Narrative Description

The Wales Co-operative Mercantile Institution (Wales Co-op) building, constructed c.1894, is a one-story, brick, Victorian Eclectic, false-front commercial building. The façade (east) is characterized by the rectangular storefront and recessed entry. Although currently covered with plywood, the glass storefronts remain intact, as do the original double doors. Victorian detailing includes the brick corbelling on the cornice, decorative metal pilasters around the windows, and the wood block dentils above the windows. The flat panel in the upper portion of the storefront is typical of commercial buildings of this era. Evidence of previous signage remains.

Behind the façade, the building is a simple painted brick gable roof building. According to tax records, the front portion is made of sand-rolled brick and the rear of pressed brick. Although not as visible painted, a c.1935 tax photo shows the c.1926 rear addition. The rear portion of the roof is hipped. There are no windows on the sides of the front portion of the building¹, but there is evidence of an old denim-jeans advertisement painted on the south side. The rear has three four-pane clerestory windows and one double-hung on each side. There is also evidence of the basement windows, though some were eliminated during the recent stabilization of the building. The metal sheet roof replaces the original asphalt shingles. There are two chimneys at the rear of the building. There is also a 30 foot by 25 foot contemporary metal shed attached to the rear of the structure that will be removed during the upcoming rehabilitation. This shed replaced a wood lean-to that was on the rear at least through the 1950s or 1960s.²

The interior of the store is open except for a small enclosed portion at the rear, where the double-hung windows are. The walls are covered with white wood shelves reaching halfway to the top of the approximately 14 foot walls. The shelves probably date from the 1926 expansion of the building.³ The floors are the original wood.

The building now stands essentially on its own with no adjacent buildings. A granary that once stood with the building until at least 1966 has been demolished. To the south is the town park, once home to the meetinghouse⁴. To the north is a house that sits over fifty feet back off from the street, and to the east is the fire building. Despite, or perhaps because the building sits alone, the integrity is maintained. It is the only remaining commercial structure in the town and it retains its integrity. It will be rehabilitated into the town hall and library using CLG funds.

Narrative Statement of Significance

Constructed in 1894, the Wales Co-operative Mercantile Institution is significant under Criterion A as a representation of the cooperative movement in Sanpete County and Wales. It is the oldest of only two remaining commercial building in Wales, Utah, and one of only seven remaining co-ops in the county. Begun on a wide basis throughout Utah in 1868 by members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS or Mormon church), the cooperative merchandising system encouraged church members to mutually invest in a mercantile store and was intended to encourage trade among church members and help decrease the flow of financial resources to non-Mormon businesses. Members bought (or often traded for) their necessities from the store. Operating from 1871 until 1968, the Wales Co-op was the only commercial outlet in town, serving as grocer, general store and gas station.

Wales, Utah began in 1854 after the discovery of coal. Welsh converts to the LDS church settled here in 1857 at the request of Brigham Young. They mined coal, lived in dugouts and called the town "Coalbed." In 1866, like many other Sanpete County communities, the people of Wales moved themselves and their cabins to Moroni due to Indian raids. They returned in 1868 and created a branch of the LDS church. In 1869, when a post office was established, the town was renamed Wales. The town was platted with the traditional Mormon town plan in 1873. Due to the coal mining operation, the first railroad into the county arrived in Wales in 1875. By the 1880s the community subsisted on farming as better quality coal was found elsewhere. Wales did not incorporate until 1908, more than 50 years after its initial settlement. In 1898 the population was about 500⁵, compared to 187 in 1999.

Located 10 miles south of Fountain Green and 8 miles west of Highway 89, Wales is out-of-the-way and has never been a commercial center. Its primary commercial establishment has been the Wales Co-operative Mercantile that was established in 1870. Before the co-op was started, John Price was the local merchant. He kept goods in boxes under his bed, and people traded him produce for the "necessities and notions."

When the co-op was formed, each man in town contributed five dollars, which Jonathan Midgley took to Salt Lake City for groceries. In addition to managing the co-op, Midgley ran the post office. John Rees, who helped settle Wales and served as presiding bishop of the Wales LDS Ward, a very prominent position, was probably also involved with the co-op.⁸ In 1874, Midgley moved to Nephi, turning over both operations to John Price, one of the original mining settlers. Price managed the store until his death when Henry D. Rees took over. A small adobe store was erected at that time.⁹ By 1888, Alfred Lamb was the superintendent of the

Wales Co-Operative Mercantile Institution, which according to the *Utah Gazetteer*, were "Dealers in General Merchandise and Shippers of Country Produce." No manager was listed in the 1892-93 Gazetteer.

In 1894, the Co-op was enlarged and incorporated. It is believed that this is when the current cooperative building was constructed. 11 In 1898, the co-op carried dry goods, groceries and farm machinery as well as having started a creamery. 12 The creamery, located one block north, remained in operation for many years. though it was gone by the 1930s. ¹³ By the 1930s the Co-op also carried gasoline, as seen in the tax photo. According to title search, both Conoco and Continental Oil held leases on the property. Personal recollections also mention scales on the south side of the building in the roadway that were used to weigh all farm loads such as hay, grain, coal, wood, cattle, sheep and horses. 14 The Co-op remained in operation until 1968, and in 1970 the building was sold to the Town of Wales.

The cooperative movement in Sanpete County, as in much of the rest of Utah, began in the 1850s with the network of tithing offices. Tithing was an integral part of the LDS church and its settlements and was used as a way to finance local and church-wide projects, as well as to help sustain the poor. This, along with each settlement's diverse populace, helped keep communities relatively independent economically. The LDS church encouraged the development of skills needed to produce the items needed for a community. Cash was scarce and goods and services were traded. In Wales, the tithing yard was located beside the cooperative. 15

This system developed into the cooperative mercantile in the late 1860s with nearly every community in Sanpete County having one. The cooperative mercantile system, an integral part of the economic history of Utah, was first put into practice in Brigham City in 1864. Under the aegis of the LDS church, Zion's

Cooperative Mercantile Institution (ZCMI) was established in 1868 in Salt Lake City, and branches quickly spread throughout the Utah Territory. The first co-op in Sanpete County was a ZCMI, though not all local cooperatives were ZCMI affiliates. Independent co-ops, such as the one in Wales, operated much the same as a ZCMI co-op, and the Wales Co-op even used ZCMI as its wholesaler.¹⁷ In Sanpete County, each town was relatively independent economically. Cooperatives were also created for many ranching and farming endeavors, but they tended not to survive as long as the mercantiles did.¹⁸ In most towns, the cooperatives eventually failed due to competition from private concerns. Due to its isolated location, this was not the case in Wales.

Since its closure in 1968, the Wales Co-op building has served as a fire station and a privately owned store. It is currently vacant, though plans are under way to rehabilitate it as the town hall and library.

In Sanpete County today, there are only 7 known co-operative buildings remaining, compared to the 14 that were in operation from 1868-1880.
