The original barracks building of the South Florida Military Institute was constructed in 1898. It was a twostory wooden structure with a flat roof and foundation of brick piers. At each end of the building was a projecting two-story octagonal tower. The towers extended about two feet above the roof of the building. In the center of the barracks building was a similar three-story tower with an opened recessed archway at its base. Each of the three towers had a single blind arch below the roofline. rear of each end tower wings extended approximately thirtyfive feet beyond the central structure giving the building a u-shaped appearance from the back. There was a walkway along the second floor rear of the barracks so that the cadets could file out of their rooms and exit to the front parade grounds through the central archway. The overall impression presented by the building when viewed from the front was that of a military fort.

To the north of the barracks was a smaller two-story faculty building of similar architecture with a two-story octagonal tower at its north end. There was a covered front porch to the south of the tower. This building is still standing.

The fenestration of both buildings was uniform with rows of elongated double hung sash windows on each floor. The buildings had decorative brackets supporting a thin cornace.

The school ceased to function in 1905 and the property passed into the hands of Milton D. Wilson who removed the central tower of the barracks and remodeled the interior of the remaining north and south portions. What had been the north section of the barracks, Mr. Wilson converted into his home, and it is now sometimes referred to as "The Wilson House".

What had been the south section of the barracks, Mr. Wilson converted into two apartments, one on each floor. This building burned in 1944. The building which originally served as the faculty living quarters was also used by the Wilson family as a private residence.

The main structural change to the Wilson home, or the converted north wing of the barracks, was the addition of a front porch which extended around the north side of the building forming a porte cochere. A balustrade was placed on the roof of this structure. Form 10-300a (July 1969)

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The Wilson House and nearby faculty residence are in excellent condition structurally. The interiors are also in very good condition. The exteriors are somewhat in need of painting but otherwise show no serious defects.

The South Florida Military Institute of Bartow, Florida was founded in 1894 by Major General Evander McInver Law, an experienced teacher and Confederate veteran who, after General Hood was wounded, commanded Hood's Division at Gettysburg and Chickamauga.

General Law moved to Bartow in 1893. The following year he organized the South Florida Military Institute patterning the program after The Citadel, Virginia Military Academy, and the United States Military Academy. Early in 1895 a delegation of citizens headed by General Law appealed to the State of Florida for support. They secured an initial appropriation from the Legislature for \$6,400 and the school was placed under the control of the State Board of Education. The appointment of a local Board of Trustees was also prescribed In the same year, 1895, the main three tower barracks building was built, the north section of which still stands. In 1903 the State Legislature changed the name of the school to South Florida Military College and granted it the authority to confer college degrees.

Also in the year 1903 an unusual event in the history of the school occurred. General Law resigned after a clash with the Board of Trustees and upon the suggestion of a future Secretary of State of Florida, Robert A. Gray of the Class of 1903, all but three members of the senior class resigned in protest. Finally, in 1927, the Florida Legislature authorized the University of Florida to issue diplomas to the members of this class who had resigned.

Under the Buckman Act of 1905 the South Florida Military College was merged into the University of Florida and ceased to function as a separate entity. In 1909 the graduates of the Bartow college were authorized by the State Legislature to receive diplomas from the University of Florida.

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The college properties were put up for bid and secured by W. B. Swearingen in 1906. subsequently turned them over to his law partner, Milton D. Wilson of the Class of 1904. Mr. Wilson removed the central tower of the barracks building and remodeled the remaining north and south wings. The south section was turned into two apartments which subsequently burned and the Wilson family took up residence in the now separate north section. Mrs. Wilson, who is eighty-five, still lives in the original house. The faculty building which is just north of the Wilson home is also still It now belongs to the family of standing. Mrs. Isabelle Wilson Boswell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Wilson. The Boswell family lived in this house until 1971 when it was rented to another family.

The institution has a significant place in the development of higher education in Florida and warrants nomination on that basis.
