DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First Methodist Church of Richwood is a small frame church measuring approximately 50 feet long by 36 feet wide. It has a center tower projecting from the front wall plane about 10 feet 6 inches square and a small chancel projecting from the back wall, now surrounded by a modern one story addition. There is a paneled double front door with a stained glass transom on the tower and a Gothic palladian window above. The second stage of the tower has an occulus and the third stage louvered palladian windows. Flanking the tower is a long stained glass window with ear moldings, and three of the same type are on each side of the church. A cornice with single brackets is continued around the front and back. A bracket cornice is also under the second stage of the tower. The exterior is now covered with aluminum siding, but the wooden decorative elements are all exposed and in good condition.

The interior of the tower has stick style elements including diagonal beaded planks. The doors have Greek Reyival block moldings.

The interior has a very ornate plaster cornice with part of the decoration picked out in gold leaf. An ornate plaster medallion is in the center of the ceiling from which hangs an ornate gilded chandelier, probably contemporary with the building. Six wall sconces match the chandelier. There is a front lobby from which an enclosed stair ascends on the left to a gallery. The gallery has been enclosed with glass up to the ceiling, which in no way interferes with the cornice. The gallery may have been further altered in ways which are not easily detected. Two old metal ceiling lamps are attached to the ceiling beneath the gallery, one on each side of the entrance. All the window frames, chairrails and other interior woodwork are intact, but the walls have been covered with wooden insulating board.

The chancel area is framed by a classical entablature which rises almost to the ceiling and is enhanced with still more ornate plaster decoration. There is a stained glass window on either side of the projecting chancel area and a very low railing before it which appears to be original. There are five Gothic Revival stained oak chairs which appear to be contemporary with the building. A lectern and table in the same style seem later in date.

All the pews are new with the exception of one old one now kept in the gallery.

The parsonage stands a short distance to the north of the church and to the south is a tree bordered lane beyond which is the cemetery. The church is in excellent condition throughout.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This charming little structure is indeed a splendid example of a mid-19th century country church. Standing at the southern edge of the village of Richwood next to its old cemetery and clearly visible from a wide area, it makes a beautiful landmark in the rather flat and prosaic cultural landscape of this farming community.

In style it is country Victorian with a scattering of Greek and Gothic details incorporated in an original, if naive manner. The well proportioned interior, with its original ornate plaster decoration, is one of the finest things of its kind in the area, a pleasant surprise for anyone who has not yet seen it. While there are modern coverings both on the exterior and interior, they have been placed with the utmost intelligence and finesse, and in no way interfere with the original decorative elements which highlight the building. Within its rather narrow limits, the church provides, indeed, a satisfying architectural experience.

The two acre lot on which the church was originally erected was deeded August 2, 1860 by Francis A. Campbell and Abigail Campbell to Francis A. Campbell, William E. Heritage, Charles S. Souders, Richard Skinner, Jr., and Francis A. Campbell, Jr., Trustees, for \$200.00 "to build a place of worship for members of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States of America." The deed was recorded August 10, 1860 in Book X4 of Deeds, p. 11 at the Clerk's Office in Gloucester County. A copy of the original and a modern typescript hang side by side in the lobby of the church. It is assumed that the church was built in late 1860 or early 1861.
