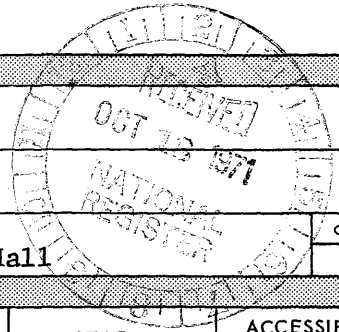

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The ten acre area nominated as the Stolley State Park Historic District includes three structures and the site of "Fort Independence."

The William Stolley residence, the oldest structure nominated, has remained virtually unchanged over the years. The log cabin was built by William Stolley in 1858-59 from cottonwood logs as a one story, with attic, two-room home. This building has been continuously occupied since 1859. In recent years new asphalt roof tile (the roof is still supported by the original cottonwood saplings) has been added along with clapboard siding. In 1894 a two story frame structure was added, on a "T" configuration, to the south of the original log cabin.

Located west of the Stolley log cabin is a reconstruction of the John Hann log house. The one-room log home was built by Herman Vasold for Fred Hedde in early 1858 who traded this house to William Stolley in late 1858 and was occupied for several months by the Hann family. The present structure is an accurate reconstruction of the original Hann log cabin. Logs for the restoration (July 4, 1932) came from the Ewoltd cabin built on Wood River in 1858 by Cay Ewoltd. The original Hann log cabin and the reconstruction had a slough-grass roof but this has been since replaced by hand-split wooden shingles, in the early 1900's, on the reconstructed Hann log cabin.

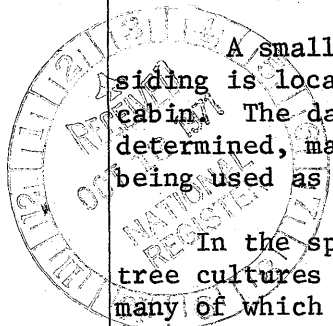
Located northeast of the Stolley cabin is the first public school building in Hall County (District No. 1), built in 1869-70. This one-room school house is of frame construction with clapboard siding and wood shingle roof and has remained virtually unchanged since it's construction, in 1869-70. At the present time the interior of the school house is in the process of being restored.

The site of "Fort Independence" is located 150 yards south of the Stolley home. Built jointly by William Stolley and his neighbors for protection during the Indian uprisings in 1864. The fortified blockhouse was built of cottonwood logs and measured 24 feet square. The roof was constructed of logs covered with sod. In the walls were 25 portholes arranged in two tiers. An underground stable for the horses (88 feet long) was excavated, adjoining the blockhouse on the west side, the roof of this also being constructed of logs and sod. At the present time a small stone fence marks the outline of the former blockhouse.

A small (approx. 12 by 6 feet) frame structure with board and batten siding is located between the Stolley home and the reconstructed Hann log cabin. The date of construction or use of this structure has not been determined, may possibly be a summer kitchen. At the present time it is being used as storage space.

In the spring of 1860 William Stolley began what was one of the first tree cultures in Nebraska. Over 6,000 trees were planted on his claim, many of which are still located in the area of the presently nominated Stolley State Park Historic District.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In May of 1857 a party of thirty-seven persons, comprised mostly of recent German immigrants from Schleswig-Holstein, under the sponsorship of the Davenport, Iowa banking firm of Chubb Brothers and Barrows left Davenport on a speculative enterprise of founding a town in the Platte Valley, in the center of the Territory of Nebraska.

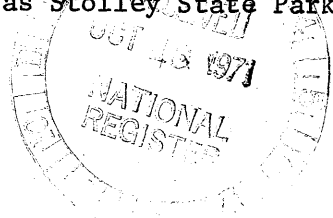
Under the guidance of William Stolley, the Town Company arrived at the site of the present city of Grand Island, Hall County, on July 4, 1857. At that time Stolley established there the first squatter's claim in the county and the Town Company, as a whole, built four log houses.

After the town site had been established, Stolley, in 1859-60, built a log home, patterned after log homes he observed in the early settlements of the present cities of Fremont and Columbus, through which the Town Company passed in their journey to Grand Island.

