DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First Freewill Baptist Church is a clapboarded structure supported on a cut stone foundation. It is gable-front and has corner pilasters carrying a partial entablature terminating in abbreviated returns on gable ends.

The front (west) elevation has two four-panel doors with wide architraves and simple corner blocks. Between them is a central 8/8 sash window with molded casing exactly like the three second story windows above which light the cantilevered gallery. There are four 16/12 windows with molded casings on each side elevation. On the rear (east) face are two first story windows and a gable light.

The belfry, located forward on the ridge, dominates the church's design. It rests on a clapboarded tower with corner pilasters supporting an entablature. The belfry itself is square in plan and sided with flushboarding. Rectangular openings are louvered. Corner pilasters carry an entablature and cross gable roof crowned by a weathervane. It contains the original church bell.

This structure's overall simplicity of design is reflected in its interior fittings as well. There is a vestibule in the front of the building which includes a set of gallery stairs in each corner. The straight pews are arranged in a manner creating two side aisles. Only a molded chair rail adorns the planed plank wainscoting. A low pulpit of simple design is located against the rear (east) wall. Old gas lighting fixtures hang from the ceiling in the center of the room and from either side of the pulpit. There are also wall sconces to either side of the pulpit and a lamp on the reading surface. The graining on pew railings and pulpit railings dates from the first half of the 19th century.

In 1847 the pew doors were removed and it is believed that the present pulpit may date from this time. Few changes have been made since the mid-19th century.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

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The First Freewill Baptist Church is typical of early 19th century ecclesiactical architecture of New England and also serves as a fundamental visual anchor at Gilman's Corner. Additionally, it is one of the surviving structures at what was the original town center. Located in the geographical center of the town, the church's steeple was visible for many miles and was used as a navigational aid by steamships on Lake Winnipesaukee. After 1860 many parishoners left to worship at the Baptist church in Alton. Since at least 1885 the building has been maintained by non-demoninational efforts as the advent of the railroad reinforced the shift of the village center to the valley. There has been no regular minister since about the turn of the century. The church had fallen into disrepair when the East Alton Community Association organized in the late 1920's to raise funds for the structure's maintenance. The building is now in an excellent state of preservation.
