In this house, features from the Victorian Queen Anne style have been used to enliven a relatively simple form, for example the full-height polygonal bay on the south side, with its decorative shingling, pendant vergeboard, and attenuated brackets below the gable. The street corner site is creatively exploited by the polygonal veranda -- a major decorative element in itself -- and the way in which the main entrance is set in a chamfered corner, albeit awkwardly in relation to the door directly beside it on the right. Such modifications of a traditional local house type in the design and construction stage give this house an unusual and quite distinctive character.

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## HISTORICAL DATA

Charles Whitaker and his wife Josephine began occupying this house in c. 1892. Whitaker was a carpenter at that time and more than likely built this house and a similar residence (now greatly altered) across Adams Street. Later, Whitaker became a general pullulus contractor, residing here until 1932.


