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Architectural Description:

Glidden-Martin Hall is a three story, Jasper Quartzite building, located in Minnehaha County on the University of Sioux Falls Campus. South Dakota architects, Perkins and McWayne, designed the building in the Gothic Revival style. The University is located in the core of Sioux Falls and has played a vital role in the city's development.

The Sioux Quartzite building is three story rectangular plan with a central tower on the façade (east elevation) and a two-story wing on the west elevation. There is a water table above the first story windows which encompasses the entire building. The façade of the Hall has three one-over-one windows on each floor, on either side of the tower. The windows are within a three story recessed gothic arch. The five sided tower has a central entry with gothic arch doors. Above the doors were once transoms that have since replaced with fixed panes of glass. The middle portion of the tower has two small, one-over-one double hung windows on both the second and third floors. The four remaining sides each have one larger one-over-one double hung window. The tower is topped with a conical shape roof. There are four evenly spaced gable dormers across the roofline. Each has a one-over-one double hung window.

The north and south elevations are identical except for one entry door located in the center on the first floor of the south elevation. All three floors have three one-over-one double hung windows. The windows are recessed within a three story gothic arch. There are two gable dormers on both the north and south elevation with each having a one-over-one double hung window.

The west elevation of Glidden-Martin Hall is divided into four sections. The northwest and southwest sections are identical. Each floor has the following series of windows: a large one-over-one double hung window, a small one-over-one double hung window and a large one-over-one double hung window. The sets of larger one-over-one windows are recessed within a three story gothic arch window. The middle section, on the third floor, has two one-over-one double hung windows. There are four evenly spaced gable dormers at the roofline with one-over-one windows in each dormer. There is also a three-flue chimney in the center of the roofline. The forth section of the west elevation is a two story wing located at the center of this elevation. There are six engaged columns on this wing that rise one and one-half feet above the roof and have flared caps. There is a simple metal rail that is between each column above the roof. The north and south elevation of the wing have two one-over-one double hung windows on the first floor. The second floor has a ribbon of

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three two-over-two double hung windows. The west elevation of the wing has, from north to south, an entry door, two one-over-one double hung windows and an entry door. The second floor has three sets of ribbon windows. Each set has three two-over-two double hung windows. There is a fire escape that extends from the northeast corner of the wing to ground level.

Narrative Statement of Significance

When the Dakota Collegiate Institute (University of Sioux Falls) was first established, South Dakota was still know as the Dakota Territory and Sioux Falls had not yet been incorporated. The College was located on the western edge of town. Today, with the growth of the Sioux Falls area, the University is located in the heart of the city.

Glidden-Martin Hall, one of two excellent buildings that are the centerpiece of the University of Sioux Falls Campus, sits on the west side of a quadrangle that historically was bound to the south by Jordan Hall. Other buildings on the quadrangle now include: Jordan Hall, Pierce gym, the Salsbury Science Center, Salsbury Union and the Jeschke Fine Arts Center. Glidden-Martin Hall is one of the University's dominant features. It is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C as it embodies a distinctive characteristic of type, period or method of construction, represents the work of a master and possesses high artistic values.

In 1922, Josephine Glidden left a substantial gift to Sioux Falls College, with the instructions that the money be used to construct a woman's dormitory. With the large sum of money in place, the University hired the architectural firms of Perkins and McWayne to design the dormitory. Perkins and McWayne, located in Sioux Falls, were prominent architects of their time. Perkins and McWayne are credited with designing many important structures in the State of South Dakota, including: Sioux Falls YMCA, Farmers & Merchant Bank of Yankton, Bank of Brookings and many WPA projects throughout the State.

The building, completed in 1929, is believed to be the last building in Sioux Falls constructed of Sioux Quartzite according to University Officials. The building has served many uses since its completion. Since its construction, the building has seen multiple renovations of the interior space. The new renovations include classroom space and administrative offices on the first floor and the remaining floors used as dormitory rooms.

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Glidden-Martin Hall fits into a sub-type of Gothic Revival architecture. This type is called Collegiate Gothic and features gable roof, battlements and masonry construction. Glidden-Martin Hall also has the traditional features of Gothic Revival as well including windows with a pointed arch shape, many full scale windows, and doors showing pointed arches. The Gothic Revival style is more abundant in the northeastern states where architects popularized the style. In South Dakota, the Gothic Revival style is most typically used for churches so to find it in a public building of this magnitude reflects the style's importance.

Glidden-Martin Hall is eligible under Criterion C as it is an important representation of the Gothic Revival Style. A highly important architect to the State of South Dakota also designed the building. It is a significant building on the University of Sioux Falls campus and in the State of South Dakota.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary is an imaginary line encompassing only Glidden-Martin Hall at the University of Sioux Falls. Starting at a point 15 feet northeast of the northeast corner of the building the line runs west to a point 15 feet northwest of the northwest corner of the building, the boundary then runs south to a point 15 feet southwest of the southwest corner, it then runs east to a point 15 feet southeast of the southeast corner, the boundary then runs north to its original starting point.

Boundary Justification

The boundary includes Glidden-Martin Hall which has historically been part of the quadrangle on the University of Sioux Falls campus and maintains historic integrity.
