DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

### Original Appearance

The Downey Savings Bank was originally all brick with no wood structures appended to it. It was built as a bank with brick walls of 18 inches thickness and where the vault stood, the walls were 20 inches thick. The foundation under where the vault stood, appears to be limestone and goes into the earth another story. This is visible from a cellar type basement which was put in after the bank was built and before it closed with the depression. This was done for the purpose of installing a central coal burning furnace.<sup>1</sup> The building faces north and the original entrance was at the northeast corner of the building. There also appears to have been a side entrance to the bank on the west side of the building and about one third of the downstairs is covered by a tin ceiling. There was a board walk extending around the east and north sides of the building. In the back of the lot on the south side of the building, was an out house which could accomodate 4 occupants. Such a spacious convienence was probably provided, those attending functions held in the not for the bankers, but most probably for. ballroom situated above the bank proper. The stage for the ballroom was at the north end of the building with a maple floor covering the entire upper story. There was an enclosed wood awning over a wooden stairway which led to the second floor. There are some wonderful old pictures of the building available.<sup>2</sup> (Present owner has done some restoration work such as removing tile which was laid over the original wood floors and removing false ceilings upstairs and down. More restoration is planned.)

### Present Appearance

There have been two major alterations \_\_\_\_\_ to the outside of the original building. One was to change the original entrance from its northeast exposure to an entrance from the east using what appears to be the original bank door in the new entrance. A wooden shed was built around this entrance probably as a wind break. The cavity left by the original door was merely bricked in, and badly so. The second alteration was the addition of a combination storage shed and garage. This was built on the western side of the building beginning at the north end of the building and continuing back to about half the length of the building. When I purchased the building with Michael Pallak in August of 1973, I had to tear down the wood awning which enclosed the back stairway as it was falling down and very unsafe. Upon tearing it down, it became apparent that it was not the original awning, but a smaller one which had been put up probably to replace the original. This was evident from the marks left on the brick. The stairs were falling down and unsafe as they had come away from the building. With the help of a workman, I jacked them up back into the building and put more substantial footings under them and replace the bottom two steps which was necessary since the building seemed to have settled. Otherwise, the building exterior is as it was except that the brick needs to be tuck-pointed.

<sup>1</sup>Mrs. Frieda Berry of Iowa City, is the daughter of the bank's cashier, Mr. Cameron. She recalls a coal burning stove which stood in the middle of the western side of the bank which her father would have to tend on Sundays. During the time her father was banker, the cellar was put in for the purpose of installing a modern coal furnace. Material used on overhang is metal.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Downey Savings Bank building is significant as a well preserved example of an early twentieth century commerial bank building. Now the only remaining commercial building in Downey, it serves as the town's only visible link with its more prosperous past. It is also significant for its continued use as a community social center throughout its years of use as a bank, grocery store and pottery.

The Downey Savings Bank was charted in 1903 (also constructed) with \$15,000.00 at a time when the town contained several other businesses and was reasonably prosperous. It served the surrounding community well but was closed with all other banks in 1932. Since its capital was not large enough to meet new federal legislation it was never opened again but was consolidated with the West Liberty Bank. The building sat empty for three years until it was sold by receivers deed in 1935 to Mr. John Bashor who opened a combined grocery-hardware store in it. This he operated until 1963 when it was sold to another man who also sold groceries in it, along with sandwiches and beverages. It was sold again in 1972 and a brief attempt at converting it into a pool hall and cabinet shop ended in 1973 when the present owner purchased the building. Since then she has established a working pottery in the downstairs and a personal living quarters upstairs.

The Downey Savings Bank building always served an important social function to the town of Downey. In its banking days, it was the financial center of the town, and an important meeting place for neighboring farmers discussing the prices of grain and the latest innovation in farming. With the building's conversion to a grocery in the 1930's, it continued to be a place for the local people to meet over a cup of coffee. The school but let out right in front of the store and children swarmed in for their after school treats. Women came daily to discuss school issues and exchange recipes and tales of the children and men folk while picking up a few groceries. The owner also rented out the upstairs ballroom to the Knights of Columbus as well as individuals who held dances or card games.

By the 1960's the store was the only operating business in Downey other than the grain elevator, leaving it the only gathering place which served to pull together the daily lives of those people in the immediate and surrounding communities. In the two years the owner has been establishing a working pottery, the bank has continued in its role as a community oriented place, with school groups, women's clubs and people from the surrounding community making their way to the Downey Savings Bank Pottery.
