DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The United States Post Office in Leland is located in the central business district. It is Colonial Revival in style. A concrete foundation level rises above grade to the main lobby level which is differentiated by a changeover to brick masonry. The elevated main floor is made accessible by a flight of granite steps with cast iron railings. The exterior walls consist of one full story crowned by a wide limestone frieze and wooden cornice which is continuous on all four facades. A standing seam metal, hipped roof covers the lobby portion of the building while a flat, built-up roof covers the rear work area. An octagonal wooden cupola with louvered minor sides and a peaked metal roof crowns the roof ridge over the central bay. The street facade consists of five bays reading window-window-roof-window-window. All bays are articulated by recessed brick panels. The central doorway is highlighted by a flanking pair of fluted Corinthian pilasters, a multi-paneled, leaded transom light and an architrave with dentils and a one foot high cast stone eagle centered over it. Windows in this facade are wooden, double hung, eight over eight sash with limestone lintels and sills. The northeast and southwest facades contain five bays of windows each. A mailing vestibule and platform project from the rear (southeast) facade. A full basement level exists. Brick masonry laid in the common bond is used throughout.

The interior plan (see attached plan drawings) consists of an L-shaped public lobby with the postmaster's office on the northernmost corner. The remaining area is given over to a large workroom and aforementioned vestibule and platform. A partial mezzanine level containing a lookout is located over the vault area. The lobby contains a polychrome terrazzo floor, marble wainscoting, a five-sided wooden entry vestibule, and a slightly altered screenline.

A mural by Stuart R. Purser, created under the Treasury Department's Section of Fine Arts program, was completed and installed in 1940 at a cost of \$740. It is presently in a moderately good state of preservation. (See Fine Arts Inventory).

## Politics/Government

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The first Public Buildings Act of 1913 and the second Public Building Act of 1926 were supplemented in 1933 by Congress, on the urging of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, with the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works. Between 1933 and 1941 a tremendous amount of construction resulted in the United States, including four post offices in Mississippi constructed under the 1926 Act and thirty-two post offices in Mississippi constructed under 1933 PWA legislation.

The U.S. Post Office in Leland, Mississippi, built in 1938, is significant as one of thirty-two constructed in the state with Public Works Administration funds during the Gre Depression. It was designed by the Office of the Supervising Architect. (See also "Fed-eral Construction Work 1913-1941").

### Architecture

This Post Office and the City Hall represent the two most significant governmental public buildings in the community. Architecturally it shows influences of both the Style Modern--its prismatic quality of wall paneling, and the Colonial Revival--its cupola, hipped roof, and entry doorway with pilasters. The sophistication of the building's proportions, fenestration, and detailing suggest the hand of a very skillful designer, although no individual architect's name may be identified with it. The result, however, is the most sophisticated twentieth century architectural quality to be found in Leland.

## Art

The Department of the Treasury's Section of Fine Arts Program was begun by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and in two phases, the Public Works of Art Project and the Section of Painting and Sculpture, several thousand artists produced multiple thousand pieces of art throughout the United States, including sculpture and mural paintings.

The U.S. Post Office in Leland, Mississippi is significant because of the mural in the lobby above the postmaster's door. The work, done by Stuart Purser, a native of Arkansas and former Chairman of the Art Department at the University of Mississippi, was completed in 1940. The work, entitled "Ginning Cotton," is appropriate to the area because of the importance of cotton to the economy of that Delta town.
