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**DESCRIPTION** The Captain Andrew Offutt Monument in Ryder Cemetery in Lebanon, is a monument that consists of a granite base and a marble statue. The base is two parts: a rough faced granite slab approximately four feet across and one foot high; resting on this slab is a pedestal approximately five feet tall. It is inscribed with the words: "Capt. Andrew Offutt/ Nov. 9, 1837/ Oct. 7, 1921/ He served in the Federal Army/ From 1861 to 1865 in the/5th Kentucky Cavalry/ and went with Sherman/to the sea/ His wife/Elizabeth A. Offutt/ Sept. 6, 1845." Atop the pedestal is an approximately five foot high white marble statue of a Union soldier in a kepi hat resting upon a sword. The soldier is wearing a tunic length coat.

Statement of Significance The Captain Andrew Offutt Monument meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument was built by the Offutt family to honor Andrew Offutt who lived some 56 years after the Civil War. Yet, his service with the Union Army was what he or his family felt was the most important aspect of his life. This is an excellent example of the property type "statue." It is one of only two statues in Kentucky that depict Union soldiers.

**Verbal Boundary Description** - The Captain Andrew Offutt Monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet centered on the monument located in Ryder Cemetery in Lebanon, Kentucky.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
