

#### NORTH MAIN/NORTH ADAMS HISTORIC DISTRICT DESCRIPTION

The North Main/North Adams Historic District (see map 6) is located along both sides of N. Main St. from Bryan to Blanton (see photos 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 &17) and extends along the east side of N.Adams to the north edge of the Baptist Parsonage property (see photos 18, 19). All of the buildings are residences, with the exception of the Baptist Church (site 32) and the Christian Church (site 28); and the Roberts-Hallam House (site 24) and the Roberts-Doty-Smith House (site 25), both of which serve commercial functions at present. The buildings range in date from c.1840 to the 1920s with the majority built between 1880 and 1900. Many of the residences are built in a local vernacular style, but several are fine examples of Victorian design, such as the J.B.Martin House (site 34) and the H.T. Herndon House (site 35).

A description of the district boundary may be found in Item 10. Map 7 shows both the legal boundaries of properties within the district, and the directions from which photos 12 through 19 were taken. The district boundaries were chosen to enclose Owenton's most cohesive residential neighborhood, in terms of architectural and historical integrity. The areas south and west of the district are basically commercial; the areas east and north have many historic buildings, but many of these have been significantly altered and the neighborhoods contain many modern intrusions such as late 20th century houses. There is one non-contributing element within the district boundary; this is the Owen Co. Public Library (site B, see last bldg. in photo 12), at 118 N.Main Street, built in the early 1970s. All of the remaining buildings within the district are contributing elements. Most have been altered to some degree over the years, but all retain a sense of their original architectural integrity. Individual survey forms for all numbered sites (see map 6) are included as accompanying documentation. Unless otherwise specified on the survey form, all property nominations refer only to the described building.

#### BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION

Beginning at the northwest corner of the Teal House property (see map 7 for point of origin), continue south along the western property lines of 212 through 202 N.Main. Then east along the southern property line of 202 N.Main and crossing Perry St. south to the northwest corner of the Public Library lot (118 N.Main). South along that western property line and then east to the northwest corner of 114 N.Main; then south along the western property lines of 114 N. Main and 102 W. Bryan. Proceeding east along the southern property line of 102 W.Bryan, crossing N.Main Street and continuing along the southern property line of 111 N. Main. Then north along the eastern property lines of 111 through 117 N.Main, crossing Perry Street and continuing north along the eastern property lines of 201 through 213 N.Main. Crossing Blanton Street and proceeding east along the southern property line of Highfield (303 N.Adams) to the southeast corner of the lot; then north along the eastern property lines of Highfield and the Martin House lot (309 N.Adams) to the northeast corner of that lot. Then west to the southeast corner of the H.T.Herndon property (313 N.Adams) and north along the eastern property line of that lot and then proceeding west along the northern property line of the same lot. Then south to the northeast corner of 315 N.Adams and west along its northern property line to the east side of N.Adams St. Following south along the western property lines of 315 through 303 N.Adams, across Blanton St. to the northwest corner of the Baptist Church lot (213 N.Main), west across N.Main and then along the northern property line to the Teal House lost to the point of origin.

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#### N.MAIN/N.ADAMS HISTORIC DISTRICT STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The N.Main/N.Adams Street Historic District is significant as the best collection of late nineteenth and early twentieth century architecture in Owenton and as an expression of the most extensive growth and expansion in the history of Owenton.

Many of the businessmen who had commercial buildings in town also built fine residences. H.T. Herndon, owner of the hardware store on W.Seminary, built his home on N.Adams in 1892 (site 35, also photo 19). It is a large frame Queen Anne, with all of its intricate decorative detail intact. On the neighboring lot is the J.B. Martin House, constructed in 1894 (site 34, also photo 18). Mr. Martin, connected with the First National Bank of Owenton, had his residence built in the Victorian Gothic style; it remains the finest example of that style in Owenton.

Also on N.Adams Street is the E.E. Settle House (site 37, photos 20 and 21), built c.1880. This small frame vernacular residence has had many additions to the rear but retains its original appearance on the front, with particularly unusual carved wooden label molds over the windows. Mr. Settle was a lawyer and part owner of the Owenton Herald. His partner, William Lindsey, built his home on W.Seminary Street (site 39, photos 24 and 25). This small Victorian residence, c.1880, retains its original eclectic details such as the scalloped bargeboard.

The L. O. Cox House, c.1880, on N.Main Street (site 38, photos 22 and 23) is a large frame residence, built in the popular Victorian eclectic style. Mr. Cox was a member of one of Owenton's best-known merchant families. His elegant house looks much the same today as when it was first constructed, with architectural integrity almost completely intact.

The more residences on N. Main Street reflect the late 19th century affluence of their owners. J.C. Hartsough, respected Owenton undertaker and businessman, built his small frame Queen Anne c.1890 (site 23, also photo 13). Another Queen Anne, this one of brick, was built c.1890 by J.M. Herndon (site 30, also photo 16). The house is in excellent condition and fully reflects its original appearance with art glass windows, decorative porches, and corner tower.


