DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Powers house is an irregularly shaped, two-story brick building with a limestoné foundation and basement. It is located in a rural setting in the Salt Creek valley just north of Leavenworth on the old Fort Leavenworth-Fort Riley Road. The Powers house combines the vernacular building tradition with Italian Villa style details, such as the elaborate entablature and the verandas.

The main entrance is located on the northwest facade. The building sets back to the west of the main doorway where a shorter two-story wing has been attached. The land slopes gently downward from the main doorway to the west, exposing the cut limestone foundation. The main entrance is through double carved wood doors which have been set in a segmental archway. An area of brick around the front door is a lighter shade than the rest of the wall. The discoloration seems to indicate the removal of a one story wood porch. (This part of the house does not show clearly in any of the known old photographs.) This entrance no longer serves as the principal entry; the front porch and entry are now on the southeast facade.

Two double hung windows with segmental arches are located to the east of the double doorway on the first story. Three round-headed windows on the second story align with the openings on the first. The building has been crowned with a wide wood entablature with brackets used as dentils between larger coupled brackets. Metal grills which permit ventilation in the attic have been incorporated into the entablature.

There are three aligned windows on each story, including the basement, on the bay to the west of the old main entrance. The windows on the first story have segmental arches, those on the second story are round-headed, while those in the basement have flat stone lintels.

There is a round-headed opening on the northwest facade of the southwest wing. Above it is a small round window.

A very elaborate elevated one story wood veranda wraps around the corner of the building on the southeast and northeast facades.

The southeast facade has a projecting wing with a bay window on the first story and coupled round-headed windows on the second, flanked on either side by one story verandas. Above the veranda on the south corner there are two round-headed windows. This veranda continues on part of the southeast face of the shorter wing. The crawl space under the veranda caused by the slope of the site has been made into a two stall garage.

The house contains the original furnace which was a forced air system with ducts incorporated into the interior walls.

The house remains much as it did originally, though the verandas which were multicolored and the brick arches over the windows which were unpainted have been painted white. The porch over the main doorway has been removed and the rear veranda on the south corner has been replaced. The balustrade, lattice work and

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The David W. Powers house near Leavenworth was built in 1872 for one of the leading Kansas cattlemen of the 1870's.

Born in Kentucky in 1818, Powers went to Virginia as a youth and then came to Kansas around 1856 after a short stay in Missouri. For three years he was a farmer in the vicinity of Leavenworth. After 1859 he was involved in freighting operations across the Plains. The name of the company with which he was associated and the names of his partners changed almost yearly, typical of the freighting operations of the period. He made a substantial fortune from his freighting efforts but with the construction of the railroad he sold out around 1870 and turned his attention to the cattle business. As early as 1866 he had been buying Texas cattle and wintering them on his west central Kansas ranch. Fattened for the markets, the cattle brought him good profits. D.W. Powers and Co. owned four ranches and thousands of cattle. He also owned a bank in Ellsworth, one of the Texas cattledrive terminals, which handled the financial needs of cattlemen. For a time it was the only bank in the town. It was moved to Ellsworth in 1873 from Salina where it had been founded in 1870. A nephew, J.W. Powers, was in charge of the bank while he devoted his time to the cattle interests. (Both of Powers' sons were too young at that time to join him in his business activities.)

In 1872 his large 17-room brick house was constructed in the Salt Creek valley northwest of Leavenworth, and it continued to be his home, in spite of many business interests elsewhere, until his death in October, 1884. The house remained in the Powers family until 1906 when his daughter Mildred sold it to Philip and Nora Baker for \$7,000. In 1911 it was acquired by William LaCaille for \$8,500 and it remained in the LaCaille family until 1946. After passing from the Powers ownership, the house was for a time used as a private sanitarium, but otherwise it has been a private residence. Recent owners have been working on the restoration of the house.

Powers is a typical example of a self-made man in the post-Civil War West. Successful in business and judicious in investments, he was regarded as one of the leading cattlemen of Kansas in the 1870's. His large brick house, constructed when the basis for his prosperity was already well established, is an excellent example of Italianate influenced residential architecture of the 1870's. The house is both well detailed and well constructed and stands as a reminder of a time and of a way of life that helped to civilize the Kansas frontier.
