#### 7. Narrative Description

The Rankin County Confederate Monument, erected in 1907, stands on a low, flat median strip landscaped with small shrubs and annuals on Government Street (US Hwy. 80) at its intersection with North Street, to the west of the Rankin County Courthouse. The monument is 37 feet high and consists of a four level stepped base with the bottom step of granite and the three others of marble; and a marble shaft capped by a 7 foot tall granites statue of a Confederate soldier, facing west in a "lookout" posture. The west face of the monument has low reliefs of a crossed rifle and sword and a bayonet beneath a Confederate flag in the section of the shaft below the soldier and above the shaft's square pedestal which has inscriptions on each of its sides. The inscriptions are:

on the west: LORD GOD OF HOSTS BE WITH US YET LEST WE FORGET, LEST WE FORGET.

ERECTED BY BRANDON CHAPTER UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY 1861 - DEO VINDICE- 1865

#### on the east:

TO THOSE WHO WORE THE GREY, IN LEGEND AND IN LAY OUR HEROES IN GREY, SHALL FOREVER LIVE OVER AGAIN FOR US.

THE EPITAPH OF THE SOLDIER WHO FALLS WITH HIS COUNTRY, IS WRITTEN IN THE HEARTS OF THOSE WHO LOVE THE RIGHT AND HONOR THE BRAVE. on the north: STATES' RIGHTS AND HOME RULE TRUTH CRUSHED TO EARTH WILL RISE AGAIN. MEN DIE, PRINCIPLES LIVE FOREVER. ALTHOUGH CONQUERED WE ADORE IT; WEEP FOR THOSE WHO FELL BEFORE IT; PARDON FOR THOSE WHO TRAILED AND TORE IT.

### 8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Confederate Monument in Brandon, erected in 1907, is nominated for listing on the National Register under Criterion A as a locally important example of the extensive effort to memorialize the Confederacy which was a major expression of social and civic consciousness in the South from the 1870s until the First World War, part of the development of a sense of a Southern regional identity during that period. It is also nominated under Criterion C for Art as a locally important example of sculpture which, while it is a conventional or stock sculptural piece more important for its historical association than for its artistic merit, is the primary example of public statuary in Rankin County. While this is a commemorative property subject to Criteria Consideration F, it merits National Register eligibility as an expression of the Confederate Memorial movement which was a historically significant social movement in the postbellum South.

The monument is located on a median in Brandon's major urban street, in a prominent site near the courthouse, and serves as a significant local landmark. It is the only major outdoor sculpture in Brandon, other than funerary monuments.

For an approximately fifty year period dating from the 1870s until WWI, both the North and the South built a profusion of monuments commemorating individual heroes, specific battles and the general soldiery of the Civil War. Most often, these memorials were placed on the grounds of state capitols, as in Jackson, MS and Nashville, TN; in cemeteries; on the grounds of city halls, post offices, or schools, such as the monument at the University of MS in Oxford; arrayed along a median strip, as on Monument Avenue in Richmond, VA or Monroe Street in Vicksburg, MS; or at an intersection of two streets, such as that at Okolona, MS; or on an island or median in the street, as seen in Port Gibson, MS and in Brandon. Confederate monuments in Aberdeen, Corinth and Tupelo were moved from their original street locations to sites on the courthouse grounds.

Mississippi has many Confederate monuments, but not every county has one in a prominent public location. Many of Mississippi's oldest Confederate monuments (ca. 1870-ca. 1900) are in cemeteries. Public monuments to Confederate soldiers, most dating from ca. 1900 to 1917, stand on the grounds of approximately 27 of the 92 active county courthouses in the state and at 3 former courthouses or courthouse sites. About 12 other county seats have Confederate

monuments in public squares, on street medians, at intersections or in parks, as do several communities that are not county seats. <sup>1</sup>

The Confederate monument in Brandon was largely the result of the efforts of the Brandon Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy (UDC), which was organized in 1903 with seven charter members. The UDC chapter solicited subscriptions, had fund raising events, and asked the Board of Supervisors for a contribution to pay the \$3000 cost of the monument. The cornerstone was laid with Masonic ceremonies on November 1, 1907 and the statue was unveiled on November 29 of that same year. Mayor G. O. Robinson gave a welcoming speech to the Confederate veterans and other observers, UDC officers made speeches, and school children sang "Dixie" and "The Bonnie Blue Flag." During the ceremonies, the UDC chapter consigned the monument to the care of the Board of Supervisors.

Local historical tradition maintains that most Confederate monuments face north. <sup>2</sup> Rankin County's monument faces west, the direction from which the Federal troops entered Brandon. Local tradition holds that "the monument marks the spot where General Sherman ordered his troops to stack arms during the siege of Brandon...."<sup>3</sup>

The Rankin County Confederate monument in Brandon is a good example of public commemorative statuary which symbolically expresses one of the prevalent societal attitudes of a small Southern town in the early years of the twentieth century.
