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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Eades Tavern is an example of a house that has been expanded to meet growing needs. The original portion of the house was constructed circa 1795. It is two stories in height and composed of log which has since been weatherboarded. This is the front portion of the house. It was built on a rock foundation which has been cemented over.

Behind the log portion are a brick extension and a separate brick ell that were added by Robert Trimble. These additions have been painted white to match the rest of the house.

The back porch was enclosed in the 1890's to hold Mrs. Lizzie Walker's school. This area has been converted to a kitchen and adjoining bedroom. The original dog trot was enclosed to make room for a bathroom. The oldest kitchen ell, probably log, was removed and replaced by a frame coal and wood shed.

The front hall and stairway which had been plastered were discovered to be built of upright boards of cherry. The plaster has been removed. The floors which were constructed on various levels, are composed of ash.

Following the slope of roof of the front two story portion of the house, the rear portions grow progressively shorter, with the back diminishing to one story. Each of the three sections has an entry door; and attempt has been made to tie together the three sections by placing amamall peaked roof over each door.

Eades Tavern, one of the oldest buildings in Paris, Ky., has served as a post office, tavern, school, home of a Paris newspaper editor and the early homeeand law office of Robert Trimble, who was appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court in 1826.

The log portion of Eades Tavern, the second tavern in Paris, Kentucky, was built by Thomas Eades circa 1795. In 1795 Eades Tavern became the first post office in Paris and the fifth in Kentucky, with Thomas Eades serving as its first postmaster.

In 1803 Eades Tavern became the home and law office of  $\mathbb R$ Robert Trimble, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Robert Trimble was born in Virginia in 1777 and came to Kentucky in 1780. He opened an English School and taught to earn the money to further his education. read law in the office of George Nichols, Kentucky 's first attorney general, and later in the office of James Brown, Kentucky's first secretary of state. Trimble was admitted to the bar in 1800 and began his practice in Paris, Ky. In 1802 he became a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives. Eades Tavern served as his home, law office and the place where he married his wife in 1803. 1807 Governor Christopher Greenup appointed Trimble to the Kentucky Court of Appeals. Two years later Trimble resigned to return to his law practice. Between 1809 and 1817 he declined all opportunities for public positions due to the low pay which was offered. These included re-election to the Kentucky House of Representatives, Chief Justice of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, the United States Senate, and a professorship at Transylvania University. In 1817 he was

appointed the second judge for the United States District Court of Kentucky. In 1826 President John Quincy Adams nominated Trimble to the United States Supreme Court. His confirmation took longer than that of any previous justice. The month-long delay was caused by his belief that federal land laws should prevail over state land laws; many Kentuckians took the opposite view. Trimble died of "maligmant bilious fever" on August 25, 1828, just two years after his appointment to the United States Supreme Court. Trimble County, Kentucky was named in his honor.

Mr. John Lisle Walker, editor of the Paris newspaper, purchased Eades Tavern in 1846. In the 1890's Mrs. Lizzie Walker conducted a private school in the rear of the house with the opening exercises, music and prayer being held in the parlor which was located in the log portion of the house. Eades Tavern has remained in the possession of the Walker family for the past 127 years.
