#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This single-story structure is one of 25 Italianate-style cottages remaining within the city limits of Livermore, now a town of about 13,000 houses. Originally the building consisted of approximately 1120 square feet with an essentially square front section and an addition rearward in the original architectural style. The style was altered by the addition of a California Bungalow style porch on the front and right side, and by an addition to the rear portion which is in a non-descript and unidentifiable style. It appears from available information and from the architectural style that the porches were added about the time of World War I.

The house originally stood on a 100' x 150' lot: 478 of the frontage was sold in the early 1920's to accommodate a house moved to the sold-off portion.

The grounds were originally surrounded by a picket fence behind which climber roses were planted. There were several varieties of fruit trees in the rear yard along with a large pepper tree which shaded a chicken lot. None of these trees remain. Informants do not recall any structures other than the existing corrugated metal garage and wooden shed presently at the rear of the property, both of which appear to be approximately 50 years old.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building was the residence from 1891 until his death in 1921 of Daniel J. Murphy, prominent Livermore bulinessman and local government official, and Alameda County Supervisor from 1911 until 1921. Mr. Murphy's primary contributions to Alameda County history were his untiring efforts toward the improvement of the existing network of roads and highways and in his interest in health care. He was largely responsible for the establishment of the Arroyo Sanitarium, a county tuberculosis hospital and an institution equal to any in the nation in the treatment of the disease, which operated in the hills oouth of Livermore from 1919 until the early 1960's.

Daniel J. Murphy's business and civic career encompassed a wide variety of interests. Following his retirement from a business career which included Postmaster of Livermore, Superintendent of the Livermore Water and Power Company, and membership on the advisory board of the Livermore branch, Bank of Italy, he served as Justice of the Peace for Murray Township, Alameda County, giving up this office in 1911 following his appointment by Gov. Hiram Johnson as Supervisor, First District, Alameda County, an office which he held until his death in October, 1921.

Mr. Murphy was also chairman of the committee to organize and establish the local Carnegie Library in 1910. He was President of the Livermore Stockmen's Rodeo Association in 1918-1919, an affair which is still held annually in Livermore.

The D.J. Murphy house is architecturally significant to Livermore because it is one of the few remaining links with a well-known Victorian building style, the Italianate. There are only five others in the community whose architectural elements have not been almost completely defaced with removal of the brackets and window hoods which distinguish this style, or with the addition of non-original sheathing such as asbestos shingle or stucco.

The house was originally erected in the city's Northern Addition and moved to the present site in May, 1891. It was occupied as a residence until July, 1976 when it was condemned for future occupancy by the Livermore City Building Department. The house is now threatened by destruction and vandalism. Its recognition will help preserve a structure whose removal will have an adverse effect on the present neighborhood which is in transition from residential to commercial. It will also delay the loss of a valuable and historical architectural asset which represents one of the last remaining links with an earlier era.



Staff Report -- D.J. Murphy House

The staff of the Office Of Historic Preservation recently obtained clarification of several points in the Murphy House application. These are discussed below, based upon information provided by Mr. Herbert Street, Building Official, City of Livermore.

1. Exactly how many buildings of this type and period remain?

A total of 25 Italianate cottages remain in Livermore—of this number only six retain any design integrity. All others have experienced desecration of the original design to the point that their architectural value is negated. The Murphy House is one of the six remaining Italianate cottages which has retained the basic integrity of the original design and which could be easily restored to its former appearance.

2. Is this the best surviving example of its type and period?

This building does not appear to be significantly better or worse than the other five as an example of its type and period, but probably has the greatest potential for preservation of the six remaining structures. It is a typical example which does have all of its original component parts, including millwork, intact.


3. Is this property proposed for registration because it is the only building of its type available?

It is being proposed for registration because it is a building which has been identified as significant in a local survey, and which will be lost unless action is taken immediately to preserve the building. The building was condemned last year and is presently vacant. The Building Official for the City of Livermore reports that the original building is intact and solid, but the additions have deteriorated to the point where they must be removed to allow the building to be returned to residential use. The owner is an elderly widow in limited financial means who derives a small amount of rental income from the property. The Livermore Heritage Guild has offerred to work with the owner to restore the building to its original appearance and bring it up to code. The building is not for sale, and will not be acquired by the Heritage Guild for museum purposes. It will remain the property of the present owner, and will be returned to residential use. Regis-

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tration is viewed as an important step in building community support for the project, and for allowing the building to be preserved through rehabilitation incentives resulting from registration. The city has allowed the Heritage Guild a period of one year to accomplish the preservation of the property.

After reviewing the documentation on the Murphy House again, and after discussing the situation with the official of the City of Livermore, it would appear that the Murphy House is a property which is significant to the local community and which has the greatest potential for preservation of those of its type and period which still retain design integrity. The intruding elements are easily reversible and will be removed in the restoration, which will be undertaken by the Heritage Guild.


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
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