Through the initiative and able leadership of William Stolley the early colony survived a number of crisis that threatened the very existence of the settlement. During the Indian uprising of 1864, Stolley, with the cooperation of his neighbors, built one of the first and perhaps best private fortifications in Nebraska; in 1874, during a grasshopper scourge, he went to Washington and negotiated a \$150,000 loan for territorial relief and appealed to railroad magnet Jay Gould for free rail transportation for relief goods shipped to Nebraska, which he did secure.

Greatly interested in education, Stolley helped organize School District No. 1 in Hall County and served as a director for 40 years. He was also instrumental in the organization of the State Grange and the promotion of tree planting.

In 1927 the Stolley farmstead was presented to the State of Nebraska as a gift from the people of Grand Island and named as Stolley State Park by the Nebraska Legislature that same year.

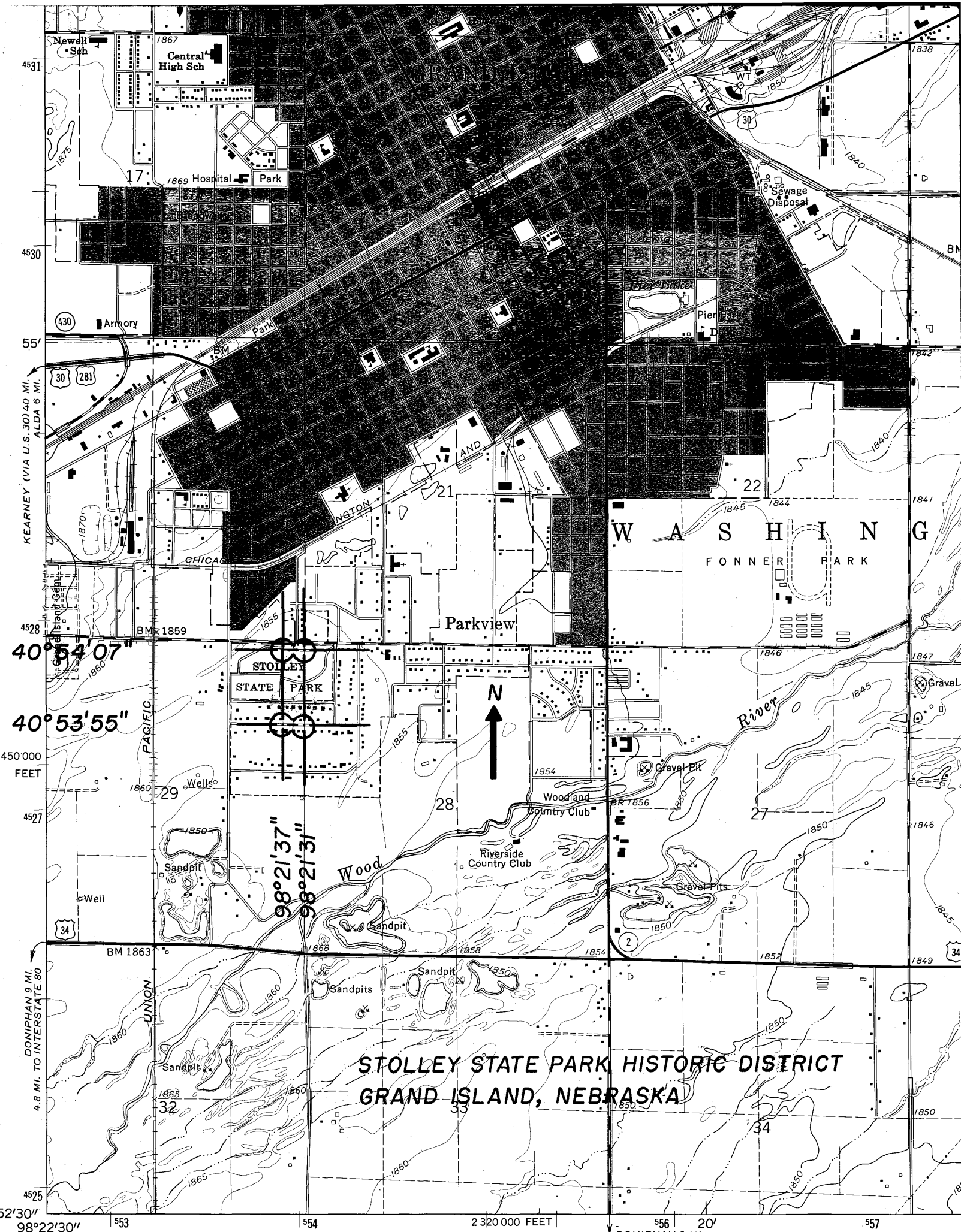

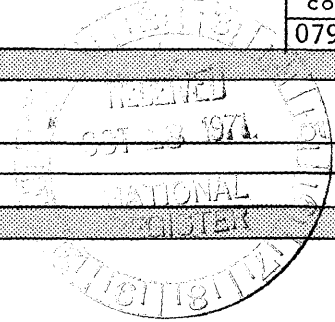

The six acre area nominated as the Stolley Park Historic District included three structures and the site of "Fort Independence."

The William Stolley residence, the oldest structure nominated, has remained virtually unchanged over the years. The log cabin was built by William Stolley in 1858-59 from cottonwood logs as a one and one-half story, two room home. This building has been continuously occupied since 1859. In recent years new asphalt shingles (the roof is still supported by the original cottonwood saplings) have been added along with clapboard siding. In 1894 a two-story frame structure was added, on a "T" configuration, to the south of the original log cabin.

Located northeast of the Stolley cabin is the first public school building in Hall County (District No. 1) built in 1869-70. This one-room school house is of frame construction with clapboard siding and wood shingle roof. It has been slightly altered since its construction in 1869-70. The school was relocated to its present site. A new shingle roof and interior plaster restoration have been completed.

Located west of the Stolley log cabin is a reconstruction of the John Hann log house. The one-room log home was built by Herman Vasold for Fred Hedde in early 1858. Mr. Hedde traded this house to William Stolley in late 1858 and the house was occupied for several months by the Hann family. The present structure is an accurate reconstruction of the original Hann log cabin. Logs for the restoration (completed July 4, 1932) came from the Ewoldt cabin built on Wood River in 1858 by Cay Ewoldt. The original Hann log cabin had slough-grass roof but this was replaced by hand-split wooden shingles, in the early 1900's. The reconstructed Hann log cabin has split-wood shingles.

