Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Streeter-Peterson House, a large two-and-one-half story frame dwelling, is located on a spacious corner lot in Aurora, Nebraska, Hamilton County, 80 miles west of Lincoln, the state capitol. Built in 1900-01, the well-maintained house represents a significant local example of early Twentieth Century Neo-Classical Queen Anne domestic architecture, both in terms of its styling and state of preservation. The interior retains original features including the main staircase, woodwork trim, pocket doors, and fireplaces. The property also includes a c.1930 frame garage building, located west of the house.

The foundation is of pressed brick, with decorative wooden lattice panels spanning areas of the foundation and enclosing the rear porch. The hipped roof with lower cross gables has flared eaves and is covered with cedar shingles.

A spacious classically-styled porch (11' x 9') wraps around the east and south sides of the house. Fluted columns are crowned with Corinthian capitals. The wide cement steps on the northeast corner lead to the massive, solid oak front door. That door, as other exterior doors, has a single pane of clear glass surrounded with intricate Greek-key design in the upper section while the lower section has clean, geometric panels. The original solid brass hardware is intact. Other architectural features include a two-story bay window on the main facade, a fanlight and cut-out bay window on the north facade, and classical detailing throughout, including dentil molding, and modillions along the eaves. The original wooden porch balustrades on the first and second level are no longer extant.

Original pewter/silver plated chandeliers and companion wall sconces are found in the living and dining rooms. These rooms, as well as their second story counterparts boast three sectioned bay window with art glass leaded sections topping single clear panes of glass. The north side shows a full length leaded art glass window, highlighting the interior front staircase landing.

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The ornate oak staircase to the second floor leads off of the entry hall/foyer. A center hall plan for both first and second floors has the living and dining rooms leading off of it, while the four bedrooms do the same on the second floor. Pocket doors are in place and functional into the living and dining rooms, complete with original brass fittings. In both the living room and second floor master bedroom there are tiled, fully operational, fireplaces with mantelpieces. Both have wood carved framed mirrors atop the mantels.

Bead and batten ('box car siding') walls are found in the first floor closets as well as the built-in china cupboard in the kitchen and in the adjacent pantry. Several other original features include the dumb-waiter shaft from the second floor to the cellar, flour bins in the pantry, the chimney flue for the original wood stove, and rooms in the cellar for laundry, coal storage, and a "cold" room for preserves.

The landscaping remains sympathetic with the architecture, and includes a large lawn and substantial trees in the side yards. The property includes a c.1930 one-story frame garage building located immediately west of the house.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Streeter-Peterson House is eligible under Criterion "C" as a significant local example of early twentieth century Neo-Classical Queen Anne domestic architecture in Aurora, Nebraska. When compared with other houses of similar scale and style in Aurora, the Streeter-Peterson House is the most impressive and architecturally sophisticated. Substantial in size, the dwelling is further enhanced by its location on a large landscaped corner lot. The period of significance is derived from the beginning and ending dates (1900-1930) of construction, inclusive of both the house and garage.

The Queen Anne style enjoyed widespread popularity in Nebraska during the 1880's through 1900. These dwellings usually have asymmetrical facades, steeply pitched rooflines, prominent or tall chimneys, wrap-around porches with spindlework, and a variety of surface ornamentation. Around 1900, when the Neo-Classical Revival style was coming into vogue in Nebraska, some Queen Anne styled houses incorporated classical columns in their porch design and other classical details in surface ornamentation. These types of Queen Anne Houses, sometimes referred to as Free Classic versions, represent the two styles (Queen Anne and Neo-Classical Revival) in transition. The Streeter-Peterson House is an excellent example of this phenomenon.

The Streeter-Peterson House was built for the William H. Streeters, a founding personage in the banking field of the area. The integrity of the house is reflected in the quality materials used originally and maintained to this day. With only six resident owners the respect for not only the dwelling, but also for the community is evident. The commitment of the individual owners ranges from the banking expertise of Mr. Streeter to the successful
