey to give exact figures, most towns of any size in the area contain examples of the style. They run the gamut from vaguely Modernistic commercial buildings with their hesitant touches of decorative brick or tile to courthouses and large institutional buildings.

Neville High School is conspicuous among this group for three reasons:

- (1) It is one of the very largest examples of the style in the area.


 This factor, together with its symmetrical front and park-like setting, almost gives Neville the bearing of a Modernistic Versailles.
- (2) Unlike most examples which depend for their effect upon a few select details, Neville features a range of adornment which embraces every aspect of the exterior.
- (3) Neville is rare in that its Modernistic styling includes the use of dramatic massing. Most other examples depend upon ornamentation alone.
