

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The impressive silhouette of the Koobs Residence old Scotland School, District #23) can be seen as one enters Scotland from the south on Highway 25. Situated on a corner lot which has a frame gazebo and a concrete fountain, the long, rectangular, two-storied building has a truncated hip roof and a stucco veneer covering the thick, five-course brick walls. The soddered tin roof is covered with wood shingles. A southwest tower topped with an iron weather vane has five sides and a bell-shaped roof. Flared columns support the roof of the open front porch. Two enclosed porches, which were added after 1904, are located on the south and east facades.

Although most of the windows are rectangular with one over one sash, the house displays many leaded and beveled glass windows including several diamond pattern transoms like those above the lower level tower windows. Fanlight windows are located in the north, west and south gables. On the interior, the vestibule has six beveled glass windows. Some of the original wood trim is intact as well as the handsome built-in dining room cabinets. There are 12 foot ceilings on both the first and second floors.

8. Significance

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

As one of Scotland's largest and most interesting buildings, the Koobs residence (old Scotland School, District #23) is significant in the area of architecture.

On June 18, 1884, School District #23 of Dakota Territory purchased six lots for \$300 from John and Rebecca Stafford, early homesteaders and co-founders of the community of Scotland.(1) A large three-story brick school was built in 1885 to replace the first schoolhouse in the area.(2) The bricks used to construct the new building were probably made at the local brick factory less than one half a mile away; local clay was fired in a kiln near a small/hill in southern Scotland. The building was used until a larger school was built in 1903. A year later, the school district sold the property to Dr. H.J.G. Koobs for \$625.00.(3) Dr. Koobs, a local physician, remodeled the building to its present appearance. Mr. Donley Max notes in his paper, "Early Day Scotland":

"At that time, when a dollar was worth a dollar, he (Dr. Koobs) spent \$10,000 to remodel it (his house). It was a showplace with a beautiful yard with many elm and blue spruce trees, pagoda type bird houses, a fountain which operated all summer and had gold fish in it. It was a fascinating place for children and we were always welcome." (4)

Dr. Koobs changed the structure from a simple rectangular brick school to an impressive private residence. These changes included not only the removal of the third floor but also the addition of several new features: a five-sided tower with bell-shaped roof; three fanlights in the north, west and south gables; leaded and beveled glass windows throughout the building; flared columns that support the front (west facade) porch; and two enclosed porches on the east and south facades. The interior space was also reorganized to accommodate a family dwelling. A fireplace was added as well as built-in dining roon cabinets and kitchen and bathroom facilities.

From 1920 to 1958, the property was occupied by Theresa Plattner Church and her husband, a local dentist. After their deaths, the house was sold to the Hambergers, and then to the Bjorums.(5) The building, now divided into two apartments, has recently fell into disrepair. The current owners, David and Elaine Weight, are now in the process of restoring the building and the surrounding landscape to its early twentieth century grandeur.
