This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

Daniel D. Demarest married Rebecca De Groot in 1707. Their old homestead was inherited by youngest son Daniel, Jr. and was devised by him to his only son Garret in 1802. In March, 1808 he sold it and 118 1/2 acres to his father's cousin Peter J. Demarest who died two months later. The farm went to his son James and daughter Mary, wife of Nicholas Kipp. This James P. Demarest bought most of his sister's share [and probably built this house - CKT]. He died in 1852 and the farm went to his son Peter J. Demarest who died in 1856 and his widow and heirs sold it to Abraham G. Demarest. He sold it in 1869 with 64.57 acres to Susan A. Tyson, wife of John Tyson, a real estate developer. Demarest regained title in 1888 through foreclosure and died the next year. In April, 1891 his heirs sold the house and 51 acres to John W. and Charles O. Foster. Other owners followed in this century until the Darrows bought it from "Dumont Heritage."
