DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Fifth Ward (Monserrat) School is at the northeast corner of Fifth and York Streets. It is a three-story brick structure with recessed, round-arched fenestration on all three floors. The foundation is also brick. A horizontal string course at the spring of the arch unites the rhythm of the arched forms on each floor. A string course underscored by dentils separates the first and second stories. Another string course separates the second and third stories. The third story is topped by an extended cornice underscored by dentils. A slightly projected portion of the main facade, containing the fenestration, is surmounted by a pediment. The window sills on the second and third stories appear to be of cast iron. On the north and south facades are bays with the round-arched fenestration on each floor.

The basic style of the building is a modified Renaissance Revival mode which was very popular in Louisville in the mid-nineteenth century. The exterior remains unchanged from contemporary engravings with the exception of the fact that the windows have been filled in with wood panels except on the first floor of the front. In addition, the front section of the first floor has been painted white.

The site has a cast-iron fence on a limestone curb on the Fifth Street side. A stone retaining wall is along the York Street side of the property.

# BUILDER/ARCHITECT Isaiah Rogers & Henry Whitestone

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Monserrat School is representative of the educational facilities in the City of Louisville in the mid-nineteenth century. It was designed by the well-known architectural partners, Isaiah Rogers (1800-1869) and Henry Whitestone (1819-1893), in a modified Renaissance Revival mode.

The school structure is located in an area which now has a very mixed land use; however, originally it served a wealthy residential section in the nineteenth century. Located just south of Broadway, this was an area filled with substantial limestone and brick residences and churches (View 1). The architect, Whitestone, designed numerous structures in the vicinity.

Whitestone had come to Kentucky from Ireland to work with Isaiah Rogers on the Capitol Hotel in Frankfort, Kentucky in 1852. In 1853, they came to Louisville to work on the remodeling of the major hotels in town including the Galt House and the Louisville Hotel. In addition, they received commissions for numerous public, commercial, and residential structures.

The Fifth Ward School had been opened in September of 1854. It had been completed at a cost of \$18,000 and was a three-story, brick structure. According to a notice in the Louisville Daily Journal of March 26, 1853, sealed proposals would be received in the office of E. E. Williams for three school buildings including one in the Fifth Ward. This was by order of the Building Commissioners. This was one of the first school buildings known to be constructed south of Broadway.

On June 17, 1855, a fire destroyed the school building. The fire had begun in the chair factory of B. Olyer, a frame building at Fifth and York on the south side of the "great southern ditch." According to newspaper accounts, the structures were seventy-five feet apart, but there was a lack of water as there was not a public cistern within a quarter-mile of the school. The wooden cornice under the metal roof caught fire, and the school building was severely damaged.

The school comprised six compartments--three for boys and three for girls on separate sides of the school. There were three male teachers and four female teachers with a total student enrollment of three hundred. No one was injured from the fire, and the children's books and the library of Neodelphic Society were saved.

It was reported in the Louisville Daily Courier of July 16, 1855, that the city authorities closed their contracts on the Fifth Ward School, and Mr. J. I sic Rogers, the architect, had the superintendence of the plans and construction. The newspaper commented that it "will be the best constructed and most admirable school house in the city."

The school house has also served the community for purposes other than education. It was used as a hospital during the Civil War. From 1937 until June of 1975, the building was used for the Natural History Museum of the Louisville Free Public Library. It is now being used by the Library for storage of books and other library materials.

The Monserrat School is significant in that it is one of very few remaining educational structures from this early period of expansion of educational facilities in the City of Louisville. In addition, it represents the movement of the city southward in the mid-nineteenth century. Architecturally, the structure is an excellent example of the work of the well-known firm of Rogers and Whitestone and is one of a rapidly dwindling few buildings from the decade of the 1850s in the City of Louisville.
