2 story, brick, hip roof w/dormer; jerkin heads on dormers: bay window on S.: brick voussoirs in flat arches and stone keys; pedimented portico over central entrance: transom: stone water table; limestone foundation; segmental arched windows off porch on V: frame section joins brick and an orginal stone kitchen w/external stone slope shouldered chimney; INTERIOR: central hall has closed strips stair in rear w/paneled string; turned balusters shaped like crosses; wood arch in hallway w/egg and dart molding, dentils and brackets; NE rm has mantel w/overmantel. large columns w/Corinthian capitals: mantel shelf has carved decorative heads: Vic. mantel w/colonettes and overmantel w/mirror in SE rm.; bay window w/fluted columns and decorative brackets; mantel w/overmantel decorated w/bead and real and egg and dart on capitals of columns: Greek fret or key on mantel shelf: stair on W open string w/simple brackets and turned balusters: square newel post w/chamfered corners; UPSTAIRS: čast iron mantel in SW rm; NV rm. has mantel w/square columns placed on the diagonal to create a diamond effect: decorative capitals and overmantel. Small room on 2nd floor over central entrance was used as a private chapel. Altar presently housed in WS-30.

DFTENDENCY: 6/1 common bond brick meat house w/pyramidal roof: segmental arch w/stone keystone over doors. To northeast of house.

HISTORY:

Matthew Walton Farm, Bardstown Road

Probably original land grant. At his death about 1818 it was willed to Frances, his widow. She soon married John Pope. They sold to John Jackson for \$10,940, 22 October 1841, Deed Bk O, page 317. Tract called Walton House Farm. 547 acres estimated. Bk O, p. 319 Jackson mortgaged it to John Pope for \$10,940 - full amount. Paid for and released October 24, 1861.

Bess Campbell Barber says the original house was a 2 story Brick very similar to the William Whitley House in Lincoln County, and built shortly thereafter. The house was so worn out, bricks crumbling etc, that the Barbers, then owners, tore it down and built about 1904/5 by same builders who had contract for St. Catherines' at same time. Mr. Brewer was architect from Taylorsville. Mr. McClelland, brick contractor. Same contractors on old high school.

John Jackson sold to Wade Moore December, 1858, 658 acres, \$7440.00. Book V, p 296.

Commissioner Sale 1863 involved several suits. All suits dismissed and P. S. Earber bought the farm May 1872, Book 29, p. 88.

P. S. Barber to son, John R. Barber.

John R. estate to Alex Barber.

Alex Barber heir, Bess Campbell Barber, to Hilory Boone of Lexington, a grandson of John R. Barber.


Boone sold to present owner, Tommy Hamilton 2 or 3 years ago.


Only stone kitchen of original house remains. Another building is the General Matthew Walton law office, fairly close to the house (See WS-30)


