### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Rose Cottage (1917) is a small, two-story, concrete, Renaissance Revival structure located in a parklike setting on the grounds of the Central Louisiana State Hospital in Pineville. The building easily retains its architectural integrity because it has been little altered over the years.

Built as a pathology laboratory, the simple structure features two major rooms and a stair hall on the ground story and a single long room on the upper story. The building is entered through a single bay elliptical arch porch with octagonal columns. The slightly asymmetrical building is treated with stucco which is formed into various classical details. The stucco is scored on most of the surface to resemble cut stone. On the corners of the building and at the center of the rear it is formed into exaggerated quoins. Above the windows it is formed into jack arch voussoirs. Below the eaves it is formed into a double, flat modillion cornice. The hip roof has broadly overhanging eaves with decoratively cut exposed rafter ends. Both the porch roof and the main roof are sheathed in glazed pantiles. Windows are six over six wooden sash type.

Since construction the following changes have been made in the structure:

1. The lower windows have been boarded up, although the windows and sashes are still in good condition.

2. A small rear concrete deck has been erected and a rear access door has been installed where once there was a window. Assessment of Integrity:

In the opinion of the State Historic Preservation Office, these changes should be regarded as minor.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion C

Rose Cottage is locally significant in the area of architecture as a landmark within the context of the City of Pineville.

Pineville has retained relatively few 50+ year old buildings. There are virtually no old commercial buildings, and the city's historic residences are mainly Queen Anne-Colonial Revival cottages and bungalows. There are also some vaguely Georgian institutional buildings on the state hospital grounds.

Rose Cottage is conspicuous among Pineville's patrimony because it features the most historically correct styling of any of the city's older structures. Its distinctive Renaissance Revival character represents Pineville's closest approximation to the prevailing early-twentieth century architectural tendency to design buildings in this or that particular historical style. This can be seen at Rose Cottage in its stucco classical details, its tile hip roofs, its overhanging eaves and its arched porch. In many ways Rose Cottage represents the apex of architectural design in Pineville from 1870 to 1920.

### Historical Note:

The architect for Rose Cottage was Joseph H. Carlin, who was a patient at the hospital from September 13, 1909 to August 1, 1912. He was admitted from Rayne, Louisiana. Very little is known of Carlin after 1912 with the exception that he served as the architect for Rose Cottage and as the "builder" of the hospital's dairy barn (1923). It is assumed that Carlin was placed on "nonpatient" or "guest" status upon his discharge in 1912. According to a former superintendent, this was a common practice in the facility's early days. Rather than returning home, Carlin apparently remained at Central Louisiana State Hospital and worked with the maintenance department on a room and board basis. (This statement regarding Carlin's "status" with the hospital after his discharge is an educated assumption by the applicant.)

Central Louisiana State Hospital was created by enabling legislation, Act 92, in 1902 to provide for the treatment of blacks suffering from mental illness. The said legislation was later amended, Act 143, in 1904 and provided for the treatment of Caucasians as well as blacks. The facility opened on January 6, 1906. Central Hospital serves forty-two of Louisiana's sixty-four parishes. The geographic area includes that portion of the state north and west of the Atchafalaya River. Within the last fifteen years, Central has evolved from a large institution that provided care for 3,000 patients to their current licensed bed capacity of 570 beds. Over the years the hospital has changed from a custodial facility to one that offers primarily acute care. Specific programs include Adult Psychiatric; Adolescent; Substance Abuse; Vocational Rehabilitation; and Transitional Living. The facility is licensed as well as being accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and the National Institute of Mental Health.

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

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8. Historical Sketch (continued)

The greater majority of the original buildings that made up Central have been demolished. Rose Cottage is the oldest extant building, having been constructed in 1917. The other remaining older buildings include the dairy barn built by Mr. Carlin in 1923, the Administration Building and Fuqua Hospital (Unit 1) (1927), and Unit 3 (1937). The remainder of the buildings were constructed in 1942 or the early 1950's.
