Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Located in downtown Vicksburg at the northwest corner of Monroe and South Streets, the Old Vicksburg Public Library is a two-story, stuccoed Mission Revival building constructed in 1916 on a concrete foundation. The red tile, truncated, gabled roof has hipped eaves that wrap the corners of the building, and curvilinear parapets are at the gable ends. The roof is finished with a denticulated cornice and paired brackets, and the widely overhanging eaves have shaped rafter tails.

The first floor extends below ground level and is distinguished on the exterior from the second floor by a heavy belt course. The first floor of the main facade features seven bays: six one-over-one, double-hung windows and a central doubleleaf, glazed aluminum door. The original doors were double-leaf, glazed, wooden doors with a five-light transom. The entrance is framed by a frontispiece composed of Doric columns supporting a heavy entablature. Above this is a casement window with a three-light transom, flanked by fluted Doric pilasters supporting a heavy entablature. This window allows light into the main stairwell, as do long, narrow, four-light fixed windows to either side. The other six bays on the second floor contain paired six-light casement windows capped with roundarched fanlights and resting on a spindle balustrade over glass. The frieze is decorated with a set of three square asteriated attic windows over each fanlight.

The southern elevation has a set of non-historic aluminum double-leaf, glazed doors that presently serve as the main entrance. The doors are crowned by a multi-light transom, and consoles support an entablature surmounted by a balustrade. There are three windows on the second level identical to those on the second floor of the main facade. Above each of these windows are three square asteriated attic windows, and a large rectangular vent is in the parapet wall.

While wall partitions have been added in the interior spaces, no historic elements have been damaged. The original staircase remains as do the original bookcases and radiators. The original wooden benches were removed when the Vicksburg-Warren County Library moved and were placed in the new building.

The building faces the Vicksburg Memorial Rose Garden situated in the esplanade in the middle of Monroe Street. In the same block is located the U.S. Post Office (1937) to the north of the Library and to the rear, northwest corner, is Vicksburg's City Hall (1903).

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Old Vicksburg Public Library is architecturally significant in the context of public/governmental architecture in Vicksburg, Mississippi. It exhibits an outstanding design that represents the highlight of development during Vicksburg's boom period. It is significant as the only public/governmental building in Vicksburg constructed in the Mission Revival style. While many residential buildings in Vicksburg were influenced by this style, the library is the only nonresidential Mission Revival and is the largest building constructed in the style. Please refer to the contextual statement for more information about the architecture of Vicksburg.

In 1910 the Vicksburg Library Association decided to contact Andrew Carnegie to ask if he would help the Association build a new library. A library of sorts had been established on the third floor of the new City Hall in 1903, but the Association needed a larger building.

The Carnegie Foundation agreed to build a library building if the community would provide the ground for the building and agree to support the library once it was established. The Civic League raised \$5,000, of which \$4,000 was used to purchase the lot and the remainder was used to purchase books and supplies. The plans were designed by Edward L. Tilton, an architect commissioned by the Foundation in New York City. The Library was completed in February 1916 at a cost of \$28,000, of which \$25,000 was provided by the Carnegie Foundation.

In 1979 the Vicksburg-Warren County Public Library moved into new quarters, and the City of Vicksburg acquired the building to house the City's Planning and Inspection Departments. The building is well maintained and interior modifications have been made sensitively in order that the historic character has not been compromised. The building is a Mississippi Landmark and as such falls under permit review of the Historic Preservation Division of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History.
