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John Gaw Meem in the use of the Pueblo Revival Style architecture. Street had worked for Meem prior to opening his own firm in 1937. Street is best known for his design of the New Mexico Supreme Court Building in Santa Fe. The use of Spanish Pueblo Revival Style architecture at NMSD was instrumental in establishing the style in New Mexico. The Hospital together with the other buildings on campus makes up a unified campus style that gives identity to the school. The only other State campus to use one consistent architectural style is the New Mexico Military Institute.
