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#### **Narrative Description**

The West Hill Historic District is located in Muscatine on the hill immediately west of the Downtown Commercial Historic District, leading up to and along the bluff in the west end of the Original Town plat. Locally, it is currently and has been historically known as the "West Hill" neighborhood. The boundary includes W. 2<sup>nd</sup> St from Pine Street to Ash Street, W. 3rd Street from Chestnut Street to slightly west of Ash Street, and W. 4th Street from Chestnut Street to slightly west of Cherry Street. The houses along parts of W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street and W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street overlook the Mississippi River to the south-southeast. The hill peaks near Reservoir Park, a square at the intersection of W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Broadway. The housing stock in this neighborhood varies from small working or middle class houses to large residences built by the most prosperous citizens in Muscatine in the middle and late 19th century. The period of significance extends from 1839 to 1958. By 1915, 180 of the 208 extant historic houses had been constructed. The remaining 28 were built from 1916 to 1958, with an additional eight houses built from 1960 to 1995. About 80% of the houses are two stories in height. About 70% of the houses utilize frame construction, and the remaining houses are primarily brick. However, while only about 9% of extant 19<sup>th</sup> century houses in Muscatine are brick, brick houses represent 35% of the 19<sup>th</sup> century houses in this area. Overall, there are 334 resources in the West Hill Historic District, including 267 contributing resources (including 4 houses and 1 carriage house previously listed on the National Register of Historic Places) and 67 non-contributing resources. These properties include 216 residential properties, typically composed of a house or a house and garage. The contributing resources comprise 197 houses, 66 outbuildings (primarily garages), two objects (grave marker and set of steps), and two sites (park and network of streets/alleys/sidewalks/walls). The non-contributing resources include 19 non-contributing houses and 48 non-contributing garages.

Muscatine is located on the Mississippi River in southeast Iowa (location map, page 109), and the Original Town plat was centered on a relatively flat section of land along the nver, framed by the bluffs and hills. It was platted parallel to the river, which runs in a west-southwest direction at this point. Residential development moved up the hills, leaving commercial and industrial development on the more level land near the river. The three main streets in the West Hill Historic District (2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup>) run roughly parallel to the river, extending up from the downtown. The topography of this section of Muscatine plays a key role in defining the boundaries of the West Hill Historic District. The start of the hill near the west end of the downtown commercial area also marks the transition into residential development. The transition from commercial into historic residential uses creates the east boundary of the district. As the elevation rises, a bluff is created along the south-southeast edge of the neighborhood, which creates the south boundary. The hill crests near Reservoir Park (700 block W. 4th Street, Map #217, district map on page 6), at the intersection of 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Broadway. 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> streets gradually rise to this point, with the west end of 2<sup>nd</sup> Street located partially down the bluff. The west-southwest edge of the Original Town plat is located slightly west of this crest, and this line creates the west boundary of the historic district. Fifth Street, one north of 4<sup>th</sup> Street, is generally located off of the hill, with some housing on the side of the hill and the majority at a lower elevation. Thus, the north boundary is typically the alley between 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> streets, the edge of the housing consistently on the hill and connected with the development throughout the rest of the historic district.

The blocks within the Original Town plat were laid out with ten lots, divided by an alley in the middle. Initially, development in the West Hill Historic District occurred on one or several adjoining lots. However, by the 1880s, lots were subdivided, with multiple houses constructed on several of the lots. Only a couple of blocks have the platted

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five houses per side; most blocks have more or fewer houses. Larger lots were retained for premium locations, such as those locations along 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> streets with river views. On the remaining blocks, the five lots were divided into sites for seven or eight houses. Setbacks for the houses vary slightly, but they are generally uniform on most blocks. Early development tended to occur close to the street, and some later houses are set back further on lots. The condition of the buildings throughout the West Hill Historic District varies from fair to excellent. Later additions, such as porches, were constructed on several of the homes in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, and many of these historic alterations have achieved significance in their own right. Trees were planted along the main streets, particularly 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, creating a canopy historically and currently. Reservoir Park (or Fourth Street Square) was originally platted as a public square (700 block W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #217). While the courthouse square was located near the center of the town plat on a typical block, the public square stands out in the plat as streets intersect the square at the middle of the block, creating a view of the square from all sides. The reason for this design is unknown, but the park retains this original design feature in the West Hill neighborhood.

While the West Hill Historic District is known for some of the oldest and largest historic houses in Muscatine, the housing stock through the area is mixed between large and small, high style and vernacular. About 80% of the extant houses are two stories in height. Early development in the neighborhood in the 1840s and 1850s was primarily smaller frame houses. Many of these houses were later replaced by larger, more substantial dwellings. Though over 100 houses were built in the West Hill neighborhood by 1870, only 48 remain standing, about 23% of extant houses. These houses represent a slightly more substantial cross section than houses constructed at the time. The vast majority of the houses are two-story dwellings, with only one one-story and seven one-and-orie-half-story houses remaining. One-third of the houses have a strong recognizable architectural style, while the rest represent more vernacular dwellings. About half of these houses have side gable roofs, while the other half has gable-front rooflines. These houses may be simply defined by the roofline and height, with no additional stylistic elements. Two-thirds of the extant houses are frame construction, with the remainder brick.

Architectural styles in the 1840s, 1850s, and 1860s in the West Hill Historic District represent the typical styles constructed across the country. A few Greek Revival houses remain, including one of the best examples of the style in Iowa (J.C.B. Warde House, 1852-1854, 205 Cherry, Map #102). These houses are characterized by symmetrical facades, wide cornice lines, gable returns, six-over-six-light double-hung windows, entry porch or porticos, and entries with sidelights and transom windows. One substantial brick Gothic Revival house stands in the neighborhood (Abraham and Eliza Smalley house, c.1861, 814 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #40), distinguished by its steeply pitched cross gable roofline. The Italianate and Italian villa styles began to be built in this period, lasting into the 1880s in the West Hill neighborhood. The Italianate style is characterized by tall narrow windows, distinctive window hoods, arch windows, wide eaves, low pitched roof, cupola, and large decorative brackets. The West Hill Historic District includes five of the best examples of Italianate or Italian villa houses in Muscatine (Stone-Robertson House, c.1852, 614 W. 3rd Street, Map #88; Henry Waterman Moore House, c.1852, 716 W. 3rd Street, Map #97; Pliney and Adelia Fay House, c.1855, 112 Locust, Map #30; Henry and Catherine Funck House, c.1860, 306 W. 3rd Street, Map #51; and Stone-Richman-Musser House, c.1860, 606 W. 3rd Street, Map #87). Around 25 houses in the West Hill Historic District reflect strong elements of the Italianate style, spanning from the 1850s to the 1880s. Other houses built reflect some elements of this style to a lesser degree, such as wide eaves, decorative brackets, and decorative window hoods.

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The 132 houses dating to the period from 1873 to 1915 represent over 60% of the housing stock in the neighborhood, and it is these houses that define the neighborhood at the peak of its development. Many of these houses replaced smaller, earlier structures, with a focused effort on constructing a nice middle or upper class house. Over 85% are two stories in height, with one one-story and 17 one-and-one-half-story houses dating to this period. About two-thirds of the houses have a recognizable style, while the remainder is working or middle class vernacular dwellings. Over half of these more vernacular buildings are gable-front designs, though six side gable houses also were built. By the 1890s, with framing technology advances and the popularity of the Queen Anne style, nine extant houses were built with L-plan, T-plan, or other cross gable forms. As mentioned, Italianate houses continued to be built into the 1880s. Three Second Empire houses were built in the West Hill Historic District in the early to middle of the 1870s, all located in the 500 block of W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. This style is primarily defined by the mansard roof line.

In the 1880s, the Queen Anne style gained in popularity across the country, becoming the dominant style in the West Hill neighborhood in the 1890s. Nearly one-quarter of the extant houses reflect elements of the Queen Anne style. The style is defined by a number of elaborate features, including hip roofs with projecting gables, asymmetrical massing, wood porches with decorative columns, bay windows, turrets, decorative surfaces such as fishscale shingles, and contrasting decorative materials. Queen Anne houses were built of brick and frame construction in Muscatine, with the brick examples exhibiting stone or terra cotta work to further decorate and detail the surfaces. In the West Hill Historic District, 47 houses exhibit features characteristics of the Queen Anne style, dating from the 1880s to 1915. Some of the more elaborate examples of the Queen Anne style include the Martin-Giesler House (c.1889, 403 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #9), Theron and Nellie Thompson House (c.1890, 405 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #73), William and Harry W. Huttig House (c.1892, 315 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #62), Lewis and Anna Burnett House (c.1895, 518 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #86), and Seabury Brewster and Mary Cook House (c.1904, 419 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #13). Simpler but intact frame examples also include the Henry and Martha Geiss House (c.1904, 415 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #12) and Edward and Louise Tyler House (1905, 310 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #143). While the majority of houses were constructed as single family dwellings, the large Sawyer-Day Duplex (617-619 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #93) was built around 1905 in the Queen Anne style as well.

A handful of additional turn-of-the-century styles and early 20<sup>th</sup> century styles and types are also represented in the West Hill neighborhood, constructed by 1915 and into the 1920s. Early Foursquare houses were combined with some Queen Anne features, creating three "crossover" houses built from 1899 to 1904. More traditional Foursquare houses defined by their plan and cubical appearance were built by 1910 in West Hill. Four examples remain from the 1910s and 1920s, including the brick Aaron C. and Cora Noble House #2 (1914, 413 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #76) and brick Eitman House (1922, 303 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #56). Four examples of Colonial Revival or Dutch Colonial Revival houses remain in the West Hill neighborhood, reflecting early American architecture. Perhaps the best example is the slightly later 1929 brick Fred and Louise Hahn House (804 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #210). Four additional examples were built in the 1920s. Three Prairie School houses were built by 1915, with two more in the 1920s. These houses are defined by their horizontal lines, wide eaves, and simple details. The Alnutt-Hoefflin House (1913, 710 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #96) clearly exhibits the emphasis on horizontal lines associated with this style. The large Sander Duplex (1922, 209 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #130) reflects the Prairie School style as well, applied to the duplex form. Bungalows, a well-designed smaller house, appear in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century in the West Hill Historic District as well. Nine bungalows, all gable-front in design, date to the 1900s and 1910s. Some exhibit strong Craftsman features. Three interesting bungalows sit in a row on the 400 block of W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street (William and

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Catherine Huttig House #2, 1910, 403 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #161; Chester and Mary Lillibridge House, 1913, 405 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #162; William and Sena Hendricks House, 407 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #163).

