DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Four structures are included in the nomination, the church, parsonage, catechetical room and outhouse.

The church is a small $(26' \times 40')$ frame structure set on a high concrete block foundation. The three windows of each side are rounded at the top, and there is a plain glass fanlight over the ent ry in the front. The church is approached by a short flight of stone steps. The gable roof is covered in wood shingles and has a single brick chimney at the rear.

The one-room interior is basically unaltered, with wood floor and plaster walls and ceiling. Above the wainscoting, and again at the juncture of walls and ceiling, are traces of stencilling in varying degrees of preservation.

Renovation in 1917 consisted of the raising of the church to accommodate a full basement, but no changes were made to the basic integrity of the structure.

The parsonage is a rectangular, two-story frame house. It has two windows on each floor on each side. The front door to the extreme right of the front facade opens directly into the kitchen, a tradition found in many farmhouses of the period in Germany. A central chimney is on the gable roof. The foundation is stone. The interior is divided into three rooms on each floor, a living room, dining room and kitchen on the first floor, two bedrooms and a study on the second.

Set between and slightly to the rear of the church and parsonage are a four-hole outhouse and a very small frame structure called the "catechetical room", which was used as a classroom for children's religious instruction. Both are covered in vertical boards.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

St. John's Lutheran Church served for many years the spiritual needs of the small German community of Sharon Center, Iowa. Services in German provided important cultural ties with the homeland of most of the congregation, and contributed to the sense of community among strangers in a new land.

The congregation of the Evangelical St. John's German Lutheran Church was organized in 1870 by immigrants from Berlin, southern Germany, and Switzerland, who had come to the United States in 1866. It began as a mission under the Rev. J. Hoerlin, Sr., and was formally incorporated in 1875. At that time the church was built by parishioner Albert Drews with the assistance of the whole congregation. The coming of the first resident minister, H. Hertlein, in 1878, occasioned the construction of the parsonage beside the church, along with the catechetical room and outhouse.

Clergymen who served here included J. Leupp (1879-81), D. Hartman (1881-86), J. Kurtz (1886-96), his son Adolph (1896-99), and other men whose German names clearly showed the continuing ethnic tradition of this small parish. English services were introduced in 1905 "for the benefit of younger members". In the years between 1900 and the official closing of the church in 1955, the congregation grew progressively smaller and was forced to share ministers with other Lutheran churches in the area. From 1955 to 1958, a pastor from Iowa City conducted services in the Sharon Center church. Since then, an occasional funeral or family reunion has taken place on the church grounds, although the buildings are no longer usable.

St. John's Lutheran Church is one of a number of small, white-painted frame churches in the area which are among the few reminders left of the variety of ethnic traditions which once flourished in southern Johnson County.

Nonetheless, a small core of dedicated people, many of whom are descendants of original parishioners, retain a strong attachment to the church and the long-gone way of life it represents. St. John's, in compnay with the Irish-founded St. Stanislaus Church, west of Hills, and the Welsh Congregational Church to the northeast, are among the few reminders left of a variety of ethnic traditions which once flourished, on however small a scale, in the southern part of Johnson County.

(The formation of this congregation was part of an extended missionary effort originating with the parent congregation in Iowa City. During the 1870's, particularly under the encouragement of the Reverend Hoerlin, Sr., as many as six mission churches were founded in Johnson County and immediate environs. As far as is known, only St. John's Church and a church in Solon remain from that period of evangelical activity.)