The boundaries to the William Stolley Homestead and Site of Fort Independence have been altered from those originally included in the Stolley State Park Historic District. The southern boundary, upon survey, was discovered to include a modern housing development, a result of an error in figuring the original longitude and latitude. The eastern boundary was expanded slightly to include protection of School District #1 building. The northern and western boundaries were reduced because park development since 1927 has substantially altered the appearance of these areas.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In the spring of 1857 thirty-seven German immigrants left Davenport, Iowa, to establish a town in the Central Platte Valley of Nebraska Territory. The town company was sponsored by the Washington, D.C., banking firm of Chubb Brothers and Barrows. The party was lead by Fred Hedde, with William Stolley being an important official. On July 4, 1857, the party established a townsite about one mile north of the famed Grand Island of the Platte River, naming their settlement in its honor. Stolley filed the first squatter's claim and the company constructed four log houses.

During the winter of 1857-58, the Chubb Brothers and Barrows Bank failed. Left without financial support, the company abandoned the town and established individual family farms.

In 1859-60 William Stolley built a log house which still stands. During the Indian uprisings of 1864, a fortification was established on the Stolley farm. It was named "Fort Independence" and was constructed of cottonwood logs and sod. Stolley served on an 1874 committee which petitioned the Congress for relief from the grasshopper plagues. Largely through his efforts \$150,000 was appropriated and Nebraska railroads agreed to transport relief goods free of charge.

Greatly interested in education, Stolley helped organize School District No. 1 in Hall County and served as a director for 40 years. He was also instrumental in the organization of the State Grange and the promotion of tree planting. Stolley was a member of the Hall County Agricultural Society.

In 1927 the Stolley farmstead was presented to the State of Nebraska as a gift from the people of Grand Island and named Stolley State Park by the Nebraska Legislature that same year. In January, 1974, Stolley Park was transferred to the City of Grand Island.
