Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Yewell-Snyder House is located on a 222 acre farm in southwestern Oldham County, Kentucky. The house is situated on high ground above the South Fork of Harrods Creek and at the end of a farm road about one mile north of Interstate 71 and approximately .7 mile north of North Hitt Lane.

The nominated site includes only a tract of approximately .4 acre which contains the house and smokehouse. This area is enclosed by a board fence and there are a number of large deciduous trees surrounding the house.

A graveyard is located about 500 feet northeast of the house. It lies on the ridge above the creek and is enclosed by an iron fence. The graves date from the second half of the 19th century. The cemetery is not a part of the nominated site and is separated from it by an expanse of open field.

The main block of the house is a two-story, single-pile brick structure with a stone foundation and Flemish bond brickwork on the front elevation. The five bay facade has two front doors and three windows on the first story and a central door on the second story. There are 9/6 windows with brick jack arches. A one-story front porch, probably added in the late 19th century, was partially removed in the 1970s, leaving only the floor and stone foundation. There are interior chimneys at each gable end and two small windows at each end of the attic. At the rear of the main block is a one-story, one-room brick ell with a frame porch on the east side. Joined to the rear of the ell is a two-story stone house with one interior end chimney. (photos 1,2,3) About 50 feet northeast of the house is a stone and frame smokehouse with a pyramidal roof. The upper part of the structure is shingle-covered and appears to have been altered. (Photo 4)

The main block has two rooms on each story and no hallway. The west room on the first floor contains an enclosed corner stairway, and there are indications in the east room that a similar corner stairway once existed in that room. Vernacular Federal-style mantels and original chair rails in both first floor rooms remain.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Yewell-Snyder House is significant for its architectural form. It is one of four 19th century, two-story brick houses in Oldham County which have a double-cell plan, two front doors, and no center passage. With the exception of The Hermitage (OL-276, National Register 1982), these houses are vernacular structures with simple, unornamented details. The Yewell-Snyder house closely resembles the Reuben Sale house (OL-120, National Register, November 1982) but has the unusual feature of a five-bay facade with a center window between the two front doors. The central door on the second story may have been a modification when the porch (removed ca. 1970s) was added in the later 19th century.

Probably built by Jeremiah Yewell before 1830, the brick house was joined to a two-story stone house already on the site. The stone house may have been built by Jeremiah Yewell or his father, James Yewell. The Yewells came from Culpeper County, Virginia and settled in Nelson County in the 1790s. They first bought land in the far eastern part of Jefferson County in 1808. (Oldham County was created in 1823 out of this part of Jefferson County) After his first wife's death, Jeremiah Yewell was married to Dicey Wilhoite in 1819. Possibly he built the main block of the house soon after this marriage. Tax assessment records, while not conclusive proof, indicate that the value of his land and the number of slaves he owned increased during the early 1820s.

In 1838 Yewell sold his 330 acre farm to John Snyder and apparently moved from Oldham County. The Snyder family and their descendants occupied the farm into the 20th century. The cemetery on the farm contains Snyder graves from the second half of the 19th century.

The Yewell-Snyder house has had few alterations and retains the original Federal-style mantels, corner stairway, and woodwork. The unusual arrangement of two front doors and a central window on the first story contribute to its architectural significance.