Other well-to-do families chose to build homes in other neighborhoods than N.Main/N.Adams. An unusual Queen Anne residence, in excellent condition can be found on S.Main Street. Built by the Gibson family c.1890, it has a wealth of late 19th century detail (site 40, photos 26 &27). The are glass windows, added c.1930, enhance earlier decorative elements such as the intricate woodwork, patterned slate roof, and paneled chimneys. The McKay House, c.1895 (site 41, photo 28 & 29), is a good example of eclectic style, with its elaborate carved wooden gable end and glass windows.

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NORTH MAIN/NORTH ADAMS HISTORIC DISTRICT STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (continued)

Residential Development, 1900 to 1925

The early 20th century commercial prosperity again translated to residential architecture. Many businessmen and professionals chose, once again, to build along North Main Street. These fine residences, ironically, replaced earlier 19th century homes demolished to make way for progress. The earliest example is Dr. Foster's House (site 31, also photo 16), built at the turn of the century. An elegant brick residence, it recalls many popular 19th century eclectic details such as the art glass windows and decorative cornice.

Two early 20th century examples can be found in the next block of North Main Street. The Bourne House, built in 1916 (site 29, also photo 15), is an indeterminate modern style with many decorative details. The Schoolfield House, built in 1922 (site 27, also photo 15), is similar. Both residences integrate well with the surrounding late 19th century examples, due to similarity of scale, materials, and richness of design.

Two related examples are connected with Owenton's religious aspect. The site between the Bourne House and the Schoolfield House had been occupied by the First Christian Church since 1870. When the early church building burned in 1914, it was replaced by the present one. Designed by Frankfort architect L. Obermarth in the Classical Revival style, the church was built in 1915 and completes the early 20th century atmosphere of the block (site 28, also photo 15). On N.Adams Street, H.T.Herndon sold a portion of this property to the Baptist Church. The parsonage (site 36, also photo 19) was built there in 1904, and reflects an earlier style of building through its simple eclectic design.

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several openings from the rear porches, and the original clapboard is present on this portion of the house. There is a brick outbuilding to the rear of the property. The 1908 Sanborn map identifies this as a bake house, with an oven in the southern part. The 1925 Sanborn map identifies it as an ice house. The building is brick with square single pane windows, a center door with wooden lintel, and a standing seam metal gable roof. Repairs have been made to the north facade in concrete block. The entire property is surrounded by a low stone wall.

map. Lizzie Roberts was Owenton's postmistress during the late 1860's and it is thought that she conducted business from her home. In 1885, E.J. Roberts sold the house to B.F. Doty. The 1886 Sanborn map shows a one-story frame building, larger than that shown on 1883 map. In 1889, Doty sold to Dr. H.G. Smith. The 1893 Sanborn map shows the house enlarged to two stories and much as it appears today. Either Doty or Smith would have been responsible for the enlargement of the house, which seems to have taken place c. 1890, either immediately before or slightly after the transfer of title. Except for the front porch (which shows on the 1903 Sanborn map), the present appearance of the house is much the same as shown at the end of the 19th century. The building has been adapted for commercial use, and presently houses a barber shop.

Bracketed cornice and some of the decorative elements found on the front of the house are thought to be later 19th century additions. Rear has 6/6 windows, exterior end brick chimney at end of L, and 2-story porch in junction with square posts, plain balusters, and two entries at each level. Two-story wing has many openings, some double-hung 1/1 and some multipaned; plain cornice. Interior remodeled and updated; exterior aluminum sided.

Three existing outbuildings to rear of house. First is small two-story frame structure, rubble foundation, standing seam metal gable roof. Windows are floor-to-ceiling double-hung; door on west facade; clapboard exterior; stone and brick exterior end chimney on N. facade. Identified as servants' quarters on 1908 Sanborn map; possibly also summer kitchen. See photo 31. Second is one-story clapboard on brick foundation, standing seam metal gable roof. No openings except center paneled door. Unmarked on 1908 map; purpose unknown. See photo 31. Later outbuilding is found at NE corner behind house. Identified on 1908 map as buggy house, it is small frame w/ clapboard and a high-pitched gable roof of standing seam metal with decorative bargeboard at gable ends. See photo 32.

House is set high above N. Adams St., on wide front lawn. Surrounded by cast iron fence.

T.W. Staiar acquired house and property c. 1875; he was responsible for several improvements to the house, most notably the surrounding iron fence, installed during the 1890's. The house is present on the 1883 almanac map, in its present form. The 1908 Sanborn map identifies many of the outbuildings to the rear of the house, some of which are still standing. The interior of the house has had modern improvements added such as heating and air conditioning, and the exterior of the house has been covered in aluminum siding.