By 1915, the general characteristics of the West Hill Historic District as seen today had been formulated. The construction in the neighborhood had peaked, with only 36 houses (of 216 houses) built in the neighborhood since this time. Nearly all of these houses have a recognizable style. An additional 12 houses, mostly mentioned previously, were built from 1916 to 1929. In the 1930s, seven houses were built, followed by five in the 1940s, four in the 1950s, and eight since 1959. About one-third was brick or clad in brick veneer. Most of these houses built were smaller homes, reflecting sizes of some of the earlier houses in the neighborhood. Only 15 were two stories in height, with 10 built between 1916 and 1929. The Robert and Elizabeth Jackson House (715 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #101) is the rare exception to this rule, a large two-story brick Georgian Colonial Revival house built in 1937 to replace an earlier dwelling on the lot. In addition to a few bungalows, other small houses include three Tudor Revival houses from the 1930s and three Minimal Traditional houses built from 1936 to 1941. The Antoon and Grace Smit House (1941, 309 Linn Street, Map #147) is a good example of a Minimal Traditional house in brick, while the Albert and Gertrude Meisky House (1939, 400 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #155) is an interesting Tudor Revival house with some Cape Cod influence. A small duplex built in 1947 also reflected elements of the Minimal Traditional style (Greathouse Duplex, 603 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #191). The four houses built in the 1950s are one-story ranch homes.

The other primary category of resources in the West Hill Historic District is garages and other outbuildings. These resources are primarily located on the allevs dividing each block. A few examples are accessed from side streets for corner properties. The neighborhood has 74 of these resources built by 1958, with 40 garages built at a later date. Around 11 of the 74 date to the 19<sup>th</sup> century, while 46 date to between 1900 and 1928 and the remaining 17 date to 1928 to 1958. Five 19th century carriage houses and outbuildings are brick, while the remainder is frame construction. They range from elaborately designed buildings to complement a large house to more vernacular structures constructed to serve their purpose. The majority of garages constructed in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century are frame construction, with around eight examples in brick and a handful of concrete block structures. These garages are generally small buildings with a gable or hip roof designed to accommodate one car, perhaps with additional storage space that is now used for a second vehicle. A handful of buildings appear to have been designed with two large entries. Doors were typically sliding or hinged. Single sash windows often provided light to the intenor. The garages built in the middle of the 20th century also reflect many of these gualities. The majority of these buildings continued to be detached and located on the alley. New construction in this period may have included an attached garage. Overall, contributing garages demonstrate the overall form and features of a historic building. It is expected that the garage doors will have been updated, though several garages do retain historic doors. Likewise, the application of nonhistoric siding will not solely prohibit an outbuilding from being contributing. However, when the historic elements of the outbuilding have generally been obscured, it is classified as non-contributing.

Additional historic features within the West Hill Historic District include a grassy boulevard leading to Reservoir Park, iron fences, brick walls, stone and concrete retaining walls, brick or concrete posts, concrete steps, grave, and a few carriage steps or hitching posts. These small, but notable, site features are not individually tabulated, but they are noted on the table associated with each property within the district. Archeological sites have not been identified to date, but they could be identified as contributing in the historic district in the future.




Figure 2. Map of the east half of the West Hill Historic District, scale of 1"=200'

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


Figure 3. Map of the west half of the West Hill Historic District, scale of 1"=200'

#### **Narrative Statement of Significance**

The West Hill Historic District is locally significant under Criterion A for its significant association with the residential growth and development of Muscatine and under Criterion C for its significant residential architecture. It is nominated within the historic contexts defined in the multiple property document "Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa." This historic district nomination is submitted at the same time as the amended multiple property document, which includes the two residential and neighborhood historic contexts. The West Hill Historic District is primarily associated with these two historic contexts within this document, and the district meets the registration requirements identified in Section F. The historic contexts are:

19<sup>th</sup> Century Residential and Neighborhood Development, c.1833-1900

20<sup>th</sup> Century Residential and Neighborhood Development, 1900-c.1960

The development of the West Hill Historic District also reflects three other historic contexts included in the multiple property document:

Early Settlement, c.1833-c.1865 Lumber Industry, c.1843-c.1960 Pearl Button Center of the World, c.1890-1966

The West Hill Historic District is locally significant under Criterion A for its prominent place in the community planning and residential development of Muscatine. The area was laid out within the Original Town plat, a block system overlaid on the topography of the land. The neighborhood begins at the base of the hill near the commercial downtown and extends up the hill to the peak at Reservoir Park (4<sup>th</sup> and Broadway), including a number of sites with views of the Mississippi River. Some of the earliest and largest early settlement homes are found within this neighborhood, as the area attracted the initial residential development in Muscatine. These large and small homes would continue to provide a variety of housing options within the neighborhood throughout the period of significance. Construction of a majority of the houses in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries reflects the success of the lumber and pearl button industries, their impact on the community, and housing for prominent businessmen. The West Hill Historic District was the fashionable place to build a residence in the last quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century,

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attracting middle and upper class families. These families would also build houses as investments within the area. Many of these trends would continue in the later years of the early and middle 20<sup>th</sup> century. The neighborhood represents a strong cross section of middle and upper class households of prominent businessmen mixed with some working class households. The growth and development of the West Hill Historic District is directly associated with and significant within the trends of residential and neighborhood development in Muscatine.

The West Hill Historic District is also locally significant under Criterion C for its significant collection of residential architecture. Architecturally, the district includes numerous excellent examples of residential architecture in Muscatine from 1839 to 1958. The buildings represent a diverse housing stock, ranging from high style and vernacular, large and small, and brick and frame structures. Architects designed some of the key early buildings within this historic district. Early buildings reflect significant examples of Greek Revival and Italianate architecture in Muscatine. Smaller vernacular buildings, primarily two-story, reflect the historic mixed nature of the neighborhood, including numerous middle class families. Some of the best examples of 19<sup>th</sup> century and early 20<sup>th</sup> century architectural styles in Muscatine are located within this neighborhood, built during the peak of the development of this neighborhood from 1873 to 1915. These fashionable homes reflect Italianate, Second Empire, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, and Prairie School styles. Middle class homes in this period reflect the same styles, interpreted at a smaller scale. Additional smaller houses in the early and middle of the 20<sup>th</sup> century represent housing constructed by these prominent families as investment property and the transition to smaller homes characteristic of this period. These later homes are architecturally significant within the later development and evolution of the neighborhood.

Historically, the West Hill Historic District reflects the earliest residential development in Muscatine, significant growth in the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, and evolution of housing in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The period of significance for the West Hill Historic District begins with the construction of the first extant building in 1839 and ends in 1958, the 50-year cutoff for most National Register of Historic Places listings. Residential development began in the West Hill Historic District immediately following settlement of Muscatine, with the earliest extant house dating to 1839. The early development of the neighborhood followed the early growth of the town in the 1840s and 1850s. Various house styles, types, and sizes were constructed, representing some of the wealthiest residents of Muscatine to typical middle or working class residents. Of the 216 houses in the West Hill neighborhood, 48 extant houses were constructed in this period of early settlement and development from 1839 to 1872. With the growth of the lumber industry in the 1870s and prosperous business economy, the West Hill neighborhood continued to attract the more prosperous families in the last guarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, who constructed large houses in this area. Middle class housing also continued to be constructed, offering a mix of housing stock. With the boom of the pearl button industry in the late 1890s, Muscatine witnessed a new wave of growth. New housing was constructed in West Hill by businessmen, for their personal use as well as rental purposes. Overall, 132 of the extant houses were built in this period of sustained growth and development from 1873 to 1915. Though construction of new properties declined in the later period from 1916 to 1958, with only 28 extant houses dating to this period, the residential use and evolution of the West Hill Historic District reflects 20th century housing trends. Additionally, the construction of several garages through this period represents this significant evolution in residential architecture, developed through the growing use of the automobile. Only eight houses or multi-family housing buildings have been built in the West Hill neighborhood since 1958. Thus, the history and architecture of the district reflects a period of significance from 1839 to 1958.

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Overall, the West Hill Historic District in Muscatine retains a sense of cohesion as a historic district and retains good integrity. The location has remained constant, as well as the relationship to the Downtown Commercial Historic District immediately to the east. The setting is currently similar as during the period of significance. The bluff and views of the Mississippi River define the southern edge of the district, as well as key characteristics of several properties along W. 2<sup>nd</sup> and W. 3<sup>rd</sup> streets. The commercial area and newer public buildings are located immediately to the east of the historic district. Additional historic neighborhoods are located to the north and west of the district, further down the hill. The overall design of the West Hill Historic District remains intact, with the rectangular block system and major east-west numbered roads parallel to alleys and perpendicular to named cross streets. The houses are located on the main streets, with the garages and other outbuildings located in the allevs. Each block continues to be dominated and defined by two-story brick or frame residences. The houses have a rhythm to their setbacks and spacing on each block, maintaining their relationship to the street and adjacent blocks. The design of the individual buildings generally reflects their historic appearance, though some updates are found for windows, porches, and siding. Some of these alterations, such as porches, are historic and significant. Overall, there are 334 resources in the West Hill Historic District, including 267 contributing resources (197 houses, 66 outbuildings (primarily garages), one park, one grave marker, one set of steps, and a network of streets/alleys/sidewalks/walls) and 67 non-contributing resources (19 non-contributing houses and 48 noncontributing garages). The primary historic materials within the district include wood, brick, stone, and concrete, and these materials continue to define the appearance of the district, with some detraction through the addition of aluminum or vinyl siding to about 90 houses. The historic craftsmanship remains visible on the houses, garages, and various site features (such as retaining walls) found throughout the district. The appearance of the district continues to reflect its historic associations with early settlement, 19th century residential and neighborhood development. 20th century residential and neighborhood development, the lumber industry, and the pearl button industry, as is illustrated in greater depth in the following sections. Overall, even with the alterations, the feeling of the West Hill Historic District continues to demonstrate the key historic residential nature of W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, and the associated cross streets. The district retains its sense as the high style and middle class residential neighborhood of Muscatine, reflected and provoked by the visual dominance of two-story residences, tree lined streets, and location on the hill overlooking the Mississippi River.

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#### Early growth and development, 1839-1872

Development in the West Hill Historic District began soon after the town was platted in 1836, as one of the first residential areas in Muscatine. The initial period of growth for the district is defined as 1839 (construction of the earliest extant house) to 1872 (through the significant construction of the 1850s and 1860s). The 1870s would usher in a new period of development, marked by increased construction and extant houses. Overall, 48 extant houses date to construction in this period of early growth and development. Both frame and brick construction was utilized in this period. The largest homes of the 1850s and 1860s in Muscatine were constructed in the West Hill Historic District. They continue to define some of the key blocks and vistas of the neighborhood. Though a number of small frame homes were built in this period, many of these were later replaced with more substantial houses. Over half of the current lots were developed by the end of this period in the early 1870s. This period of development reflects two historic contexts: Early Settlement and 19<sup>th</sup> Century Residential and Neighborhood Development (see additional historic and contextual information in *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, lowa*, pages 3-13, 86-108).

