

SUMMARY

The Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is a departure for Silas Owens, Sr., from the usual herringbone pattern he displayed on most of his Mixed Masonry homes in the Faulkner County area. The house form is distinct as well, though he used his favored porch arcades. This house features a front-gabled configuration and the coursing is very linear, employing long, thin sandstones in a more geometric pattern. The result is a very pleasing mixture of Craftsman and Mediterranean with a gabled roof on a concrete foundation.

ELABORATION

The front, western façade of the Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is fenestrated north to south with two six-beside-six casement windows flanking a wide off-center chimney with graduated, rounded shoulders. A paneled, single-leaf front door with a three-light window opens into the house from the recessed wall under the front porch. A single six-over-six, double-hung window is placed at the southwest corner beside the door. The front porch features two arches lined with cream brick. Centered in the wall beneath the apex of the gable is a concrete panel reading "1942," the construction date of the house.

The southern elevation under the front porch features a single-leaf door similar to the one on the western wall. Access to the porch is through a third arch. This elevation is fenestrated west to east, by a pair of one-over-one, double-hung windows, a single window and a second pair. An infilled arch containing a jalousie window is situated at the southeast corner.

The rear, eastern wall features two arches at the southeast corner. The western arch is infilled with a jalousie window and the second, northern arch is infilled with a glass storm door flanked by two sidelights. A pair of short, double-hung windows lights the northeast corner.

The northern elevation is fenestrated east to west by a single window, a pair of windows, a second single window and a second pair at the northwest corner. A tall cream brick interior chimney rises from the roof at the back of the house.

SUMMARY

The Quattlebaum-Pelletier House in Twin Groves, constructed 1942, is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as a good example of a Craftsman and Mediterranean influenced Mixed Masonry residence. The Faulkner County home was constructed and veneered by master craftsman Silas Owens, Sr., and features the creative stone coursing emblematic of Owens' work. The nomination is also being submitted under the multiple property context, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

ELABORATION

Information on the history of the Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is scarce at this point. The last owner, Max Pelletier passed away in 2004 leaving his daughter, Vicki Trammell, the house. The Pelletier family moved to the Twin Groves area in 1962 and Max supported his family with dairy farming, an occupation that many of his neighbors engaged in. Kyle Quattlebaum had the house built and is attributed with initiating telephone service across Cadron Creek. Quattlebaum owned 600 acres of land, which he logged and he also ran a small sawmill.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is being nominated to the National Register with local significance under Criterion C. The geometric coursing of Silas Owens' stone work fits well with the low lines of the home. After the rerouting of US Highway 65 in the 1990s, the house was situated away from the main thoroughfare, giving it the feel of an isolated country home less

than a mile north of Cadron Creek. The house is architecturally intact and an excellent example of the diversity of Owens' considerable skill. The Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is also being submitted under the multiple property context, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."



ABSTRACT/SUMMARY COMMENTS:

The Quattlebaum-Pelletier House is locally significant under Criterion C as an example of a mixed-masonry residence that displays Craftsman and Mediterranean influences. It was designed and built by master craftsman Silas Owens, Sr., in 1942 and features the creative stone coursing characteristic of Owens' work. The property is associated with the Multiple Property Submission "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955." Today, the house retains integrity from its period of significance and reflects Owens' craftsmanship and contributions to the architectural history of Faulkner County.




