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The Newport Artillery Company, an organization chartered in 1741, raised money in 1835 to build its permanent quarters on Clarke Street, a locale that had been prominent in Newport's history from the time of the city's first settlement. Alexander MacGregor, a stonemason from Scotland who was responsible for much of Newport's early-19th-century stone building, was hired to design the armory, and Duress and McWade were taken on as contractors. MacGregor piled walls of random ashlar (native stone given by Enoch Hazard from his Rocky Farm) and topped them with a modest gable to create a building of simple, but relatively heavy, temple form. He rusticated the corners and the main doorway. A long lintel over the double, panelled doors reads "1741. Artillery Company." (In photographs taken in 1870, one can see that the gable was then undecorated, the doors were diagonally planked, and an extremely tall flagpole stood on the sidewalk in front.) The building was set on a narrow lot, donated by Audley Clarke, a Newport merchant and benefactor, with 28 feet of frontage; and the structure itself was originally no more than 50 feet deep. In 1873 there was an addition to the rear, increasing the number of east-west bays from four to eight. While this addition distorted the originally fine proportions of MacGregor's design, the armory--situated as closely as it is between. the Second Congregational Church on the right and the Robert Stevens house on the left--was not really impaired in general appearance. Its architecture was harmed, however, in 1906 when the gable was raised to make way for a second story. Though the new stonework and brickwork are well matched to the old, the added height and the introduction of five windows across the upper façade have marred the Greek-Revival intentions of the original design. A granite belt course was then added along the sides of the building. There are iron bars on these front windows and iron shutters for the windows on the sides of the building. Of visual interest is a large, relief-carved wooden eagle applied to the gable or tympanum in 1880. Taken from the paddle-box of the S. S. "Metropolis," the bird is set against a red-painted wooden semicircular background. Two triangular panels with embedded cannonballs flank the eagle emblem.

The interior is open and rather plain, with a ceiling height of about 15 feet. The panelled wainscoting that was probably once varnished is now painted a light green to match the plaster walls. The floor is of wooden planks, and the ceiling is now of 19th-century pressed tin with an elaborate lace-like pattern. The symmetrically-molded architraves of the doors have circle-in-square block ornament at the upper corners. The front and rear stairways of the long first-floor drill hall (now used as a museum) have simple square wooden balustrading. The back stairs were added when the building was heightened, and include a large podium landing, perhaps meant as a speaking or command platform. Photographs taken in 1908 show the new upstairs lounge rooms which were finished in dark panelling; the central upstairs room still has its large hearth; but this suite is not now in stairs room still has its large hearth; but this suite is not now in the cellar, long used as a rifle-practice range, runs the full length of the building and has stone walls and a wood-beamed ceiling.