Most early towns on the lowa frontier developed along the Mississippi River as the major transportation route into and out of the territory. In 1836, the town of Muscatine was platted, and it became the county seat of Muscatine County in 1837. The majority of the streets were 60 feet in width, and 20-foot alleys typically ran parallel to the numbered streets and the river. Broadway, measuring 100 feet in width, appears to have been envisioned as a wide street leading to the public square. This public square was near the peak of "West Hill," and its original intended use is unknown. The only known public or "park" space was this square in the west end. While the location of Muscatine had the benefits of its location along the river, the terrain was less favorable for development. Josiah P. Walton observed "If one would look up the roughest place in our county he would hardly find an equal to Bloomington [Muscatine] in 1836. It was all hills and hollows. They were largely covered with trees and brush. The town was located between them and on four hills – one of them the highest for several miles away – with two large creeks and several small duck ponds to add variety to the wilderness" (Horton 1978: 290).

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


Figure 4. Contour map of Muscatine as it was in the 1840s (10 foot intervals), drawn in 1955 based on historic profiles and depictions, with West Hill Historic District boundary overlaid.

These characteristics of the topography defined the early development of the community, and the early settlement of the West Hill Historic District (Figure 4). The earliest residential neighborhoods in Muscatine developed within this "original town" plat. The relatively flat area near the river bend supported the first development and ensuing commercial development. Residential development quickly moved up the surrounding hills, particularly West Hill, which was in close proximity to and easily accessible from the business district. The earliest extant house in the West Hill Historic District dates to 1839 (807 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street), constructed by Andrew and Rhoda Smalley with bricks and material brought west with them (Letter from great-granddaughter Rhoda Smalley George to Barbara Sabbath, current resident, 1961). The location chosen was near the peak of West Hill, overlooking the Mississippi River and one block from the public square.

With the demand for building materials, the lumber and brick industries quickly began, providing material for residential buildings. First generation buildings were typically small, one-story dwellings quickly erected for shelter. With additional time in the community, residents had the opportunity to construct larger dwellings. These often continued to be vernacular in nature, though some high style dwellings were built by the more prosperous residents. In 1850, the focus on grading the hilly area around the core of Muscatine began. Latter accounts noted the hills were pushed into the hollows, with the work generally coming out even. A new resident in 1853 continued to describe the site of the town as "very rough, a succession of hills and valleys" that were being graded and filled as the community grew (Reps 1994: 230; Carlson 1990: 56; Randall 1981: 54). This description is applicable to the West Hill Historic District in this period.

Housing in the West Hill Historic District remaining from the 1840s and 1850s reflected the development of a mixed neighborhood, with laborers and business owners living side by side. The majority of the houses built in this period were later demolished for larger, more substantial dwellings. Three two-story frame dwellings built in the late 1840s and 1850 remain, home to a lawyer, bricklayer, and city treasurer. The 21 extant houses built in the remainder of the 1850s primarily reflect the efforts of prominent businessmen to construct houses worthy of their status in the community. These houses were all two stories in height, ranging from a typical size to very large dwellings. These remaining dwellings are concentrated on or near 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, going up the hill and located on lots on the bluff

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overlooking the river. Residents represented a cross section of the business community, including grocers, a druggist, dry goods merchants, hardware/implement dealer, insurance agent, and lawyer. At least three houses were built by businessmen who then sold the house after construction. While a number of smaller houses where laborers lived existed in the neighborhood in this period, these were primarily demolished for later, larger homes.

A view of Muscatine appeared in *Ballou's Pictorial Drawing-Room Companion* of Boston on Saturday, August 4, 1855 (Figure 5). The depiction is looking west-northwest towards the town, with West Hill on the left and the downtown on the right. The overall hilly nature of the location is clearly visible in this illustration. Though residential development also occurred in some less visible areas by this time, West Hill was the focus of early residential development, particularly for Muscatine's most prominent citizens. A number of gable-roof small and large houses are visible in this early neighborhood. The J.C.B. Warde House (205 Cherry Street, Map #102), recently completed in 1855 at the peak of the bluff at the left, is the only home easily recognizable (*Ballou's* 1855: 73).

Leading up to and with the arrival of the railroad in 1855, Muscatine grew rapidly. The population of Muscatine swelled from 2,540 in 1850 to 6,137 in 1856, expanding from 453 dwellings in town to 1,040 dwellings. The 1856 city directory notes that "about two hundred dwellings, nearly all of a substantial character" were built in 1855 with

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the anticipated arrival of the railroad in November. Three extant houses in West Hill date to 1855 and two to 1856, though several more were likely built at the time and since demolished. The Panic of 1857 likely tempered the potential growth to a degree, though the extant homes in the West Hill neighborhood show steady construction from the late 1850s to 1862. There are 10 extant houses built from around 1860 to 1862 in this area. While two of these houses are among the largest mansions in Muscatine then and now, the majority were smaller one-and-one-half-story or two-story dwellings. Residents continued to be businessmen in the community, and two houses were constructed by citizens involved in real estate at the time for their personal homes.

The West Hill Historic District shows a lack of construction during the Civil War in 1863 and 1864, and then a resumption of new house construction beginning in 1865. A total of 11 extant houses date to construction in the period from 1865 to 1870 (none date to the first years of the 1870s). Construction continued in the same vein as the 1850s, with houses built on vacant lots and others replacing smaller first generation houses. By contrast, six of these homes are located on or near 4<sup>th</sup> Street, with two on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and three on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. The 1866 and 1869 city directory listings for the 48 extant houses built by 1870 show that most of the residents for these houses were typical businessmen, such as grocers, dry goods merchants, general store owners, hardware and implement dealers, bank cashiers, insurance and real estate agents, a druggist, a tailor, a crockery dealer, a railroad conductor, a furniture manufacturer, two boot and shoe manufacturers, a meat packer, and four lawyers.

The 1874 bird's-eye view of Muscatine shows the development of the West Hill Historic District at the end of this initial period of growth and development (Figure 6). While key houses are noted in detail, smaller houses are sketched in with basic detail just to represent a building on the lot. The view shows uniform development through the neighborhood by this date with around eight houses depicted on each block. The residential development in the district is perhaps a bit more concentrated than other areas of the community, though a number of vacant lots remain. The view shows about 120 houses within the boundary of the West Hill Historic District, in a neighborhood of 216 houses today. Since around 50 houses dating to this period exist today, over half of the houses would be demolished with new houses built on the lots, in addition to the increased overall number. The topography of the neighborhood, particularly the steep bluff line along the south edge, is also apparent from this perspective (Koch 1874).


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#### Sustained growth and development, 1873-1915

With the expansion of the lumber industry in the 1870s. Muscatine was ushered into a period of sustained growth and development that continued through the boom of the pearl button industry in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. The West Hill Historic District strongly reflects this period of growth and development, with 132 extant houses dating to construction between 1873 and 1915. Though the neighborhood retains a number of significant resources in the decades prior to and after this period, these four decades mark the greatest concentration of historic resources in the district. While 48 extant houses date to construction prior to 1872, 18 extant houses date to the seven years from 1873 to 1879, 32 to the decade of the 1880s, 34 to the 1890s, 36 to the 1900s, and 12 to the six years from 1910 to 1915. Construction in the earlier 1870s and later 1910s shows more significant tapering on either side of this period, with only three constructed in these years combined. Only 16 extant houses date to the period from 1916 to 1932. This period reflects the growth of the community and development of the neighborhood as the fashionable place for middle and upper class families. In the first years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century with the demand for housing in the community, additional properties were constructed, some strictly for investment purposes. By 1915, development was nearly complete throughout the neighborhood, with few additional possible sites for later homes. The houses built in the West Hill Historic District from 1873 to 1915 continue to define the appearance and history of the neighborhood today. This period of development reflects four historic contexts: 19th Century Residential and Neighborhood Development, Lumber Industry, Pearl Button Center of the World, and 20th Residential and Neighborhood Development (see additional historic and contextual information in Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa, pages 30-60, 86-133).

The lumber industry created the backbone of the economy of Muscatine in the last quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, as described in more detail in the *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa*. The largest names in lumber were established by this period, including Cadle & Mulford, Benjamin Hershey Company, Huttig Brothers Manufacturing Company, Musser Lumber Company, and S.G. Stein – many of whom would be associated with resources in the West Hill Historic District. As the lumber businesses developed, their owners became leaders in the community, economically and socially. Additionally, the prosperous economy resulted in strong businesses throughout the remainder of the community, providing commercial and retail services or representing other industries. With many of these residents living in or desiring to live in the West Hill neighborhood, the area saw marked improvements. The population of Muscatine continued to grow in this period, from 6,718 in 1870 to 8,295 in 1880, also creating a demand for new housing.

With the demand for additional services for the growing town, the Muscatine Water Works Company was formed on November 9, 1875 to create a water system for protection from fire and domestic use. A reservoir was built on the "public square" at Fourth and Broadway, in the West Hill Historic District, to hold about 2 million gallons. The reservoir and pumping works were completed by April 1876, with several branches to the main line laid over the next few years. The waterworks on West Hill were successfully tested on July 12, 1878. By the turn of the century, eleven miles of mains were laid, providing water to 125 hydrants (*History of Muscatine County* 1879: 515-521; City Directory 1883-86: 20; Richman 1911, Vol. 1: 290-291, 466; *Journal*, Dec. 20, 1906, 9).

The new houses in the West Hill Historic District from 1873 to 1879 mirror the development throughout the rest of the community. Though more were likely built, 18 extant dwellings date to this period. The buildings are distributed

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throughout the neighborhood, with seven built on or near 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, five along or near 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, and six on 4<sup>th</sup> Street. With the exception of one well-crafted one-and-one-half-story house, these were substantial two story houses. Five new houses were associated with men in the construction industry, including Samuel B. Hill (architect/builder/carpenter), Uriah Mayes (carpenter), Joseph Mulford (Cadle, Mulford & Company - sash/doors /blinds), Andrew Kirsch (granite/stone cutter), and William Webster (dealer granite and marble). While the majority of the dwellings are single family homes, a few were constructed as duplexes. The Alexander Clark House was a duplex, or double house, constructed as a rental property in 1878-79 (moved to 203-205 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street from adjacent block, Map #43). John Dyer lived in half of the duplex he built in 1876 (317-319 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #5) and rented the other half.

