

Paris Multiple Resource Area (Pendrey, Joe and Zena, Bungalow)

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SIGNIFICANCE:

The Pendrey house is architecturally significant as an unaltered example of Paris's most common bungalow and Prairie School plan, the gable-front house with an inset half front porch. The house's brackets, shed dormer, notched bargeboards, exposed rafters, and battered pillar make it a good illustration of bungalow ornamentation as well. The strip of column-like bandsawed pieces in the front gable is a reference to the classical ornamentation of the Colonial Revival. The gable-front plan with an inset half porch is found in a 1910 bungalow (site 63), and an undated example (site 85). The 1910 Telephone Company bungalow is very similar to the Pendrey house, but has a wider porch and lacks the bandsawed ornament. The undated Jaussi bungalow has a similar "I" strip and adds a "Palladian" window in a steeper gable.

The reported original owner of the house was Joe Pendrey, a clerk. The house is apparently unaltered; the front window may have been reglazed.
