Fitch's General Store and House consists of a two-and-a-half story gable front building which is connected to a two-and-a-half story dwelling by a two story ell. The entire complex is of wood frame construction and is set in a wooded rural area near the Northwest River. It is sheathed in clapboards, rests on a granite foundation, and features modest Greek Revival and Italianate elements.

The front (west) elevation of the complex is distinguished by its asymmetry and irregular fenestration. A low pitch gable front roof frames the facade of the store which is punctuated by a single, centrally located nine-over-six double hung window on the attic story and two nine-over-six double hung sash on the second floor. Window mouldings on the upper stories, corner pilasters, cornice returns, and the building's overall massing all appear to be inspired by the Greek Revival manner.

While the complex was probably constructed around 1870, the storefront was added to the stable in 1920 when the family business relocated there. The two large six-pane fixed sash that flank the centrally located doorway appear to date from this remodelling. A single story shed roof porch supported by four columns shelters the storefront.

The second story of the connecting ell features four three-over-three double hung windows above which runs a simple, continuous frieze. A medium pitch side gable roof intersects with the store on the north and the main house on the south. The first story of the ell has five bays. A six-over-six double hung window and wooden door (surmounted by a bracketed hood) flank a sliding barn door with a centrally located six-pane fixed window. Two one-over-one double hung sash are located on the south end of the ell and may have been added later. In contrast to the stable, the narrow pilasters and projecting window mouldings on the ell are Italianate in manner.

The cross gable roofed main house features two curving Italianate lintels over two windows on the attic story. Four sets of paired four-over-four double hung sash are located asymmetrically on the first and second floor. On the first story a porch wraps around the west and south sides of the gable end facade. The one story porch is supported by three posts which rest on the painted wooden floor. The added bay window located under the porch on the south elevation heightens the exterior asymmetry of the main house.

Later additions to the buildings are clearly visible on the rear (east) elevation of the complex. Chief among these is a narrow two-storied bay addition on the north facade of the main house where the roof line extends out from the cornice return giving the visual effect of a double roof. This addition appears to post-date the ell. The rear porch on the main house and

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outhouse at the back of the store are probably later accretions.

The interior of the store retains a high degree of integrity with many original features dating from 1920 when the former stable was converted into a store. Acoustical tile has been placed over the ceiling in the main store area. On the second story, a centrally located single truss supports the floor, presumably, to allow for an unobstructed interior space on the first story. The second story houses a remarkable collection of historic general store merchandise and advertising material.

Fitch's General Store and House is an unusually intact general merchandise country store and residence that has been operating continuously in East Sebago since 1920. The business was moved to its present site after the original store, located across the street was destroyed by fire in 1919. The frame complex itself (which now houses the store) was built about 1870 as a private residence for George E. Fitch. It is eligible for nomination to the National Register under criterion A for its local commercial significance and criterion C for its local architectural significance.

Fitch's General Store and House is one of the last standing historic structures in the village of East Sebago. In the 1920's, it was the center of the village which contained a lumber mill, a grist mill, several dwellings, a rival general merchandise store, and a local school. Today, the store remains as the most important commercial enterprise in the area. Beyond its interest as a representative example of a nineteenth century extended residential complex, this property is a remarkable survival of an early twentieth century country store. It is the descendant of a family enterprise that has continued for nearly two hundred years.

William Fitch of Groton, Massachusetts first settled in the area in 1793 and soon after built a lumber mill on the Northwest River near the present store. William was active in local politics, was postmaster for many years, and served in the state legislature from 1822-24. In 1850, the Industrial Schedule of the Census records that William's son Luther Fitch had two employees and was producing 150,000 board feet of lumber with a value of \$900.00. By 1860, the Census reports that the Fitch lumber mill was producing 300,000 board feet a year and a grist mill was also in operation. Like his father, Luther was involved in both local and state politics serving as selectman for Sebago for many years and being elected to the state legislature in 1871.

In 1832, Luther Fitch built a store on the west side of Long Hill Road. An historic photograph shows a simple two-and-one half story frame structure with a first floor porch very similar in appearance to that found on the present store. Around 1870, Luther's son George E. Fitch built the existing frame complex which now houses the store for his residence. The business was taken over by Luther's son George around 1885 and by his son Montford in 1909. In October of 1919, lightning struck and consequently burned down the original store. The following spring, Montford contracted for the conversion of his father's stable into a store. In 1957, Montford's son Laurence took over the store and is still the proprietor.