The 1879 city directory and 1880 census provide additional information on the residents in the West Hill Historic District. The majority of the 66 extant dwellings built by 1880 were owner-occupied homes, with at least 12 listed under the names of the wife in the family. Nearly 75% of the heads of these households were over 50 years old. Around ten had female heads of the household in 1880, all widows. At least ten households included hired women, such as servants or cooks. Most of these families represent residents of Muscatine since the 1850s or 1860s, and successful businessmen in the community. About two-thirds of the heads of household had been born in the United States. Around 15% were born in various sections of Germany, with less than 10% born in Ireland. Residents of these extant houses in the 1879 city directory include owners of meat markets, grocery stores, hardware stores, dry goods stores, shoe factories or stores, tailoring businesses, a notions store, a books and stationery store, a harness and saddle factory (William Van Nostrand, J. Rubelman), a lumber company (Richard Musser), a sash/door/blinds company (Joseph Mulford), a crockery store, a furniture manufacturing factory and store (Philip Stein), a livery stable, and a granite/marble business. The mayor (George Dillaway) lived in the neighborhood, as well as three lawyers, four insurance and/or real estate agents, two doctors, two bookkeepers, three carpenters, a marble/stone cutter, a surveyor, a constable, a minister, and a capitalist. At the same time, the extant houses reflect dwellings of four laborers, a teamster, two sawmill workers, and a blacksmith.

The population of Muscatine continued to climb quickly from 8,295 in 1880 to 11,454 in 1890, and construction continued through the West Hill Historic District at a rapid pace in the 1880s. A total of 32 extant houses were built in this decade. All but two were two stories in height, and nearly half of the houses were constructed of brick. Nine houses were located on the rear portion of lots facing side streets, indicating the start of a trend towards construction on these potential additional lots. Six brick residences were built on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street respectively, with a few additional on 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Cherry Street. Chittenden U. Hatch, a carpenter, apparently built the brick double house at 401-403 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street (Map #72) with investment partner Thomas B. Tallant. Seven other houses were built and soon sold. Houses were built by prominent local residents William A. Clark (real estate, capitalist), P.M. Musser (Musser Lumber Company; Cook & Musser Bank), and DeWitt C. Richman (circuit court judge) in the West Hill Historic District in this period, as well as other leading citizens such as Samuel Hughes (cashier Muscatine Savings Bank), John O. Martin, James J. Russell, (lawyer, city attorney), and Frank P. Sawyer (secretary and general manager Muscatine Oatmeal Company). At least one house was built by a woman, Eliza Hanna, the 63-year-old widow of Thomas (lawyer).

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


Figure 7. Sanborn map coverage in 1888 of the West Hill Historic District, with boundary overlaid.

The 1888 Sanborn fire insurance map covers about half of the West Hill Historic District (Figure 7). The fire risk was assessed as greatest in areas of dense development and among buildings nearest to business and industrial buildings, so though additional residences existed further up the hill near Reservoir Park this area was not included in detail until several editions later. The area included in detail reveals trends consistent with other portions of the neighborhood. Each block has been developed to a certain degree. However, the density of housing is such to permit additional division of parcels for future house construction. The neighborhood includes a mix of larger and smaller homes, including 96 extant houses. The majority of the houses are single family dwellings, with a few double houses (duplexes) or connected dwellings. Smaller houses or houses straddling potentially two lots would continue to be demolished for later construction. Though only a few carriage houses are extant from this period, the map shows an outbuilding behind nearly every house in 1888. Fifth Ward School served the neighborhood at the southwest corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Spruce, and the Excelsior Hose Company House was located one block to the

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east. These services would continue to be provided for West Hill residents into the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The map also depicts the commercial and industrial uses immediately to the east of the district boundary and part of the bluff line along the south side.

Community leaders, including many involved in the lumber industry, worked to improve Muscatine and foster continued growth and development. By the early 1890s, it was clear that the lumber industry had or would soon peak, and prominent citizens focused on retaining Muscatine's prosperity and pushing the community forward, including several residents of the West Hill Historic District. The 1891 city directory listings for the 109 extant houses reflect a similar mix of upper and middle class houses, with some working class as well. Ten residences were associated with men in management or supervision of lumber companies in town. Three officers (J. Linn Hoopes, Samuel Hughes, Frank P. Sawyer) of the Muscatine Improvement and Manufacturing Company (formerly Muscatine Real Estate Company) that was working on the large Park Place development lived in the neighborhood. Likewise, eight lawyers and two doctors lived in the neighborhood. Nineteen widows and five retired men were listed as heads of households, indicating the aging first generation of West Hill residents. Additional residents include successful businessmen in hardware, dry goods, real estate, insurance, banking and mortgages, books and stationery, drug store, tailoring, groceries, meat, carpentry, marble and stone, and manufacturing. Clerks, janitors, and laborers also lived in the West Hill neighborhood, though fewer of these houses remain standing.

#### The Semi-Centennial Souvenir Edition of the Muscatine Journal in 1891 noted that:

Muscatine homes really are delightful specimens of the ideal domiciles of true Americans. There are a number of homes which have cost several tens of thousands, but the greater number have been erected inside the lowest sum expressed by five figures without the decimal point. The hilly condition of the city, which adds so greatly to its beauty and healthfulness, has in the past required considerable of an outlay for grading before residence lots were even ready for building upon. So much grading has been done in late years though that this feature is becoming a thing of the past, and the "lay of the land" in the city is rapidly reaching the point where it is exceedingly pleasing to the eye, as well as filling all requirements of convenience and healthfulness (*Semi-Centennial Souvenir Edition of the Muscatine Journal* 1891: 29).

By this description, the West Hill Historic District represented the larger and more expensive homes in the community, though continuing to have a mix of smaller, more typical houses. In this period, most houses in West Hill were selling for over \$1,000, with several above \$5,000.

The *Journal* noted on December 14, 1893 that Muscatine felt the effects of the nationwide depression less than other cities. Muscatine was noted to benefit from lower living expenses due to the products of the lumber mills and Muscatine Island, with few residents renting their houses: "Most every laborer in the city owns his own home, showing that with economy and steady habits one can get along nicely in Muscatine and accumulate a little each year besides" ("Muscatine as it is," *Muscatine Journal*, December 14, 1893, 1). Improvements to W. 2nd, W. 3rd, Walnut, Cemetery, and Woodlawn streets were noted for the year without any details, part of over \$500,000 in building improvements ("Half Million," *Muscatine Journal*, December 14, 1893, 14). Though the *Journal* predicted a building boom in 1894, at the end of 1895 they were forced to admit that the economy had been lagging for 2 years. "There have been, however, not a few handsome residences erected in the past year and also a number of small residences, the aggregate of which will not exceed several hundred thousand dollars. There would have been more had the times not been so stringent, but this is also true, probably, in most of our neighboring cities" ("1896

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Prospects," *Muscatine Journal*, December 14, 1895, 16). However, at least 700 dwellings were constructed in the 1890s, though some were certainly built closer to the turn-of-the-century. The 1890 census noted 2,366 dwellings in Muscatine, while the 1900 census reported 3,054 – an increase of 29% while the population increased 23% from 11,454 to 14,073. At the same time, additional dwellings present in 1890 were replaced with new dwellings by 1900, indicating further construction.

Similarly, construction in the West Hill Historic District continued to be steady in the early 1890s, lagging in the middle of the 1890s. Sixteen extant houses were built in 1890 to 1892, and then eight from 1893 to 1897. Frame was the prominent construction method, with only seven houses constructed in brick. Nearly all were constructed at two stories in height. Development was again concentrated on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, with half of the extant houses built on or near the street. Residents building homes in this period included two doctors, a lawyer, the president of Huttig Manufacturing Company, the assistant secretary of Hershey Lumber Company, the secretary/treasurer for Sterneman Clothing Company, a jeweler, a bookkeeper, two brothers that owned a hardware store, a livery/feed stable owner, and two widows. An additional ten extant houses would be built in 1898 and 1899.

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


Figure 8. Sanborn map coverage in 1899 of the West Hill Historic District, with boundary overlaid.

The 1899 Sanborn fire insurance map covers about four additional blocks in the West Hill Historic District (Figure 8). The east half of the district is completely covered, though housing existed throughout the west half as well. Commercial and industrial uses can be seen expanding immediately to the east of the district boundary. Many of the same trends noted on the 1888 Sanborn map remain true. The neighborhood includes a mix of larger and smaller homes, including 132 extant houses. While each block has been developed, the density of housing remains lower than it will be in the future. About half of the new houses have been built on vacant parcels of land, while the other half required the demolition of an earlier, usually smaller, house for the new construction. The majority of dwellings continue to be single family. A number of outbuildings and carriage houses along the alleys have been demolished, while new ones have been constructed. Seven extant carriage houses were built in the 1890s, primarily larger and more specifically designed buildings.

While the economy in Muscatine lagged in the middle of the 1890s, it would pick up quickly immediately prior to the turn of the century with the arrival of a key new industry to Muscatine: pearl buttons. The industry began in Muscatine, and the community remained at the center as it grew, as further discussed in *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa*. This industry defined the economy of Muscatine in the early 1900s, as well as creating new demand on residential growth and development. As new residential areas grew, development was also noted in older neighborhoods such as the West Hill Historic District. The beauty of the hills continued to be noted in publications promoting the city: "the wood crowned hills that overlook the river and surrounding landscape furnish home sites fit for a king...A more desirable or appropriate location for a great manufacturing city, or a prettier spot upon which to build a home, would be difficult to find anywhere in the Valley of the Mississippi, and, indeed, but few places surpass it in the word" (Lewis 1901: 13).

Construction in Muscatine reflecting the boom of the pearl button industry began around 1898 and continued for the next 12 years. A housing shortage throughout the community was noted in many of these years, with residents constructing properties to be immediately sold or rented. Owners eyed their vacant land with thoughts of infill or demolition for additional units, including those in the West Hill Historic District. Between 1898 and 1915, 58 extant properties were constructed in the neighborhood. Over one-quarter of the properties were constructed specifically for rental purposes, including nine built in 1898-1901 and eight built from 1902 to 1910. Many of these were built facing side streets, with room available at the rear of the lot. For example, Chockley C. Smith acquired the lot with a house at the northeast corner of 4<sup>th</sup> and Chestnut in 1898, quickly demolishing it and building three new houses (Map #125, 126, 127). He would add a fourth unit to one of the houses around 1915. Nearby, Anna Morrison (single) bought the lot at the southwest corner of 4<sup>th</sup> and Pine in March 1899, and quickly began the construction of two identical duplexes (Map #140, 141). Their footprint is noted "from plans" on the August 1899 Sanborn map. With their completion, she built a final house on the southern portion of the lot the following year (Map #142). By

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1899, widow Charlotte Mauck constructed a narrow house at 317 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street (Map #151) on the remainder of her lot to use as a rental property. Around 1904, she would construct another house at the rear of the lot, facing Linn (Map #153). Similarly, George Arnold constructed a house at the rear of his corner lot around 1901, with renters moving in by 1902 (408 Locust, Map #189). The house built by William W. and Bertha McQuesten at the rear of their lot around 1899 also was initially used as a rental property (308 Cherry Street, Map #112). Around 1904, the Nyenhuis brothers squeezed a house into part of their lot at 205 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street (Map #128), next to Smith's properties. The home of James H. and Agnes St. John at 313 Cherry straddled two lots, with the undeveloped rear facing Reservoir Park. Around 1906, they constructed two symmetrical properties to use as rental houses (Map #205, 206). Frank P. Sawyer was also involved in the construction of a large, well-designed duplex and rental house on the northeast corner of W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street around 1905 and 1909 (Map #92, 93). At the far west end of the district, Margaret and Samuel Wigim built a rental house on the remainder of their property (Map #121).

