Section 7: Description

The Gardnerville Elementary School was constructed in 1928, designed by school principal C.C. Meneley. It is an example of Neoclassical design, and maintains its historic integrity in terms of location, design, workmanship, feeling, and association. There are three non-contributing school-related buildings on the same parcel owned by Douglas County Schools that were added in the modern era. There is also a historic fence along the front of the lawn in front of the original school building.

The Gardnerville Elementary School is located on Toler Avenue in Gardnerville, Nevada, in the S ½ of the SW ¼ of Section 33, T13N, R20E. The building is U-shaped with one story and a basement. The foundation is concrete and rises above-ground approximately 2.5 feet. There are small vented windows along the sides of the building into the basement. The windows to the main floor are six-over-six double-hung sash, and appear to be original to the building. The lintels are brick, laid vertically, and the lugsills project outward.

The front portico has a gabled roof and pediment supported by four Doric columns. The pediment as a circular vent at its center. A set of glass-paned metal double doors is centered under the portico roof. Six-over-six double-hung wooden sash windows frame the doorway on either side. A fanlight is above the doorway. The rear double doors to the school are located at the center of the rear, with a twelve-pane clearstory overhead. Both the front and rear doors have concrete stairs leading up to them, the front stairs with brick piers on either side. A concrete handicap access ramp has been installed near the front entry. A second handicap access ramp has been added onto the rear of the school, on the inner west side of the "U." The space at the rear of the building has been paved with asphalt for a basketball court and four square courts.

The exterior of the building is of red brick. The brick-laying style resembles the common bond style with header courses and stretcher courses, with a vertical stretcher course along the top of the foundation. At each end of the front façade, the regular brick pattern is adorned with a rectangle of vertically-laid bricks. The wooden trim is painted white. The building is adorned with a three-part entablature with an encircling friezeboard and molded cornice. A rain gutter runs along the edge of the cornice for drainage. The original roofing material has been replaced with a red sheet metal covering, a required, fire-safe upgrade to prevent snow from accumulating on the roof. The pitch of the roof is low. Although the roofing material is modern and not original to the building, it does not affect the overall integrity significantly.

There are two other buildings built sometime between 1981 and 2005, the last date noted in the Douglas County Assessor's office for new construction of "a school building" at the property (Douglas County Assessor's Office, personal communication November 2007). However, the assessor's information on the parcel is incomplete or inaccurate—they list the construction date of the school as 1976.

The two additional buildings also have low-pitched roofs but are not built in a Neoclassical style. One, that incorporates a large windowless gymnasium on the west end, is situated immediately east of the original school, facing Toler Avenue (F2). The other modern building, "Building 3," is to the rear (north) of them, oriented along the eastern edge of the parcel (F3).

There is a portable "modular" building (F4) immediately south (at the rear) of the Gardnerville Elementary School that was added sometime before 1981, when an architectural surveyor noted the presence of the structure. It is non-contributing.

The front fence may be original to the buildings, but is at least fifty years in age, and is complimentary to the Neoclassical style of the school itself. Two concrete pillars are one on either side of the front walkway that leads from the sidewalk to the main entrance. The fence is constructed of painted wooden posts and metal piping for crossbars. It contributes to the overall integrity of the property.

#### Section 8: Significance

The Gardnerville Elementary School is significant under Criterion C, in the area of significance of Architecture. Built in 1928, the Gardnerville Elementary School is a well-preserved regional example of Neoclassical style in a Custom Architect-designed school. It is similar in design to the original Douglas County High School, built in 1916 also in a Neoclassical style. The high school is now the Carson Valley Cultural Center and Museum.

The Gardnerville Elementary School is also significant under Criterion A, for its role in Education, and Community Planning and Development. It was the first primary-only school built in Gardnerville, replacing the former grammar school that served all ages of students.

# Gardnerville Elementary

Originally the Gardnerville Grammar School, the first school in Gardnerville, was a two-room structure built in 1892. In 1909, a two-story wooden structure was built at the same site; the upper floor was Carson Valley's first high school (Record-Courier [RC] 6 Sept 1979:3-10).

School bonds were sold in 1928 to raise funds for a new school in Gardnerville. The local newspaper, the *Record-Courier*, noted at a cost of \$28,000, the new elementary school was one of the most modern in the

state (also reflecting community pride in their new school). It was designed by the school principal C.C. Meneley, who also had some architectural training.

It appears the former two-story wooden school building and the one-story brick, Neoclassical school occupied the same site for a few years. In 1931 C.C. Meneley bought the old school structure, re-using the lumber and moving a section of the building to his adjacent home lot on Toler Avenue.

#### History of Gardnerville

Carson Valley was first explored by Captain Joseph Walker, who passed through in 1833 with a party that was trapping along the streams and tributaries of the West. He plotted a route over the Sierra Nevada range that crossed the mountains between Carson Valley and Placerville, California. Walker's trail became the principal route for the great western movement that came a decade and a half later.

The first settlement in Nevada was a trading post established in Carson Valley at the base of the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada (McBride 2002). In 1851, Mormon settlers under the direction of Colonel Reese, built a store, hotel, and farm to serve the pioneers and gold-seekers crossing the mountains. The place was first called Mormon Station, but in 1855 it was renamed Genoa.

In addition to the Mormons, Carson Valley was settled by a number of German farmers from the Westphalia region of Germany, who established ranches to the east and southeast of the first settlement in Genoa, and contributed to the later development of the valley's other towns of Gardnerville (1879) and Minden (1905). Carson Valley agriculture received a big boost from the discovery of the Comstock Lode in 1859 and the resulting demand for food supplies for the mining towns that sprang up in western Nevada. During the Comstock boom years of 1860-1879, agriculture in the area flourished (Harmon 2003).

The town of Gardnerville, located southeast of Genoa in an area designated as the East Fork Township, was established by Lawrence Gilman. Gilman purchased a tract of land along the East Fork of the Carson River from John and Mary Gardner in 1879. Gilman moved a building, known as the Kent House, from its original location between Genoa and Wally's Hot Springs. He changed the name of the Kent House to the Gardnerville Hotel, and added a blacksmith shop and a saloon to serve the surrounding ranches. In 1881, Gilman purchased another tract of the former Gardner property from Henry Van Sickle, and began selling parcels. Gilman named the town Gardnerville after John Gardner. The Gardnerville post office opened on June 28, 1881, with Gilman as postmaster. The new town, located along the Esmeralda/Bodie road,

thrived as it supplied the mines to the south. By 1899, Gardnerville's Main Street boasted several hotels, shops, and saloons, livery stables, and other businesses. As well as being a center of commerce, Gardnerville was also a social center for the German and Scandinavian ranchers. The Valhalla Society was formed in Gardnerville in 1885 to disseminate information to immigrants to the area (Rocha 2002).

The neighboring community of Minden was established in 1905 to become the new terminus for the Virginia & Truckee Railroad. Today these two towns are only separated by city limit boundaries on maps; they are seamlessly connected by continuous streets and buildings today.
