The Armory has deteriorated from neglect and vandalism. Extensive work will be necessary to stabilize the exterior. Roof repair, including gutters and cornices, replacing of broken windows and paint will be necessary as first steps. An architectural survey last year reported the building as structually sound and worthy of restoration.


The Armory is a rectangular frame building, 62' x 90', built on a masonry foundation, and is Victorian Gothic in design. The first two floors of the building occupy the entire corner lot and support an A-frame roof. The third floor runs across the front only and supports a turret or lookout tower at each end.

Details of the facade consist of the main entrance with double doors and is reached by a flight of masonry steps. The doorway is enhanced by a clear glass fanlight and an arched cornice above. On the second floor a short balcony extends over the main entrance and has a door similar in design but smaller. The second floor roofline has a deep cornice which terminates in a short cornice return on the facade. The third floor cornice is more elaborate with a center arch and fret work. A single window opens under the arch onto the flag staff. The pointed turrets are six sided with a window in each side.

The main entrance opens into a lobby with a stairway at either side. Double doors lead from the lobby into the 70' drill hall which comprises the rest of the first floor. A large archway in the center of the room supports the high ceiling and there are balconies which run the lengthh of the hall.

The second floor is divided into several rooms which provided meeting rooms, offices and storage space for equipment. Numerous large double-hung windows provide light and air on the first two floors.

Only minor alterations appear to have been made in this building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Historic - Built at the turn of the century to serve Monroe County and Key West as housing for arms and men.

Architecture - The turn of the century was an opulent period in Key West's history. The census in 1890 had found it to be the state's largest and wealthiest city. Although isolated from the Florida mainland by sea, it was a vigorous and cosmopolitan community. A major seaport, its cigar and sponge products were at the peak of their production. The Armory exemplifies this period in the island's architectural heritage and is one of the few remaining large frame buildings.

Designed by T. F. Russell and built by John T. Sawyer, the building's distinctive style was popular in Key West at this time. Another outstanding example of Russell's design was William Curry and Sons, ship chandlery which before it was destroyed by fire in the early 1960's was a famous landmark. It had been selected just a short time before by the Florida Board of Parks and Historic Memorials as a worthy site.

Military History - Since its settlement in 1822 Key West has been of strategic importance to the Federal Government. The British and Spanish, during their occupation of Florida, were aware of its military potentialities but failed to act and it was not until Florida was ceded to the United States in 1821 that steps were taken to use the island. In 1823 the Navy made it the base for a special anti-pirate squadron and in 1831 the Army Post was established. The construction of a major fortification, Ft. Zachary Taylor, was begun in 1845 and since that time additional military installations have been added until by 1967 the military occupied 29.2% of the urban area of Key West.

Through the years civilian volunteers have supplemented the government forces. They were first called upon to serve in land and sea patrols in the Seminole War. Shortly after the Civil War began, a company of loyal citizens placed themselves under the Army commander of the island to aid in (continued)



preventing Key West from falling into the hands of the Confederacy. The island remained an important Union base throughout the conflict.

After the war the Key West Rifles were organized and they were followed in 1888 by the Island City Guards. In 1901, Monroe County purchased a lot directly opposite the entrance to the U.S. Army Cantonment and built the Armory. A ruling by the Florida Supreme Court declared that it was the state's responsibility to furnish armories and the cost was refunded to the county. Since 1903 the Armory has been owned by the State of Florida.