This change in the composition of residents in the West Hill Historic District is only beginning to be seen in the 1900 census and city directory. The long-time residents of West Hill continued to age, with 25 widows and five retired men among the residents. Many of the properties were passed down to descendents, while new younger families also moved into the neighborhood. Slightly more than half of the residents were over 50 years old. In 1900, 19 of the 132 extant properties (14%) within the district boundary were used as rental properties, with an additional six having one rental and one owner-occupied unit (4.5%). Seven of these were located on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, two on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, eight on 4<sup>th</sup> Street, and nine on side streets. No renters were directly associated with the pearl button industry. Renters included three doctors, travel agent, plumber, dressmaker, clerk, newspaper editor, manufacturing supervisor, grocer, bartender, mail carrier, and salesmen. Six men associated with the new button factories are found among the additional residents, including William F. Bishop (Bishop & Hagerman), William Huttig (president of sash/door Huttig Manufacturing Company and vice president of Boepple Button Company), James S. McKee (Bliven & McKee Button Company), James H. St. John (grocer and owner of St. John Button Works), Henry Umlandt (treasurer of Automatic Pearl Works), and Matilda and Claus Umlandt (foreman at Automatic Button Company). The majority of residents continued to be successful businessmen representing a variety of professions.

The 1910 census and 1911 city directory show the continuing evolution of the West Hill neighborhood in this period. Of the 172 extant properties built by 1911, 40 functioned as rental properties (23%), including at least four with two units. At least six additional properties had both owner-occupied and rental units. These properties were primarily located on 4<sup>th</sup> Street (12) and side streets (16), with additional properties on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street. Renters continued to be primarily middle class tenants, including business owners, plant supervisors, accountants, clerks, a doctor, a dentist, and an engineer. Residents of owner-occupied dwellings continued to vary from the most prominent families to successful middle class families. Prominent residents included Fred Beach (secretarytreasurer of Mira Hershey Lumber Company), William Bishop (Hawkeye Pearl Button Company), J. Scott Blackwell (capitalist), William Bliven (McKee Button Company), Jerome Carskaddan (attorney), S.B. Cook (cashier at Muscatine State Bank), A.S. Garland (manager Pioneer Pearl Button Company), Henry F. Giessler (president of German American Savings Bank), J. Linn Hoopes (real estate), Samuel Hughes (cashier Muscatine Savings Bank), Harry W. Huttig (manager Huttig Manufacturing Company), Douglas V. Jackson (district judge), John Klein (doctor), David MacKenzie (superintendent Roach and Musser Sash and Door), James S. McKee (president McKee & Bliven Button Company), Henry S. Moore (capitalist), Clifford Musser (Muscatine Sash and Door Company), P.M. Musser

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(president of Cook & Musser Bank; secretary of Musser Lumber & Box Co), Edward Niver (Niver Iron Foundry Company), Irving B. Richman (lawyer), James H. Seldon (contractor/builder), Simon G. Stein, Jr. (president of SG & P Stein Furniture Company, president First National Bank), John Sterneman (Sterneman Clothing Company), and George M. Titus (real estate and investment). Other residents included the county auditor, lawyers, doctors, dentists, clerks, real estate agents/investors, livestock dealers, bank cashiers, laborers, bridge builder, postal worker, harness maker, salesmen, dressmakers, marble dealer, as well as owners of drug stores, livery stables, dry goods store, a popcorn stand, variety store, hardware store, book store, produce company, and a printing company.

While rental property was constructed, around 40 of the 58 extant properties built from 1898 to 1915 were for owneroccupied uses. Frame construction was used for over 80% of the houses in this period. This period also marked the transition to smaller dwellings. While two-story houses continued to be the most popular, they only account for around three-quarters of the extant houses built in this period. This construction was distributed throughout the neighborhood in this period, with seven houses on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, 14 houses on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, 13 houses on 4<sup>th</sup> Street, and six on side streets near Reservoir Park. William and Catherine Huttig actually built two houses in this period, a two-story brick Queen Anne house on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street (Map #61) in 1899 and then their new bungalow on 4<sup>th</sup> Street in 1911. Likewise, Aaron C. Noble demolished a large house on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, built a new two-story brick Queen Anne house around 1906 (Map #77) and then moved to a second new house on the second half of the lot in 1914 (Map #76). Dr. Edmund B. Fulliam, Sr. constructed adjacent bungalows on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street around 1914 (Map #69, 70), potentially for each of his daughters. At least ten women, mostly widows, built new houses for themselves in this period.

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


Figure 9. Sanborn map coverage in 1912 of the West Hill Historic District, with boundary overlaid.

The 1912 Sanborn fire insurance map covers the same east half of the West Hill Historic District as in 1899, with the addition of the block around Bellevue Hospital (J.C.B. Warde House, Map #102) (Figure 9). The neighborhood includes a mix of larger and smaller homes, including 172 extant houses and around 25 extant outbuildings (mostly garages). The density of the neighborhood has increased, with over ten houses on most blocks. Most of the houses had outbuildings, though only a few of these remain. This map shows the beginning of the conversion of carriage house into garages (automobile houses) and replacement of earlier buildings for garages. These continue to be located at the rear of lots, accessed from the alley. The majority of dwellings continue to be single family, with less than ten double houses (duplexes) in the neighborhood. Washington Public School continues to serve the neighborhood at the southwest corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Spruce, with the fire department's hose station one block to the east.

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


Figure 10. Postcard view of West Hill, c.1900 (Grossheim collection, Postcard9, Musser Public Library).

The c.1914 publication, *Muscatine, Iowa, The Pearl City: Pearl Button Center of the World*, continued to note the hilly terrain of Muscatine; however, it was viewed as an attractive feature: Muscatine was located on the Mississippi "between her hills and luxuriant shade trees, which tend to make her the most attractive city of her size in the middle west. Being situated on and between the hills, her beauty is all the more marked and noted by the visitors; her drainage the more complete, and her sanitary conditions the most perfect" (Record Printing Company, c.1914: 1). Further, "Muscatine is made additionally attractive as a good place to live, because it is a home town, no less than eighty-five percent of our people owning their own homes, and therefore they are better maintained than is ordinarily the case in a manufacturing city" (Record Printing Company, c.1914: 3). The city boasted over 83 acres of park area and marvelous views from the bluff of the Mississippi. Many of these features were characteristic of the West Hill Historic District at this time. Photographs from around and after the turn-of-the-century show large homes, tree-lined streets, and river views (Figures 10-15).

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


Figure 15. Looking around Reservoir Park to Cherry Street, c.1900 (Grossheim Collection, A29, Musser Public Library).

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#### Maturation and evolution, 1916-1958

While the West Hill Historic District had begun to evolve in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, these trends were further developed over the four decades from 1916 to 1958. Construction peaked in the neighborhood, as remaining lots were filled in. While the extant houses reflect a three or more houses per year average of the past four decades, from 1916 to 1932 it significantly decreased to an average of one per year. Twelve additional extant houses were built between 1935 and 1958, primarily filling in undeveloped lots or parts of lots. The majority of the houses in this period were smaller in size, and they represented the redevelopment of a parcel. Changing economic conditions and technology also impacted the neighborhood in this period. Increased rental uses were found throughout the entire historic district. The popularity of the automobile required the updating of older outbuildings or construction of new garages, particularly in the 1920s. The houses and outbuildings dating to the period from 1916 to 1958 contribute to the understanding of the full development of this key neighborhood. This period of development reflects one historic context: 20<sup>th</sup> Century Residential and Neighborhood Development (see additional historic and contextual information in *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa*, pages 109-132).

Though the popularity of the smaller house began in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century as a movement in contrast to the large Queen Anne homes of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century and turn of the century, the small home movement gained increasing popularity following World War I. Small homes were encouraged as attainable, and bungalows became a prevalent house type across the country. Some multi-family homes were also built in Muscatine, usually in a duplex format with two units, side by side. Throughout the 1920s, large single-family homes continued to be sub-divided into two units. Though most were partially owner-occupied with the other unit rented out, some houses were converted to two rental units. Often these conversions to multi-family units required some interior changes and minor exterior changes, and occasionally more major exterior changes were required.

The West Hill Historic District reflects many of these trends with construction of the 16 extant properties from 1916 to 1932. At the same time, the West Hill neighborhood continued to be known for its status and large houses. While neighborhoods in other areas of the community were developed solely with smaller homes, new construction in the West Hill Historic District reflected a mix of larger and smaller houses. Eleven of the houses built were two story structures, and six were brick construction. The houses were concentrated on 4<sup>th</sup> Street and in the west end of the historic district, an area that retained a number of earlier, smaller houses that had yet to be replaced. Only two of the properties were constructed for rental purposes; the majority were single family homes intended for owner-occupied use. Residents were mostly middle class businessmen. The large duplex built by Christopher and Sena Sander on 4<sup>th</sup> Street (#130) appears to have been intended half for personal or family use, with the other half rented for additional income.

The 1920 census and 1921 city directory listings for the 182 extant houses reflect primarily a mix of upper and middle class households. The first generation of residents had generally died, leaving a variety of ages throughout the neighborhood. Around 35 heads of household were women, a mix of widows and single daughters of successful families. Only about eight women worked, as dressmakers, teachers, salesladies, and a librarian. According to property records and city directory listings, rental housing made up about 18% of the homes in West Hill, with an additional 8% of owners living in a property and renting out a portion of it. At least one dwelling used as a rental was found on nearly every block at this time, including seven on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, five on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, eight on 4<sup>th</sup>

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Street, and twelve on various side streets. Residents in the West Hill Historic District included successful businessmen in pearl button companies, produce, dry goods, real estate and investments, banking, books, meat packing, lumber or sash and door companies, groceries, tires, department stores, variety stores, drug stores, shoes, printing, hardware, and canning, as well as managers for many successful businesses. Five doctors, two dentists, seven lawyers, a judge, the deputy sheriff, the city engineer, and the school superintendent made their homes in this neighborhood. Additional residents included a newsstand owner, railroad clerk, railroad fireman, railroad engineer, bookkeepers, electrician, tailor, shipping clerk, property caretaker, salesmen, clerks, laborers, factory workers, janitors, night watchmen, cement worker, postal clerk, machinist, automobile salesmen, barber, and garage owner. City directory listings show that about one-third of the houses extant in 1900 had the same residents, or other family members, living in them in 1920. Additional families that lived here in 1900 had moved within the neighborhood to a new or different house.

