Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Alfred W. Roberts House is a large, two-story, wood-framed, Victorian eclectic style structure with classical detailing. It is situated on the top of a hill near the center of the small town of Ball Ground.

Exterior architectural features include a single-story balustraded porch with Doric columns across the east and part of the south facades, marble front steps, bracketed cornices, and brick chimneys. The house has a complex roof line with multiple gables, several of which have a decorative feather-cut shingle pattern, windows, and louvered windows. Most windows are two over two and several have louvered shutters.

Interior features include French doors, chair rail, vertical panel tongue-andgroove wainscoting, picture rail, walls with horizontal boards, and original door knobs and locks. The plan consists of an asymmetrical arrangement of rooms around a plantation plain type core.

It is believed that the oldest part of the house dates from the mid-1850s, and is comprised of the central part that originally consisted of two rooms over two with central hall and stairway, and two chimneys on the west wall. The kitchen and dining room building was detached and located just west of the main house. The house was enlarged in the late 1880s with the addition of rooms on both levels, and sides, to the west and to the east, and Victorian decorative elements on the exterior and interior. Between 1910 and 1920 other modifications included the addition of electrical wiring, the construction of the log pump house and the two-story barn, and the addition of Doric columns and balustrade on the front porch.

The property is landscaped with red maple, Norway spruce, magnolia, and hemlock trees. A marble sidewalk is located in front of the house and extends diagonally to the street. To the southeast of the house are an overgrown rock garden and former fish pond covered in ivy and periwinkle. The yard also contains marble birdbaths, urns, benches, and a pet cemetery with marble monuments. Outbuildings include a two-story barn, garage, lob pump-house, and a well house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Alfred W. Roberts House is significant in the areas of architecture, landscape architecture, and local history.

The house is significant <u>architecturally</u> as one of Ball Ground's largest houses that was originally constructed in the mid-19th century and enlarged at the turn of the century. It is a good example of an evolved house that reflects changing architectural tastes, a practice that was common in small towns in Georgia and the southeast in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. It is important for its unusual eclectic style which encompasses plantation plain, Victorian, and Classical elements, reflecting the historical development of the property between 1855 and 1932. Important exterior architectural details include the balustraded porch with Doric columns, marble front steps, bracketed cornices, brick chimneys, and multiple gables with decorative feather-cut shingle pattern. Significant interior features associated with the late 19th century period include French doors, chair rail, baseboards, vertical panel tongue-and-groove wainscoting, picture rail, walls with horizontal boards, and original knobs and door locks.

The significant interior features associated with the mid-19th-century plantation plain style two-over-two room house imbedded in the present house include: hand-hewn sills in the basement that are mortised and tenoned together; wide boards on stairway wall to basement; wide baseboards and floor boards, and a slightly crude two panel door in a first floor bedroom; and wide ceiling boards, old mantel, wide baseboards, two panel door, and low ceiling in a second story bedroom. The property has several notable outbuildings which consist of a barn, garage, log pump-house, and a well house.

In terms of <u>landscape architecture</u>, the Alfred W. Roberts House is important for its rock garden, marble sidewalks, benches, steps, birdbaths, urns, and pet cemetery. The property is landscaped with large old red maple, Norway spruce, magnolia, oak, hemlock, Yuka, cypress, cedar, and dogwood trees. In addition, the property has informally planted shrubbery, including boxwood, acuba, and ivy.

The property is significant in the area of local history for its association with the family of Alfred W. Roberts (1844-1918), a prominent merchant and charter citizen of the town of Ball Ground. Alfred W. Roberts purchased the property around 1890 and enlarged and remodeled the original plantation plain style structure to include Victorian detailing around 1898. In the late 1910s the style of the exterior of the house was altered again with the addition of a Classical front porch. A.W. Roberts served in the Confederate Army, and in 1879, he married Althea Georgia Ann Coggins (1861-1932), and they had seven children. His marriage into the Coggins family, who were associated with early business concerns in the Canton area, enabled him to broaden his business contacts in the granite, banking, and retailing businesses. Ball Ground was incorporated in 1883, and A.W. Roberts was involved in most phases of the town's early development as a banker, real estate developer, cotton broker, and creater of the Roberts Marble Company. He was one of the founders of the Bank of Ball Ground in 1906, and founded the Roberts Store which served the town for about 80 In addition, his sons Judson, Clyde, and Paul owned and operated the family marble years. monument business. In an effort to provide electricity for the marble manufacturing company as well as local residents in Ball Ground, the Roberts brothers built a log dam on Long Swamp Creek creating a 65 acre lake. This facility brought the first electricity to Ball Ground and was later purchased by the Georgia Power Company.

Descendants of Alfred W. Roberts maintain and live on the property today.


