The stone arch bridge spans McCormick's Creek above the falls, taking a road that was originally a switchback extension of the main park road running east northwestward over the creek. (The original park road has since been extended further east and another bridge crosses the creek further upstream to take visitors to the Nature Center and the swimning pool, both constructed in the 1970s.) Above the usually shallow, rapid creek, the bridge nestles in a stony canyon roughly thirty feet deep amidst hilly, wooded terrain (see photo 1). The paved (originally gravel) roadway, running northwest-southeast, is twenty feet wide between solid stone masonry walls about two feet high above the road surface (see photo 2). The bridge is slightly humped in the center. At the south end of the easternmost wall is a cornerstone inscribed "Erected under direction of Indiana Department of Conservation/C.C.C. Co. 589/McCormicks Creek Camp S.P. 4-1934." (See photo 3.) The walls extend at about a 45 degree angle down and around to form retaining walls against the canyon at either end of the bridge (see photo 4). The bridge is solidly constructed of mortared roughcut limestone throughout, faced with sawn stone for a more attractive appearance. The round arch spans 54 feet and is approximately 25 feet at its highest point.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Settled above the stone canyons of rocky McCormick's Creek, the stone arch bridge at McCormick's Creek State Park is the best example of an arched bridge constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps in any Indiana state park. It is the only such vehicular bridge built completely of stone, not simply faced with the material over a formed concrete core. It stands as a splendid material record of an important area of New Deal public works and recreational development in Indiana state parks during the 1930s, as described in the historic context "New Deal Work Programs in Indiana State Parks." As noted in the associated property type identified as "Properties associated with New Deal work projects related to infrastructure development," the stone arch bridge, a resource related to public access, is eligible under Criterion A (in the areas of recreation and in social history) because it is associated with the New Deal's work programs and park development in the 1930s. The structure is also eligible under Criterion C because it is an outstanding example of the work and the style of architecture typical of the CCC. The bridge meets all the standards of integrity established in the multiple property nomination "New Deal Resources in Indiana State Parks." The bridge stands in its original location in its original setting, the design and materials intact. The structure is representative of and associated with typical CCC workmanship, that is, stone masonry. The integrity of the property's feeling is strong.

McCormick's Creek State Park was the first of Indiana's state parks. established in 1916 even before the Indiana Department of Conservation was created. Within a few years, an existing building was remodeled into a park inn, some picnic areas established, and a few trails built. The park was very popular, and the Department of Conservation saw to the construction of a swimming pool and bath house near the inn in the late 1920s. McCormick's Creek also boasted group camping facilities. But with the continuously growing usage of the park, clearly more of it needed to be made accessible to visitors. The establishment of CCC Company 589 at Camp SP-4 from November 1933 until July 1935 brought to fruition an ambitious and much-needed new development program at McCormick's Creek. The CCC boys worked on reforestation, landscaping, the construction of numerous outdoor recreational facilities, and the supporting infrastructure, which included additional trails and roads. The stone arch bridge falls into the category of infrastructure, albeit far beyond merely functional in its design. By constructing the bridge across McCormick's Creek at this point, the area known as Beech Grove (presently part of the camporound) became accessible to park visitors by way of a scenic road that essentially paralleled the creek past Echo Canyon and then veered northward. The area above Echo Canyon, too, was now able to be developed as a picnic area.

Records do not indicate why the CCC constructed no other stone masonry bridges in the state parks, although they built several arched bridges faced with stone, even a triple-arched bridge at Spring Mill. Cost was probably the most important consideration. (See Outdoor Indiana, August 1934, p. 21) Most of the stone came from a quarry east of Ellettsville, salvaged from the grout pile, stone which the milling companies had rejected. The sawed facing stone was donated by a company in Bloomington. It took six months, using hand tools, to prepare the stone for the bridge under the watchful eyes of a foreman from Bloomington. Joe Dalton, and a Gosport stonemason named Carter. The bridge was completed in the latter part of 1934. That this was an unusual project is perhaps evidenced by the fact that the cornerstone on the bridge contains photographs and the names of everyone who worked on it. Certainly the Department of Conservation must have been immensely pleased with the structure, as its photograph appears frequently in Outdoor Indiana and general publicity material throughout the 1930s and to this day. The use of native stone was in keeping with both NPS quidelines and the policy of the state Department of Conservation. The material harmonizes visually with the specific setting and the park environment as a whole. While the rusticated limestone is in keeping with the general park rustic mode, the stone arch bridge seems also to have been influenced by the Romanesque Revival, a popular style for vehicular and railroad bridges in Indiana well into the 1930s.