Garages became increasingly popular in the 1920s. Carriage houses were often initially converted into an "automobile house" but then were often replaced by buildings better suited to this purpose. Other carriage houses were never converted, but rather were demolished and replaced with a garage. In the West Hill Historic District, garages continued to be built on alleys, accessed from the rear of lots. For some corner lots, garages were accessed directly from the side street. Around 29 extant garages were built in the 1920s in the West Hill neighborhood (around 40% of outbuildings constructed by 1958), though several additional buildings have been demolished. These were primarily associated with older homes. However, at least four of the houses built in the 1920s retain a garage built around the same time.




Figure 16. Sanborn map coverage in 1928 of the West Hill Historic District, with boundary overlaid.

The 1928 Sanborn fire insurance map covers the entire West Hill Historic District for the first time (Figure 16). The neighborhood continues to include a mix of larger and smaller homes, including 191 extant houses out of 195 houses shown on the map. The density would only increase slightly over the next thirty or sixty years. A number of the outbuildings shown on the 1912 Sanborn map have been demolished. Most of the remaining and new buildings are now noted with an "A" for automobile house. Around 120 garages and other outbuildings are depicted on this map, with around 54 extant garages and outbuildings dating to construction by 1928. The map does show a few garage additions to houses, creating an attached garage, such as the house at 601 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street (Map #190). The neighborhood fire/hose house at 3<sup>rd</sup> and Lirin has been demolished, creating newly vacant land. Washington Public School remains at the southwest corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Spruce.

The 1930 census, 1931 city directory listings, and property records paint an interesting picture of the West Hill Historic District at this time. The census lists the estimated value of real estate associated with each household. West Hill residents held real estate ranging from \$4,000 to \$10,000 in value on average. Houses rented for around \$25 to \$40 per month, with slightly less for part of a house or more for a large home. Of the 194 extant houses in 1930 in West Hill, about 19% were rental properties. While the percentages are about the same as in 1920, the individual houses reflected a shift from rental to owner-occupied or vice versa for at least half of the properties. Rental properties continued to be evenly distributed throughout the neighborhood. John Bloom, Mina Glass, and Isaac Newton Mauck each owned three properties in West Hill, and at least nine other residents owned at least two properties. An additional 7% had an owner-occupied and rental unit, per listings in city directories. However, census records show that at least 10% of the additional households had a boarder or roomer listed, with no relation to the rest of the family. Prominent citizens continued to make their home in the West Hill Historic District, such as

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Fred Beach (president of Beach Lumber & Supply Co), Jerome Bishop (Iowa Pearl Button Company), Lyle Day (president of Hershey State Bank), Henry F. Giessler (president of American Savings Bank), Fred Hoefflin (secretary of Van Nostrand Saddlery Company), Harry W. Huttig (Huttig Manufacturing Company), Douglas V. Jackson (judge, chairman of First National Bank), Dr. John Klein (doctor), Albert S. McKee (McKee Button Co), Clifford Musser (president of Muscatine State Bank), A. Randall Tipton (secretary of Roach & Musser Sash & Door), and George M. Titus (Ioan and investment firm). Other occupations for male and female residents of West Hill at this time were similar to professions noted in 1921.

With the drop in the stock market and decline in the economy from 1929 to 1932, the United States entered the Great Depression. Residential construction across the country slowed, with few having the means for new housing. Housing that was built was typically smaller houses. In Muscatine, construction dropped off noticeably in the 1930s. The 1940 census notes 150 dwelling units dating to 1930 to 1934 while 259 units dated from 1935 to 1940, compared to 495 in the 1920s and 1,019 in the 1910s. Construction picked up in the late 1930s and early 1940s, though soon impacted with the start of World War II.

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In the West Hill Historic District, five houses were built between 1935 and 1942, and one house was significantly remodeled around 1942. The only large two-story home to be constructed, and one of the largest in the neighborhood, was built by attorney Robert Jackson at the northeast corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Cherry in 1937-38 for more than \$8,500 (Map #101). While this home replaced an earlier house, the four small houses were constructed on vacant or previously vacated land. James and Eliza Greathouse, owners of two other properties in West Hill, were associated with the construction of the two houses near the southwest corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Linn (previous site of hose house) around 1936 and 1941, which they used as rental housing (Map #64, 66). A block north, Albert Meisky, a lineman for the local power company, built a small house in 1939 (Map #155), and cabinetmaker Antoon Smit built his retirement house around 1941 (Map #147).

The listings in the 1941 city directory reflect 199 extant properties in the West Hill Historic District. These listings. combined with property records, show an increase to 28% of the properties functioning as rental properties. About half were rental properties in 1931, while the other half shifted from rental to owner-occupied and a handful shifted from rental back to owner-occupied. These rental properties were located throughout the neighborhood, including 20 rental properties found on 4th Street, 13 on 3rd Street, seven on 2nd Street, and 14 on the side streets. An additional 4% had a second unit with an owner-occupied unit, though boarders were found in other dwellings throughout the neighborhood. Overall, every block had a renter in all or part of a dwelling. Interestingly, about 40% of the properties in the West Hill Historic District were owned by women in 1940, with only a handful in a wife's name of a married couple. Females led 35% of the households. Many of these women found income through rental properties or renting portions of their properties. Around a dozen working women found employment as teachers, stenographers, bookkeepers, salesladies, and in a button factory. Male professions reflect a profile of a middle class neighborhood on average, with some more prominent and more blue-collar residents as well. The West Hill Historic District was home to two doctors, three lawyers, three engineers, a judge, a dentist, bankers, newspaper editor, grocers, store owners, teachers, foreman or supervisors of companies/factories, insurance agents, postal workers, salesmen, barbers, janitors, railroad switchmen, defense workers, welders, machinists, firemen, factory testers, painters, carpenters, bricklayers, and laborers.

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


Figure 17. Sanborn map coverage in 1946 of the West Hill Historic District, with boundary overlaid.

The 1946 revised Sanborn map shows the little development that occurred in the neighborhood since the 1928 edition (Figure 17). The ten new houses are shown, eight on lots that were vacant in 1928. Overall, 203 extant dwellings appear on this map. Interestingly, half dozen lots remain open for potential future development, some of which would occur by 1958. About 120 garages are depicted on the map, including around 66 that remain standing. Many of the garages appear to be the same as depicted on the 1928 Sanborn map, with at least 20 new garages also shown. Garages continue to be located at the rear of lots, usually accessed by the alley. Washington Public School continues to be located in the neighborhood, and the large reservoir is still depicted on the southwest corner of Reservoir Park (Map #217).

With the end of World War II, the economy across the country and in Muscatine once again grew. The Muscatine Journal reported in 1946 that while growth had been retarded in the war years with the lack of materials, construction was gaining momentum again. In 1946, houses ranged from \$1,500 to \$7,000 in cost in Muscatine, with the average cost rising only slightly to \$2,700. By 1949, the average cost of a house rose sharply to \$5,500, resulting from a combination of more substantial houses, increased demand, and inflation ("Building and Repair Jobs Gain Momentum," Muscatine Journal, December 30, 1946, sec. 3, p. 14; "66 Building Permits for New Homes," Muscatine Journal, December 30, 1946, sec. 4, p. 11; "Permits Issued in November top other 11 Months," Muscatine Journal, December 29, 1950, sec. 4, p. 4).

While much development occurred throughout town, few lots were available for construction in the West Hill Historic District from 1946 to 1958. James N. and Eliza Greathouse built another small rental property, a duplex, on a vacant lot on 4<sup>th</sup> Street around 1947 (Map #191). The northeast corner of 4<sup>th</sup> and Pine was yet undeveloped. Leonard Donahue, a dentist, and his wife and dental assistant Margaret built a ranch here with an attached one-car garage around 1948 (Map #149). Warren Tutt, a service manager at Krieger's Motors, and his wife Sophie, a sorter at McKee Button Company, followed suit around 1950, building a house on the adjacent lot (Map #148). Likewise,

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Mark and Catherine Scannell acquired the vacant lot at the southwest corner of  $3^{rd}$  and Pine in 1954, immediately building two houses to sell (Map #49, 50). Finally, Irma Dooley built a duplex at the rear of her lot at the southwest corner of  $4^{th}$  and Linn in 1956 (Map #154). A number of garages were also built in the neighborhood in the late 1940s and 1950s. This construction represents nearly the completion of the development of the West Hill Historic District. Only eight additional properties would be built from 1959 to 2007. Three required the demolition of earlier houses, while three were on yet vacant portions of lots. The demolition of the school opened the last large lot, with a larger apartment complex built here around 1974 (Map #84).

Property records and city directory listings in 1956 show a strong middle class neighborhood, continuing trends from the last three decades. The 208 extant residential properties in the West Hill Historic District included 27% that were used as rental properties. One-third of these properties had at least two units. An additional 10% had an owner-occupied and rental unit within the property. Around one-third of the rental properties were converted to full or partial rental use since 1941. They were distributed throughout the neighborhood, with nine on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, 17 on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, 19 on 4<sup>th</sup> Street, and ten on side streets. Only a couple of blocks in the west end of the historic district had no rental uses. Women continued to own about one-third of the properties, independent of any husband. Working women included several teachers, several nurses, the executive director of the YWCA, worker at the YMCA, a restaurant owner, bacteriologist, serum broker, stenographer, laundry worker, hotel worker, button factory worker, dishwasher at restaurant, and wrapper at grocery store. Nellie Foster ran the Foster Convalescent Home at 416 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street (Map #71), and the Bellevue Hospital operated at 205 Cherry (Map #102), employing several women.

Residents in the West Hill Historic District in 1956 represent a cross section of Muscatine in this period. Prominent businessmen and women included Glyde Beach (president of Beach Lumber & Supply Co), Jerome Bishop (retired), Stanley Howe (production manager Home-O-Nize Company), Robert Jackson (lawyer; vice president of Central State Bank), Richard C. Kautz (vice president of Grain Processing Corporation), Theodore F. McKee (vice president of McKee Button Company), Clifford Musser (Muscatine Bank and Trust Company), Leonard Weber (secretary of Weber & Sons Button Co), and Matthew Westrate (judge). Other residents in the West Hill Historic District worked in insurance, advertising, purchasing, welding, wood working, dry goods, groceries, printing, sales, real estate, manufacturing, carpentry, photography, automobiles, radio, and button factories, and as engineers, doctors, lawyers, dentists, police officer, postal workers, bar and store owners, service station owners, office managers, laborers, pastors, plant supervisors, machine operators, painters, teachers, airport manager, newspaper editors, repairmen, and custodians. They worked at many of the large companies in Muscatine at the time, including Barry Pulley, Carver Pump Company, Grain Processing Company, Heinz, Huttig Manufacturing, Kent Feeds, Oscar Meyer, Roach & Musser Sash & Door, Ronda Button Company, S.G.&P. Stein Furniture Company, and Stanley Engineering.

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#### Architectural development and significance, 1839-1958

The West Hill Historic District includes excellent examples of residential architecture in Muscatine from 1839 to 1958. The buildings represent a diverse housing stock, including high style and vernacular, large and small, and brick and frame structures. Early buildings reflect significant examples of Greek Revival and Italianate architecture in Muscatine. Smaller vernacular buildings, reflecting the historic mixed nature of the neighborhood, were built in a simple gable-roof form. Some of the best examples of 19<sup>th</sup> century and early 20<sup>th</sup> architectural styles in Muscatine are located within this neighborhood, built during the peak of the development of this neighborhood from 1873 to 1915. These fashionable homes reflect Italianate, Second Empire, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, and Prairie School styles. Middle class homes in this period reflect the same styles, interpreted at a smaller scale. Fashionable updates to homes in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century often included a new porch. Additional smaller houses in the early and middle of the 20<sup>th</sup> century represent trends in housing throughout the country and specifically in Muscatine. These later homes are architecturally significant within the later development and evolution of the neighborhood. Carriage houses and garages also contribute to the varied architectural fabric of the West Hill Historic District. Further discussion on popularity and characteristics of residential architecture and architectural styles in this period can be found in the *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa* (pages 86-132).

The oldest architecture in the West Hill Historic District reflects some of the earliest brick and frame dwellings still standing in Muscatine. Early development in the West Hill Historic District in the 1840s and 1850s was primarily smaller frame houses. Many of these houses were later replaced by larger, more substantial dwellings. The four houses standing from the period of 1839 to 1849 are modest, one-and-one-half-story or two-story, side gable dwellings. Elements of the Greek Revival style are suggested on two of them (Rhoda Smalley House, 1839, 807 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #114; Couch-Carskaddan House, c.1846, 411 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #11). The country embraced the Greek Revival style in the first half of the 19th century, and it exists in simple and more refined forms in Muscatine. The J.C.B. Warde House, begun in 1852, is the most refined example of the Greek Revival style in Muscatine (205 Cherry Street, Map #102).

The 23 houses remaining from the 1850s and 20 houses from the 1860s represent more substantial homes than the cross section at the time, including some excellent examples of the Italianate style and vernacular architecture. While frame construction was the typical method, one-third (14) of the houses are constructed of brick. About one-quarter of the houses from this period reflect some degree of the Italianate style. The hip roof, cubical form is commonly seen for the larger Italianate houses in Muscatine, such as the Stone-Richman-Musser House at 606 W. 3rd Street (1860, Map #87) and Henry Waterman Moore House (c.1852, 716 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #97). Smaller, excellent examples of gable-roof or hip-roof Italianate houses dating to this period including the Pliney and Adelia Fay House (1855, 112 Locust, Map #30), Stone-Robertson House (c.1852, 614 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #88), Gordon-Evans House (1854, 308 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #142), Henry and Catherine Funck House (c.1860, 306 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #87), and Huttig-Moigneu House (c.1867, 201 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #42). The Gothic Revival style, popular across the country in this period, was not as popular in Muscatine. However, one substantial home was built in this style in the West Hill Historic District by Abraham Smalley around 1861 (814 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #40).

The remainder of the extant houses dating to construction in the 1850s and 1860s are primarily two-story, gableroof, frame dwellings. The majority of the dwellings are two-stories in height, with only six smaller houses at oneand-one-half stories. Early views of Muscatine show simple one-story or two-story gable-roof houses throughout the community. Houses were oriented to a gable-front or side gable format. Examples of side gable houses built in this period include the Gordon-Evans House (1854, 308 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #142), Louis Springer House (c. 1855, 400 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #15), Phillip and Elizabeth Stein House (c. 1862, 316 Chestnut Street, Map #123), and William and Julia Nesselbush House (c. 1866, 504 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #170). While a number of side gable houses were constructed, the gable-front house became popular in the 1850s in the West Hill neighborhood, continuing to be built through the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. This type is defined simply by the gable-roof oriented to the front. These houses were often side passage in design, built with either frame or brick construction. Elements of Greek Revival or Italianate styles were applied in the 1850s and 1860s to some examples as well, as seen on the Huttig-Moigneu House (c. 1867, 201 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #42). Other examples of gable-front houses dating to this period include the Beadle House (c. 1853, 505 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #80), Peter and Christina Jackson House (c. 1859, 519 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #83), Charles and Mary Stone House (c. 1858, 705 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #99), and Andrew and Magdalena Kirsch House (c. 1870, 506 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #171).

While the architect and/or builder is not known for the majority of these residences, some have been identified from this early period. Josiah P. Walton was perhaps Muscatine's first architect, designing and building houses beginning in the 1850s and continuing through the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. In the West Hill neighborhood, it is known that he designed the Henry Waterman Moore House (c.1852, 716 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #97). Architect Willet L. Carroll of Davenport traveled to Muscatine to design the Stone-Richman-Musser House (c.1860, 606 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #87). Carpenter/builders also designed as well as built dwellings at this time. Samuel B. Hill and Chittenden U. Hatch both owned and built houses in the West Hill Historic District in this period. (Additional

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information on architects, carpenters, and builders can be found in the *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa* Multiple Property Document nomination, revised 2008).

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While the early architecture contributes to the significance and understanding of the development of the West Hill Historic District, it is the architecture from 1873 to 1915 that further defines the character of the neighborhood at the peak of its development. Many of these houses replaced smaller, earlier structures, with a focused effort on constructing a nice middle or upper class house. The historic district represents perhaps the best collection of architectural styles and types in Muscatine from this period. A total of 132 of the 216 houses (60%) in the historic district date to these four decades. Architecture ranged from large, stylized houses to smaller basic dwellings. While over 70% were built with frame construction, 36 properties were built with brick construction, a significant number in comparison to other neighborhoods in Muscatine in this period. Over 85% are two stories in height, with one one-story and 17 one-and-one-half-story houses dating to this period. About two-thirds of the houses have a recognizable style, while the remainder are working or middle class vernacular dwellings. The earlier vernacular forms and the Italianate style would continue to be popular through this period as well, to the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. New architectural styles also were built in the West Hill Historic District in this period, such as the Second Empire, Queen Anne, and Prairie School. Gable roof houses became more complex, with greater use of the cross gable form by the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The 34 extant houses built from 1873 to 1884 primarily reflect the Italianate style (11), with a handful of Second Empire (3), Colonial Revival (1), and Queen Anne houses (2). More vernacular houses were typically built in the two-story gable-front form (12), with a few side gable houses (3). The start of this period is marked by the construction of three Second Empire houses on the 500 block of W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street around 1873 to 1875, including the Rothschild-Cohn House (c.1875, 507 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #27). The form is defined by the mansard roof, with some features carried over from the Italianate houses, such as brackets along the eaves and distinctive window hoods.

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Italianate continued to be the predominant style, however, built in either a hip roof or gable roof form with prominent window hoods, tall windows, and bracketed eaves. Examples of Italianate houses built in this period include the Robert Jewett House (c.1880, 209 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #44), DeWitt C. and Irving B. Richman House (c.1882, 506 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #22), and John A. and Sophia Wilson House (c.1884, 316 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #146). Gable-front houses, both brick and frame, continued to be built throughout the West Hill Historic District. Architectural details are simplified on these houses, with features typical of the period such as two-over-two-light double-hung wood windows, as can be seen on the Hugh and Christie Smith House (c.1882, 613 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #195) and George Arnold House (601 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, c.1883, Map #190).

A few architects and builders have been identified for houses built in this period, though the majority are unknown. One of the largest houses in the West Hill Historic District built in this period, the Clark-Blackwell House (1882, 206 Cherry Street, Map #103), was designed by the Chicago firm of Cleveland and Jay and built by the local contractor George Magoon. Magoon had worked as a carpenter/builder in Muscatine since the 1850s, similar to Samuel B. Hill and Chittenden U. Hatch. Hill also owned and built a second house in the West Hill Historic District around 1874, the Second Empire house located at 510 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street (Map #23). Likewise, Hatch partially owned and built the double house at 401-403 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street around 1886 (Map #72). J.P. Walton continued to design and build houses in this period, but none have been identified in the West Hill Historic District at this time (Additional information on architects, carpenters, and builders can be found in the *Historical and Architectural Resources of Muscatine, Iowa* Multiple Property Document nomination, revised 2008).

From 1885 to 1906, the predominant architectural style in the West Hill Historic District was the Queen Anne style, reflected in 42 of the 83 extant houses dating to this period. Overall, houses reflecting this style represent nearly one-quarter of all houses within the historic district. The style is defined by asymmetrical massing, a number of elaborate features, and decorative surfaces. Queen Anne houses were built of brick and frame construction in

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Muscatine, with the brick examples exhibiting stone or terra cotta work to further decorate and detail the surfaces. Some of the more elaborate examples of the Queen Anne style include the Martin-Giesler House (c.1889, 403 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #9), Theron and Nellie Thompson House (c.1890, 405 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #73), William and Harry W. Huttig House (c.1892, 315 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #62), Lewis and Anna Burnett House (c.1895, 518 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #86), and Seabury Brewster and Mary Cook House (c.1904, 419 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #13). The majority of the Queen Anne houses in the West Hill Historic District, however, reflect the more typical, middle class version of the Queen Anne house. These houses often had a steeply pitched hipped roof with one or more lower cross gables, including one on the front. The emphasis remained on asymmetrical layout, ornamental features, and decorative surfaces. Simpler but intact frame examples also include the Henry and Martha Geiss House (c.1904, 415 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #12) and Edward and Louise Tyler House (1905, 310 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #143).

While the majority of houses in the West Hill Historic District were constructed as single family dwellings, the double house, or duplex, was constructed in this period as well. A couple earlier examples of two-family dwellings exist in the West Hill Historic District, symmetrical in composition. With the popularity of the Queen Anne style, these double houses reflected unique appearances for either side. Four extant double houses date to this period in the West Hill Historic District, beginning with the brick Chittenden U. Hatch Double House (401-403 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, c.1886, Map #72). Anna Morrison built the two double houses at 312-314 and 316-318 Pine in 1899 as rental properties (Map #140, 141). Perhaps the largest of these double houses, the Sawyer-Day Double House (617-619 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #93) was built around 1905 in the Queen Anne style as well.

The Queen Anne style influenced other styles and vernacular forms in the 1890s and early 1900s as well. While the Shingle style nationally had additional inspirations, it primarily borrowed elements of the Queen Anne in the West Hill Historic District. By definition, Shingle style houses had wall cladding of shingles, as well as asymmetrical form, steeply pitched rooflines with cross gables, bay windows, and porches. While some houses were completely clad in shingles, others were only clad on the second story. Two turn-of-the-century examples in the West Hill Historic District are the John and Susanne Sterneman House (c.1901, 207 Broadway, Map #34) and Robert L. and Carrie Thompson House (c.1902, 314 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #145). Vernacular houses continued to be built in traditional forms in this period, over half as gable-front designs. Simple decorative features of the Queen Anne style may be applied to these houses, such as Martin W. and Margaret Stapleton House (c.1903, 816 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #111). The basic gable-front house began to be enhanced with a small side cross-gable section or bay window as well. A handful of side gable houses were also built. By the 1890s, with framing technology advances and popularity of the Queen Anne style, nine extant houses were built with L-plan, T-plan, or other cross gable forms, including the Smith-Sweet House (c.1898, 406 Chestnut, Map #126).

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


Figure 28. 314 W. 4th Street, c.1902, Map #145


Figure 29. 406 Chestnut, c.1898, Map #126

Three additional styles or types were built after the turn-of-the-century and into the 1920s in the West Hill Historic District. The Colonial Revival and Dutch Colonial Revival styles began in the late 19th century, reflecting early American architecture. Three extant houses from this period show the influence of the Colonial Revival style, while five additional houses reflect the Dutch Colonial Revival, with the gambrel roof form. No large Colonial Revival houses exist in the neighborhood, but the Winfield and Nellie Knight House is a simple vet refined example of this type (c. 1921, 217 W, 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #132). The Dutch Colonial Revival style is found on smaller houses such as the Frances Hawley House (c.1911, 402 Cherry Street, Map #215) and larger houses such as the Fred and Louise Hahn House (c. 1929, 804 W, 4th Street, Map #210), Four larger houses reflect the Prairie School style, popularized by Frank Lloyd Wright. This style also emphasized horizontal detail through low-pitched roofs, wide eaves, bands of windows, horizontal bands, and large porches with square columns, such as the Alnutt-Hoefflin House (c.1913, 710 W. 3rd Street. Map #96). The Foursquare house is defined primarily by its cubical form created by the interior layout of four rooms per story, but it also reflected stylistic elements of the period, such as wide eaves, multi-over-singlelight windows, and porches. The Mary E, Anson House (c. 1913, 510 W, 4th Street, Map #173) is one such house with a mix of these elements. The classic Foursquare form, with hip roof and front dormer, is clearly visible on a handful of houses in the West Hill Historic District, such as the Sander House (211 W, 4th Street, c 1917, Map #131). The square-ish form and Prairie School elements were also applied to one large duplex of the period (Sander Duplex, 209-2091/2 W. 4th Street, c. 1922, Map #130).

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

The bungalow became popular in the first two decades of the 20<sup>th</sup> century as well, and many examples of this smaller home are found throughout Muscatine. While bungalows with Craftsman influences are often viewed as the typical house, the term bungalow is also applied to other small houses with different influences. Typical features of the Craftsman bungalow include low-pitched roofs, wide eaves, multi-light over single-light double-hung windows, exposed rafter tails, and porches with tapered columns resting on short piers. The Craftsman style was also utilized on larger homes, such as the David B. and Mary MacKenzie House (c.1909, 407 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Map #10). Typical bungalows are not as prevalent in the West Hill Historic District as in other areas of the community, with only nine examples with construction dates ranging from 1903 to 1919. Three bungalows were built in a row at the northwest corner of 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Linn Street, beginning with the William and Catherine Huttig House (#2) around 1910 (403 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, Map #161). Dr. Edmund B. Fulliam, Sr. constructed adjacent gable-front bungalows on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street around 1914 (Map #69, 70), combining the small bungalow with this traditional vernacular form.

The popularity of porches continued to increase in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Porches were common features of houses built in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, and common additions to earlier houses in this period. Porches in Craftsman or Classical styles typically spanned the front of the house. Craftsman porches usually had wide eaves, square columns, stylized Craftsman detail, heavier columns and balustrade, and columns that often sat on stone or concrete block piers (Kahn and Meagher 1990: 58-60). Sanborn maps show updates to porches on nearly every block between 1905 and 1928. Nearly 10% of the extant homes in the West Hill Historic District have porch alterations or additions that date to the first quarter of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. These alterations are usually considered historic and contributing to the evolution of the property and neighborhood. Examples of houses with porch additions include the Charles Stegeman House (204 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street, c.1865, c.1910 porch, Map #134) and P.M. and Elisa Musser House (516 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, c.1885, 1920s porches, Map #24), as well as the previously pictured Charles and Mary Stone House (c.1858, 1910s porch, 705 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #99), Peter and Christina Jackson House (c.1859, c.1910 porch, 519 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #83), William and Julia Nesselbush House (c.1866, 1900s porch, 504 W. 4<sup>th</sup>

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Street, Map #170), Rothschild-Cohn House (c.1875, c.1910 porch, 507 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #27) and William Huttig House (c.1892, 1920s porch, 315 W. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Map #62).

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Only 15 extant houses date to construction in the West Hill Historic District from 1930 to 1958. The small house form continued to be popular in this period. Houses resembling traditional bungalows were built, such as the Henry and Ruby Oberhouse House (1931, 517 W. 4th Street, Map #183). A few examples of the Tudor Revival are found in the district, including the Hutchison-Brodie House (c.1930, 314 Locust, Map #185) and similar Hutchison-Fairbanks House (c. 1930, 313 Broadway, Map #187). This style typically had steeply pitched roofs, large chimneys (often in front), entry vestibules, and multi-light windows. In 1936, the Federal Housing Administration issued basic house plans to provide maximum accommodations with a minimum of cost. The standard form, which has been termed a "minimum house" or "minimal traditional house," incorporated a side gable design, central entry, and little if any ornamentation including small eaves, such as the Greathouse Rental House (c. 1936, 212 Linn, Map #64). The Greathouses used the same basic form on a rental house built around 1941 (404 W. 3rd Street, Map #66) and duplex built around 1947 (603 W. 4th Street, Map #191). Garages generally remained detached throughout this period, though the earliest built-in garages, often at the basement level, began to appear. The Antoon and Grace Smit House included a basement garage accessed from the side alley (c.1941, 309 Linn, Map #147). One large house was built in the West Hill Historic District in this period, the Robert and Elizabeth Jackson House in 1937-38 (715 W. 3rd Street, Map #101). This Georgian Revival home stands across the street from some of the largest 19th century homes. The ranch house gained popularity in the late 1940s and continued to be popular through the 1950s and into the 1960s. This style is defined by the sprawling rectangular one-story plan, usually also with a low pitch side gable roof line though a front gable may project from this roofline. Small one-car garages were included in some plans by the late 1940s and 1950s, such as the Warren and Sophie Tutt House (c. 1950, 301 W. 4th Street, Map #148).

Garages, and earlier outbuildings, compose the other significant category of architectural resources in the West Hill Historic District. The neighborhood has 74 of these resources built by 1958, with 40 garages built at a later date. Around 11 of the 74 date to the 19th century, while 46 date to construction between 1900 and 1928, and the remaining 17 were built from 1928 to 1958. Five 19th century carriage houses and outbuildings are brick, while the remainder is frame construction. They range from elaborately designed buildings to complement a large house. such as the carriage house at 206 Cherry Street (Map #103), to more vernacular structures constructed to serve their purpose, as can be seen in the following photographs. The majority of garages constructed in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century are frame construction, with around eight examples in brick and a handful of concrete block structures. Two examples that stand out as particularly well-designed are associated with the properties at 515 W. 2nd Street (Map #29) and 516 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street (Map #24). The majority of the garages, however, are generally small frame buildings with a gable or hip roof designed to accommodate one car, perhaps with additional storage space that is now used for a second vehicle. A handful of buildings appear to have been designed with two large entries. Rusticated concrete blocks were used for the construction of a handful of one-story garages and one two-story garage (207 Broadway Street, Map #34). The garages built in the middle of the 20th century also reflect many of these gualities. The majority of these buildings continued to be detached and located on the alley, added to properties with older homes. As noted previously, some garages were built attached to earlier homes in this period, and some new homes were built with attached garages.

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
#### Verbal boundary description

Map of the West Hill Historic District, scale of 1"=400'

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


Map of the east half of the West Hill Historic District, scale of 1"=200'

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#### **Boundary Justification**

The boundary for the West Hill Historic District in Muscatine has been drawn to include parcels that reflect the significant historic residential nature of the district from 1839 to 1958. Parcels that do not reflect these historic associations have been excluded from the district boundary, or are classified as non-contributing. The boundary has been drawn as contiguous, so these parcels on the edge of the boundary not associated with the significance of the district are excluded from the district. Likewise, if these parcels are found between contributing resources, they have been included in the district as non-contributing resources. The boundary follows the current parcel lines associated with contributing properties.

The boundary for the West Hill Historic District has been determined through a combination of historic, geographic, and aesthetic factors. The crest of West Hill runs along W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street. This crest line historically was even more defined, prior to later grading efforts. This crest line, and the parcels around old Reservoir Park near the peak of the hill, defines the north edge of the boundary. Topography and commercial/residential use dictate the east edge of the boundary, drawn to include all adjacent historically residential parcels. The south boundary includes the residential parcels on the bluff overlooking the Mississippi River, not including those at the base of the bluff along Mississippi Drive that are separated by topography. Topography also defines the west boundary, as well as the line for the Original Town plat. The parcels at the end of Ash Street are the last to overlook the Mississippi River and constitute the west end of the boundary along the bluff line. West Hill peaks near Reservoir Park and Cherry streets, and parcels are included around this peak and slightly down the west side. The Original Town plat line, extending true north-south, also marks a topography change as the elevation begins to decline near this line. Those parcels within this Original Town plat are also united historically by this plat, and this line reinforces the west edge of the district boundary. Further to the west, the street angles change and the elevations decline, and these properties are not linked to the remainder of the West Hill area. These parcels immediately to the west are outside the Original Town boundary, at decreasing elevations, and oriented to a different street grid.


Though historic archaeological sites have not been identified at this time, they could potentially contribute to the West Hill Historic District. If necessary, the boundary could be adjusted to include these sites. Sites would most likely be associated with domestic use of properties or sites of demolished buildings. Reservoir Park is a possible location for potential archaeological sites, as development has been minimal historically.

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
